A wide open race for the Pacific Coast Conference title and the Rose Bowl shaped up Monday following another series of surprises. Two of the clubs—Oregon and Washington—gained stature even in losing while California finally awoke with a 34-14 victory over Washington State.

The Huskies of Washington led until the fourth quarter before falling to mighty Ohio State 12-7 and Oregon gave Oklahoma a tough battle in losing 6-0.

Oregon State's pre-season favorite who lost their opener to Southern California, continued bouncing back with a 14-0 victory over UCLA. Idaho whipped Utah of the Skyline Conference 20-0.

Winless Stanford went down to Northwestern 28-0.

Oregon and UCLA cannot win the Rose Bowl bid—the Ducks because they were there last Jan. 1, and the Bruins because of conference imposed sanctions.

This week's top conference battle matches Southern California and Oregon Saturday night at Portland. Both have won their only PCC outing, the Ducks whipping UCLA and USC's surprise over Oregon State. Since then the Trojans dropped non-conference decisions to strong Michigan and North Carolina.

Washington State seeks to put its aerial artillery back on target against Idaho while Washington rates as favorite at Stanford in the other two conference battles.

UCLA Dates Florida

UCLA and Florida start the week's non-conference action at Los Angeles Friday night. Saturday's slate shows Utah at California and Oregon State at Wyoming.

Oregon outgained Oklahoma 261 yards to 156 but the Sooners captured a fumble by Paul Johnson on a nine-yard pass from Bobby Boyd to Dick Carpenter.

Ohio State, outplayed by Washington, cashed in on a blocked punt in the final minutes. The Buckeyes recovered the blocked kick at the 27 and scored in seven plays.

An alert California defense was fashioned to stop WSC's Bobby Newman. It did. The Bears drove 96 yards for the first touchdown on a punt return by the second interception pass for the second. The victory was the first for California this season and the second in 13 outings for coach Pete Elliott.

Halfback Paul Lowe sparked an Oregon State drive in the first half against UCLA and center Bruce Hake dashed 50 yards with an intercepted pass in the second.

Northwestern scored once in each period to record its second triumph in a row over PCC competition. Stanford coach Jack Currier declared sadly "We just ran out of gas again."

Idaho fullback Ken Hall scored twice in the second period on runs of five and seven yards to give the Vandals control over Utah. Gary Farnsworth ran 17 yards in the final quarter for the other touchdown.

Oregon Tech emerged as the favorite of the Oregon Collegiate Conference football race by defeating a strong Portland State team 31-21 Saturday night.

In the other conference opener, Oregon College of Education whipped Eastern Oregon 15-7.

In the game at La Grange, Jim Bowen scored two touchdowns for OCE. Herb Hermann recovered a fumble in the end zone for the winners' final tally. George Alverti scored Eastern Oregon's lone touchdown.

Charlie Wilson hit pay dirt twice for OTI in the Klamath Falls contest—once on a 69-yard punt return and the other time on a 43-yard run. Sam Roberts, George Kane and Ralph Nor-gard scored for the losers.

Southern Oregon College, the conference champion, played outside the league and was beaten 60-13 by Lewis and Clark of the Northwest Conference.

Next week Oregon Tech will play Southern Oregon at Ashland and OCE will tangle with Whitman in a non-conference game.

Bears 34, Cougars 14

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP)—California's Bears snapped out of their slump by routing Washington State Cougars and can make it two victories in a row Saturday against Utah's football forces.

Coach Pete Elliott's forces knitted together a solid offense and what he termed the best defense since he came here in 1957 to swamp favored WSC 34-14 for their initial 1958 win.

The victory came before a national television audience and showed big quarterback Joe Kapp to be just what his coaches claimed—one of the best split T engineers in the collegiate game.

California contained a fine quarterback in Washington State's Bobby Newman and go against another this week in Utah's Les Grosscup, another of the top college players. It remains to be seen if the Bears employ the same defense so effective against Newman.

"We rushed five or seven men," Elliott explained. "And we had four men back instead of the usual six. Our line charge forced the Cougars to throw because they couldn't sustain a ground attack. And when they threw, we had their deep stuff protected."

Newman did complete 22 of 35 throws for 195 yards but he was picked off by California at key times, once by Steven Bates at his own one and once by Jack Hart who returned 55 yards for the second California touchdown.

The first had come on a 39-yard sprint by halfback Hank Olguin on a pitchout from the quarterback. A 96-yard drive. All told, Kapp completed 7 of 10 passes, most of the short variety, and ran 52 on 15 carries.

His option series starting with a run and windup with a pass to Hart scored six times during the sunny afternoon.

End Charlie Holston proved solid on defense and pounced on two Washington State fumbles that his mates later turned into touchdowns. He dropped on the first at another two points after them.

Bates hit reserve quarterback Dave Wilson so hard he dropped the ball. The second fumble recovery by the junior wingman came at the WSC four after Eddie Stevens lost the ball.

Sophomore fullback Billy Patton scored three times on one run of seven yards and two plunges from a yard out.

The Bears showed off a new formation for the conversion try as Elliott gave up his previous strategy of trying to keep the Cardinals, usually looked upon as Chicago's poor sisters, upset the Washington Redskins 37-10.

In other Sunday action, Philadelphia defeated favored New York 27-24. Los Angeles belted San Francisco 33-3 with the 48ers' Joe Perry setting a career rushing record, and Detroit and Green Bay played a 13-13 tie.

Cleveland was so superior that Phil and Brown sat out the final quarter. Plum's TD passes went to Pete Brewster on an eight-yarder and to Bob Mitchell, for 21. Brown notched his scores on runs of 23, 39 and three touchdowns in the first six minutes to knock off the Bears, undefeated in six exhibitions and the league opener.

San Francisco's Perry gained 44 yards, surpassing Steve Van Buren's lifetime mark by 15 yards. Perry now has rushed 5,877 yards in a nine-year career.

Richard B. (Rick) Ferrell, newly-appointed director of minor league personnel for the Detroit Tigers, had a lifetime batting average of .218 in 16 years in the major league.
