PORTLAND (AP)—Lew Traub picketed pickets for several hours Tuesday.

The pickets finally voted to call off their strike. But Traub went home with little satisfaction.

The pickets, Traub said, had been carrying non-union signs.

Not so, said Henry McCarthy, secretary of the Portland Metal Trades Council. McCarthy said the signs were made in a union shop.

But the canvas, said Traub, came from a non-union firm.

Anyway, the metal worker pickets went back to work. And Traub went back to his West Linn canvas shop. He said the county labor council will consider his complaint Monday.

The strike affected 38 employees of the Zidell Exploration Co. They voted to accept a new contract which carried a package increase of 15 cents an hour.

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AFL-CIO Ignores Most Republicans In Endorsements

PORTLAND (AP)—Democratic candidates once again have the backing of organized labor's political committee in Oregon this year.

Few Republicans appeared on the list of recommendations issued by the Oregon Committee on Political Education Tuesday.

Gov. Holmes got labor's support in his bid for re-election, along with Reps. Al Ullman, Charles Porter and Edith Green.

And COPE support also went to Atty. Gen. Robert Thornton in his effort to unseat Rep. Walter Norblad, a Republican, in Oregon's 1st Congressional District.

Of the 13 state measures which will appear on the November ballot, the committee gave its support to only six.

Bills Endorsed

Those six would: allow public school teachers to be Legislature members, authorize abandonment of certain state hospitals, fix the Oregon-Washington boundary, increase the loan fund to war veterans, allow temporary assignment of judges and increase salaries of state legislators.

The COPE said it was opposed to measures which would revise a power commission provision of the state Constitution and which would authorize different uses for state institutions.

The committee took no position on several measures—including one to eliminate capital punishment in Oregon.

Others on which the committee gave no recommendation: financing of urban redevelopment projects, modifying county debt limitation, special grand jury bill and county home rule amendment.

Included in the endorsement are State Reps. Al Flegel and W. O. Kelsay, both Democrats.

Four Douglas Educators To Select Paper Editor

Four Douglas County educators have been named to a committee which will recommend an editor for the county Oregon Education Assn. chapter newspaper.

The committee will also outline the function and format of the newspaper which will be published three or four times during the year. Name of the newspaper has not been selected.

The paper will inform teachers about state and county lay and professional educational activities.

Man Buried 90 Minutes Thinks Of Earth Diggers

CORONA, Calif. (AP)—What does a man buried under 130 tons of rock and earth think about?

Those digging machines that are biting down to free him, says Carlos Ramirez. He was buried for 90 minutes Tuesday in a quarry rockslide.

"I've seen a couple of fellows killed by machines trying to dig them up," said Ramirez, who came through the ordeal with only minor injuries.

"I thought that might happen to me, but I still couldn't move. So what could I do?"

The steel helmet he wore saved his life. It made an air pocket over his head.

He was planting explosives at the base of a 150-foot cliff when the slide buried him. A steam shovel went to work and removed 40 tons of earth and rock. A smaller machine was sent in and removed another 60 tons. Fellow workers then started in with hand shovels.

Ramirez, 54, was motionless when he was uncovered.

Defendant Is Favored In \$200 Damage Suit

District Judge Warren A. Woodruff found for the defendant Tuesday in a \$200 damage suit arising out of a truck-car collision of Jan. 20, 1955.

Robert E. Landis brought the action against Lawrence W. Van Loo, truck driver, and the Safeway Stores, Inc. Landis alleged Loo was negligent at the time of the accident.

The truck and trailer was attempting to pass the Landis vehicle about a half mile south of Winston when the trailer collided with the car.

Landis failed to appear at the trial before Judge Woodruff.

Newest Hurricane Deadliest Storm

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—Hurricane Janice, the season's most deadly storm, spun its winds of 75 m.p.h. in the open Atlantic today, a menace to unwary sailors. Its victims numbered 19.

Janice was located early today about 455 miles east of Jacksonville.

Reconnaissance aircraft and ships reported Janice was moving between north northeast and northeast at 8 m.p.h. The Weather Bureau said the course would keep the storm's center well off the East Coast of the United States.

Gale warnings were lowered south of Wilmington, N.C., to Vero Beach but continued to fly south of Cape Hatteras, N.C., to Wilmington.

Janice became a killer when it whipped through Bahama waters Tuesday on a drive to the open sea. A 45-foot Haitian sloop, trying to make shore in heavy seas, swamped and 18 persons aboard were drowned.

In earlier tropical storms this season, one death was attributed to Alma, the first, and five to Ella, the fifth.
