EDITORIAL APPROACH

Our neighboring newspaper, the *Sutherlin Sun*, I observe, has attacked me and my column because I do not agree with the Socialist philosophy of politics. McCarthyism and Fascism are mentioned as being descriptive of this column and writer.

Criticism of this column is to be expected. If I did it out, I can expect to take it. Many people differ decidedly with my views. If that were not true we would have only one political party and that wouldn't be good.

The column in the *Sutherlin Sun*, I am quite sure, was not written by my good friend the publisher, Emory Hutton. It used language that appeared to come from elsewhere. Hutton has seen fit to put his newspaper behind Congressman Porter's candidacy, which is his privilege.

I have no criticism to offer of the *Sutherlin Sun*, its publisher, nor those who disagree with this column.

There are, however, a number of statements in this campaign designed to stir up emotions rather than reason. The smart attorney, lacking a case, always attacks his rival attorney and thereby diverts the attention of the jury. The case then becomes a trial of lawyers, rather than of the defendant. That seems to be the strategy in this particular case. Every effort is made to attract the attention, interest and reason of the voter away from the real facts by an attack on me personally. The general public always loves to see someone's hide taken off.

Arguments Unanswered

The statement was made in this column that some of our "liberals" use the same language and reasoning as Communist leaders. The whole argument of the *Sutherlin Sun* is that McCarthy and Fascist leaders use the same line. All anyone needs do, I contend, is read the news.

The fact that many people, by reason of political philosophy, do not agree with current activities, as indicated by letters, is beside the point. An editor, as a rule, does not seek to ride the bandwagon. He is seldom with the majority. Majority opinion swings from one extreme to the other. The newspaper, normally is found in the middle-of-the-road, consequently agrees with neither the majority nor the extreme minority. It has been pointed out that the people who don't like our system have written letters to the State Department. People favorable to any situation seldom write. The fact that the State Department has received some critical letters is not, therefore, proof of a "majority." On the other hand, it could be claimed that a great share of letters are "inspired" and written by those favoring either other ideology or opposition politics.

Consistency Lacking

This is not an attempt on my part to "convert" the writer of the *Sutherlin Sun's* editorial. He apparently has his mind made up and is not interested in any argument. I presume there are many others; not only on Porter's side, but also of the opposition faith.

However, let's do a little reasoning. Mr. Porter has been very vigorous in his fight against Latin American dictators. He has even gone outside the boundaries of the United States to voice his opinions and to blister our State Department. This is a point my critics prefer to overlook. I have said before, and I say again, that Mr. Porter, as a member of the legislative branch of government, has every right to state his opinion while in the United States. It is, and has been, my contention that he has no right nor authority to go OUTSIDE the United States to criticize the executive department.

But, Mr. Porter has advocated recognizing Red China. The editorial, in which I was criticized as another McCarthy and as a Fascist, advocates recognizing Red China. Now let's use reason, not emotion!

Mr. Porter doesn't want any dictators in South America. They're Fascists, he claims. But he, and his editorial supporter, are willing to "recognize" Communist China, restore trade with Red China, and accept the Red Chinese government. China has one of the greatest dictatorships in the world. It is ruled by Mao Tse-tung, a dictator, and by Chou En-Lai, his prime minister, also a dictator, and both work closely with Khrushchev, the Communist dictator.

Now if dictators are so unpopular with Congressman Porter and his editorial advocate, why is he poison against Latin American and Spanish dictators, but friendly toward Chinese, or Communist, dictators?

If that's "fuzzy" thinking, because of my "declining" years, as I am described by the *Sutherlin Sun*, then I must plead guilty.

Australian Aborigine Gets Six-Month Sentence

ALICE SPRINGS, Australia (AP)—Australia's best known aborigine, Albert Namatjira, was sentenced to six months of hard labor Tuesday for supplying liquor to fellow tribesmen who aren't allowed it. Namatjira, 56, was granted full Australian citizenship rights two years ago in recognition of his artistic ability. That gave him the right to buy liquor. But Australian citizens are also liable to jail if they supply liquor to an aborigine who is a ward of the state, which most aborigines are.

NEW YORK (AP)—I have taken up bowling. I do not particularly like bowling, but my boss does. So I have taken up bowling.

Bowling is the latest example — and perhaps the worst example — of that creeping paralysis of American independence known as togetherness. In bowling, the disease is carried to the ultimate. Friends bowl together. Enemies bowl together. Management and labor bowl together.

Remember when we were a nation of individualists? When a man took up a sport to get away from it all and to refuel his soul in the glories of nature? When he went off, like a man, to sit on the bank of a stream, to fish, to dream, to find himself, to find a perspective about the people he was escaping — his wife, his kids, his boss.

