

Sidelights On World Series

NEW YORK (AP) — Figuring the World Series:
For all the good they've done, the series pinch-hitters could just as well have remained on the bench. None among the 12 pinch-hitters used has hit safely. Only Enos Slaughter of the Yanks reached base — on a walk in the third game.

Warren Spahn's shutout was the first by a left-hander in the series since Johnny Podres of the Dodgers beat the Yanks 2-0 in the seventh game of the 1955 classic.

After getting two hits in his first three tries in the opening game, Yogi Berra of the Yankees has gone hitless in 12 consecutive times at bat and his average has dipped to .133.

The Pittsburgh Pirates of 1925 were the only team to have won a seven-game series after dropping three of the first four games. And to accomplish the feat, the Pirates had to overcome a 7-6 Washington lead in the final contest with three runs in the eighth inning off Walter Johnson.

Hank Aaron's two hits in Sunday's game gave the Milwaukee outfielder 16 safeties in two series and an over-all percentage of .372. Included are two doubles, one triple and three homers.

Shortstop Johnny Logan of the Braves has now handled 59 chances without a miscue in 1957 and has 21 so far this year.

The Yankees are batting .168 as a club. The record low for a five

game series is .161 by the Philadelphia A's in 1905.
The four series games have averaged 2 hours, 43 minutes. Sunday's game was the shortest in time — 2 hours, 17 minutes while the first one was the longest — 3 hours, 9 minutes.

Emphasizing the Braves' fine team effort is the fact that they've batted in 19 runs and no player has more than three RBIs. Hank Bauer has driven in seven of New York's 12 runs.

Huskies Edged By Ohio State

SEATTLE (AP) — The University of Washington Huskies, whose stock has increased considerably in value since Saturday's game with Ohio, began to prepare themselves Monday for their first Pacific Coast Conference game.

It's true the Huskies lost that thriller back at Columbus, Ohio, but they didn't get slaughtered like the experts guessed. When the smoke cleared the score was 12-7 in favor of the Bucks, who are third-ranked in the nation and outweighed the Huskies 18 pounds per man. The Bucks were favored by 20 points.

UW Coach Jim Owen and his staff spent all day Sunday going over the scouting report on the Stanford Indians, the Huskies' opponent Saturday. They also took a good look at the Ohio State film and Owens said it showed that Bob Hyner, Bruce Claridge, Bob Schloredt and George Pitt were the Huskies' defensive sparklers. The Huskies returned home in good physical shape but, as Owens put it, "Madder'n hell."

Game "Given Away"
"They were sore at themselves for giving it away. We had about six other chances to score and couldn't quite do it."

The Bucks managed to squeeze the victory out of a first-period pass interception and a blocked punt in the third period, both of which they converted into TDs. On each drive, Ohio went 27 yards in seven plays, all on runs.

Washington showed they had what it takes in the first five minutes when they plowed through the Ohio line, going 31 yards in four plays for a touchdown. Don McKela went for 16 yards in one of the plays and breezed into the end zone for the TD on a 12-yarder over tackle.

Halfback George Fleming kicked his seventh straight conversion of the season.

Bob White intercepted the Washington pass on the 27-yard line in that same first period and Jerry Fields plunged a foot to score after White and Don Clark had moved the ball almost to the goal line.

The Bucks got their chance to score again when Bob Schloredt picked up a bad pass from center, tried to punt but was blocked and the ball rolled all the way to the Washington 27. There Ohio tackle Jim Marshall fell on it. Clark plunged four yards for the score.

Stitch Gets Second Chance To Prove Self Over Logart

Rudell Stich gets his big chance Monday night.

The 25-year-old Louisville welterweight, who has been struggling for a living in the ring, gets his opportunity to prove his upset victory over Cuba's sleek Isaac Logart last August was no fluke.

He and Logart clash in a return over the ten round route at New York's St. Nicholas Arena. There won't be any television but boxing matchmakers will be on hand to see what Stich can do.

Apparently he is no flash in the pan. He followed up his victory over Logart by flattening Luther Lawlings in the fourth round last month to run his win streak to eight. Rudell is now ranked 10th among the 147-pound contenders while Logart is ranked fifth.

If he can whip Logart again Stich will be promoted in the rankings. And more important to

the father of five, he will be in line for fatter purses.

Logart's record is 32-10-5 including 19 knockouts. Stich's record is 13-3 including nine kayos.

Sonny Liston, of Philadelphia, is another young fighter out to strengthen his position in the rankings. Winner of 20 of 21 pro fights, the hard-hitting heavy-weight now is ranked ninth among the contenders. He meets Frankie Daniels of Los Angeles in a non-TV clash at Miami Beach Tuesday night. Liston stowed away New York like Wayne Bethea of New York in just 89 seconds on Aug. 6.

Sonny Ray of Chicago and veteran Eddie Cotton of Seattle collide in the Wednesday night television feature at Louisville. The light heavyweights got an unexpected break when the Joey Giambra-Bory Calhoun middleweight bout had to be cancelled because of an injury to Giambra. Joey has to undergo an operation for bone chips in the left elbow.

Ray earned a No. 10 ranking among the 175-pounders when he stopped Jess Bowdry in the ninth round of a thriller last month.

The Friday night radio-TV feature matches middleweights Bobby Boyd of Chicago and Jimmy Beecham of Miami at Chicago in a return fight. Beecham upset Boyd in their first clash.

Bearcats, Wildcats Win NWC Openers

Willamette and Linfield won their opening Northwest Conference football games Saturday and are tied at the top of the conference standings.

Linfield, the defending champion, put together two scoring drives in the second half and topped Whitman 21-14 in a game at Walla Walla.

Linfield moved 62 yards to a touchdown in the opening quarter. But then Whitman snapped back and took the lead with a pair of second quarter scores. Bill Grant plunged over from one yard and Max Johnson scored on a 53-yard pass from Bob Collins.

Coy Zimmerman and Sel Spray scored the final Linfield touchdowns with short runs.

Favored Willamette had to fight hard for its 27-14 victory over Pacific at Forest Grove. Jack Nehrin, who carried the ball 33 times, passed to Don Iverson for one Pacific touchdown. Dennis Rieger circled left end for the other.

The highlights of Willamette's score were a 22-yard run with an intercepted pass by John Hinds and two one-yard sneaks by quarterback Keith Driver.

Lewis and Clark, playing outside the league, overpowered Southern Oregon of the Oregon Collegiate Conference, 40-12. And College of Idaho, also outside the conference, Saturday night, was beaten 53-0 by Cal Poly at San Luis Obispo.

Next week's conference games will pit Linfield against Willamette at Salem and Lewis and Clark against College of Idaho at Caldwell.

Whitman will play Oregon College of Education and Pacific will tangle with Pacific Lutheran in non-conference games.

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
