Four From Roseburg High Picked To Take Test For Finalists Soon

Four Roseburg High School students have been named semifinalists in the 1938-39 National Merit Scholarship competition, reports Principal Harry Jacoby.

The four are Charles Bryden, Sally Hill, Thomas Tomashak and David Roy Forrest.

The local students were among 10,000 of the highest scorers on the National Merit Scholarship qualifying test, the nationwide test of educational development given in over 14,000 high schools April 29.

The semifinalists named outscored over 479,000 classmates and thus moved a step closer to an estimated five million dollars in merit scholarships to be awarded in the 1938-39 program. The group of 10,000 is composed of the highest scorers in each state, prorated according to state population.

Yoncalla Pupils Get Vocational Guidance Early

A system aimed to make pupils aware of possible vocational endeavors has been instituted at Yoncalla Union High School.

The vocational awareness program is being featured in the guidance department this year, reports correspondent Mrs. George Edes.

The vocational guidance program for the school was started under the direction of Robert Harvey from the state Employment Service office in Roseburg. He has interviewed several seniors who had not made a vocational choice.

Also, the school, through the county superintendent's office, has set a date for mental maturity tests, achievement vocational and personality tests. After these tests, students will be counseled on areas most suited to their abilities and interests. Parents may attend these sessions.

Freshmen have already been started on their guidance programs by working out a four-year course of study with their parents' approval. They have also completed a vocational inventory test.

All classes will participate in a scheduled college visitation program Nov. 4, planned and directed by the state Department of Education.

By early and continuous planning, the hope is that students will be able to reach mature and sound decisions on vocations.