Now we all bowl together. And this is called healthful exercise, exhilarating and relaxing. We bowl in a smoky smoke-filled room, where there is no natural light, no natural air, and you have a grand view of a wall. Relaxing? It has all the serenity of a shooting gallery. It brings out the worst in people. The women wear tornador pants. This tends to narrow them on the top and widen them in the middle, with a Freudian subconscious wish to look like subcon-

Men Wear Frowns
The men wear slacks and a frown. I almost never saw a bowler who wasn't frowning. They take the game that seriously. The good ones—even after a strike—come back to the bench frowning to let the rest of the team know they are continually aware of their responsibility to be good. The bad bowlers frown under the weight of their enormous guilt complex; they are letting their team down, which in some cases can mean their department or the

whole company they're working for. And thus vice president and secretary, man and wife, boss and slave find yet another bond in togetherness—uicers. You see the worst physical tortures in bowling alleys, especially as the bowler tries to keep from tottering over the foul line. He ties himself up in the air like Nijinsky in a ballet of demented acrobatics. And then the poor fool falls over the foul line, and bells ring, and red lights flash, and you'd think the FBI had just nabbed Khrushchev slipping banana peels on the launching pad at Cape Canaveral.

Mental Fortune
You see the worst mental tortures in bowling alleys. An 180-bowler bowls 98, and he blames it on the fact that a woman three aisles away was whispering. He heard her in all that noise. Or he blames it on tight shoes, dust on the ball, or a speck of towel lint on the floor. Another man throws his ball immediately into the gutter—a wooden ditch from which there is no return. His ball starts there, and it ends there in the gutter, and he has no one to blame but himself. But he comes back to the bench convinced he was robbed. All of us bowlers are completely miserable. But we do have our togetherness.

WASHINGTON (AP)—The past two decades have been among the most terrifying periods in mankind's recorded history. And throughout those perilous years, the frail figure of the man in the Vatican towered as that of a giant on the side of those in the world who believed in the fundamental decency and dignity of the human being. It mattered little what your religion might have been. You would have been a rarity if you had been able to come away from the presence of Pope Pius XII without the conviction that you had been in the presence of greatness. Uncounted thousands over the last two decades stood in the presence of this man and heard his voice. He never spared himself the ordeals of innumerable audiences.

Throngs Watched
Hundreds of thousands watched with feelings of awe as he raised his arms slowly and majestically in benediction, while a thunderous roar of ovation swelled from the multitudes massed in St. Peter's Square.

Those who saw him in private audiences, no matter what their creed, almost invariably reported they had come away feeling the meeting had been a rich spiritual experience.

Even the most cynical and worldly of his visitors confessed themselves deeply moved. Perhaps it was the impression they received that in this spare, physically fragile figure there was a reserve of enormous spiritual power.

Perhaps they saw the reflection of such power in his eyes—black, dancing, alert eyes that seemed to pierce through a man's exterior and look into his very soul.

Self-Humility
Perhaps it was that they could sense the man's deep humility, and the ancient splendor surrounding the Roman Catholic Church, or that they could read in the sad, ascetic face a deep compassion for all men. I met Pope Pius XII on several

occasions and have had impressions like these. I know of nobody who has met him who has not come away with similar feelings. One suddenly remembered, in his presence, that in an age which saw the most destructive war of all history, here was a man who spoke and labored only for peace. One would remember that in an era which witnessed incredibly cruel scourges at the hands of ruthless dictators, here was a voice to speak out fearlessly for the conscience of mankind. You took the slender hand and felt the inner strength of the man. You heard the voice, almost a whisper, pronounce the quiet words of blessing. You heard him say: "Tell the people of your great country that our prayers are with them." You felt, somehow, those prayers would be answered.

Thinking It Over

Chamber Chairmen Calls For Business Groups To Organize

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP)—Philip M. Talbott, board chairman of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, called on American businessmen today to ring doorbells if necessary to elect candidates devoted to the free enterprise system.

"Labor is organizing politically at every level," he declared. "That is what we must do." "It is not a question of party labels," he said. "It is a question of electing men who will not waver from the defense of the free market and our dynamic, competitive enterprise system."

The national Chamber, Talbott told the 62nd annual convention of the National Assn. of Mutual Insurance Companies, is now working on a program of political action which will be distributed to members before the November election.

Up To His Ears In Politics
Every businessman is up to his ears in politics because big government delves deep into the lives of everyone, Talbott said, and "we have a call to correct misinformation and keep it corrected."

Much of Talbott's prepared speech was critical of the last session of Congress.

"I would be less than candid not to say that the last session distinguished itself for financial responsibility and for its disregard of the constitutional separation of state and local responsibility," Talbott declared.

He said Congress was responsible for a 12-billion-dollar budget deficit.

"The Congress seems married to the idea that government spending is a panacea for recession—and for Sputniks," he said. "The fact that the congressional elections were coming up may have had something to do with it. Pork barrel legislation was rolling all over the place."

Sec. Dulles Says Reds Would Draw Condemnation

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of State Dulles said today the Chinese Communists will draw worldwide condemnation if they resume fighting in the Formosa area.

Dulles commented on the Red Chinese announcement Sunday of a week-long ceasefire. He had just arrived here from a weekend at his Duck Island retreat on Lake Ontario.

Dulles was expected to confer promptly with President Eisenhower.

The full U.S. response to the Red Chinese move apparently awaits the outcome of such conferences.

In advance of Dulles' return, a State Department spokesman said that Red Chinese plane flights over Quemoy constituted a provocative act out of line with the ceasefire.
