

Coast Conference '1s Work For Weekend

No one would have been out of his chair if the outworned, underdog Washington Huskies had emerged from their game with Ohio State a little bruised and wobbly legged.

But, unfortunately for the Stanford Indians, that's not the way the Huskies stack up this week. They had that healthy, rosy-cheeked look of a basket of Washington apples Tuesday as they drilled for their Saturday engagement with the Indians at Stanford.

Coach Jim Owen had his first and second units working on defense against the third team, which had little luck with its Stanford-type offense.

The Huskies, who scared the daylights out of a stadium full of Ohioans before losing to the Buckeyes 12-7 Saturday, will be playing their first conference game of the season Saturday. They figure to be decided favorites over the Indians, whose backfield hasn't scored a touchdown yet this year.

Despite three decisive losses, the Indians were in high spirits Tuesday and Coach Jack Curtice said the workout was the sharpest in two weeks. Curtice said his starting backfield Saturday will be Bob Scola at quarterback, Buck McMillen and John Bond at halfbacks and Gil Dowd at fullback.

The Oregon Ducks, another surprise team over the weekend, also were at full strength Tuesday following the return of starting guard Joe Schaffel, who last week with an injury. The Ducks, beaten only 6-3 by heavily favored Oklahoma, meet the Southern California Trojans Saturday at Portland.

Physically, the Trojans are less fortunate. Their No. 1 quarterback, Willie Wood, is expected to be out again Saturday because of a shoulder injury suffered two weeks ago. Also out is second-string tackle Ron Mix, who has had pneumonia.

Cougars Eye Speed
The Washington State Cougars, meeting Idaho in this weekend's other conference game, concentrated on speed Tuesday. The Cougar line will be outweighed 19 pounds per man by the Vandals and WSC Coach Jim Sutherland said the speed factor will be emphasized the rest of the week.

Oregon State coach Tommy Prothro reports that his leading ground gainer, fullback Nub Beamer, will miss Saturday's game with Wyoming. Beamer suffered a shoulder injury in the UCLA game last week. He'll be replaced by Dainard Paulson or Chuck Marshall.

The California Bears last weekend took care of WSC's Bobby Newman, the second leading passer in the nation. Now they're trying to work up a defense for Utah's Lee Grosscup, who led the nation in passing last season and threw for 14 touchdowns. Val Kerklin, a transfer quarterback from Los Angeles City College who is ineligible to play this year, tossed some Grosscup-like passes at the Cal defense Tuesday.

Seniors Get Chance
UCLA Coach George Dickerson says he'll start all his half-season seniors Friday night against Florida at the Coliseum. Tailback Don Long, one of six seniors limited to five games this season because of PCC penalties, had three of his passes intercepted by Oregon State Saturday. Dickerson said Monday that Jim Steffen would replace Long, but he had a change of heart. This will be the last time Long and the other five penalized players will perform at home.

Hockey Team Peddles Two To Philadelphia

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Sports Wolverine Gets Lineman Honor

A vital pass interception that saved Michigan State from a surprise defeat at the hands of Michigan brought Lineman of the Week honors today to Jim Chastain.

This is how the MSU junior center from Waynesburg, Pa., saved the day for the Spartans in the game last Saturday. At the time, early in the last period, Michigan led 12-6 and was threatening again. The Wolverines had the ball on the MSU 7 third down and goal to go.

Michigan quarterback Bob Piatek faked back and threw a forward pass. Chastain intercepted the pass on the goal line. He downed on the three and from there Michigan State started a 97-yard drive for a touchdown and a 12-12 tie, the final score.

Two other centers, Bob Harrison of Oklahoma and E. J. Holub of Texas Tech, also received high praise in the weekly Associated Press poll of sportswriters and broadcasters.

Harrison intercepted an Oregon pass and ran 24 yards to the Oregon 20. The play led to the only touchdown of the game as the Sooners nipped Oregon 6-0. In addition, Harrison made eight tackles and shared in seven others.

Holub's great defensive work against Texas held the Longhorns to a 12-7 victory. He made six unassisted tackles and was credited with nine assists. In addition he broke up one pass and recovered a fumble.

Unsung End Best Catcher

Anyone who read the University of Arizona's football brochure before the start of the 1958 college football season and then looked at the offensive statistics in its first three games must have done a double take.

The big mystery is Dave Hibbert, a rangy end who has caught 16 passes in three games, to take the leadership in that department according to figures released today by the National Collegiate Athletic Bureau in New York. Hibbert is not listed in the brochure.

Hibbert had a good day last Saturday against Tulsa with five receptions to jump from fourth place. He has not scored but has netted his team 160 yards.

Second in Elmo Randle of Virginia, with 14 receptions in three games for 244 yards and two touchdowns while Cal Bird of Kentucky has snagged 13 in three games, scoring twice and gaining 192 yards.

Charley Milstead of Texas A&M leads the nation's punters with a 49.9 yards average on eight punts. Georgia's Bob Walden has kicked 12 times for a 47.7 average, while Don Coker of North Carolina has a 46.7 average on seven punts.

Bahama Kayoes Bogart In Middleweight Test

Washington State's Offense Ranks High

NEW YORK (AP) — Washington State leads the nation in passing and ranks third in total offense in this week's statistical report from the National Collegiate Athletic Bureau.

Another Western team, College of Pacific, ranks first in rushing with an average of 273 yards per game.

The WSC Cougars have averaged 237.3 yards per game in passing this season to lead second-place Army by nearly 16 yards. No other Far West teams figure in the passing picture.

Army ranks first in total offense with a 515-yard per game average. College of Pacific is second with 438 and WSC third with 391.

Magnuson Wants India's Wheat To Be From NW

SEATTLE (AP) — India's order for 22 million bushels of white wheat should be filled entirely from Pacific Northwest supplies, Sens. Magnuson and Jackson (D-Wash.) said this week.

In a letter to the Department of Agriculture, the senators said India's preference for white wheat "stems in large measure from wheat carried on in the Far East in recent years by demonstration of these efforts should be fully recognized by placing the entire 22 million bushel order with the wheat industry of these states."

The department recently announced that India would buy \$238,000,000 worth of American farm products, including the big wheat order.



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
