INJURED BY LOG

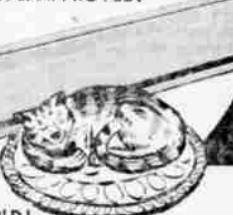

Former Sailors Offered Special Inducements

The Navy is offering special inducements to former sailors to serve another tour of duty, according to Chief Charles J. Warren, recruiter in Roseburg. Warren said some of the benefits offered are retention of rating, a 30-day advance leave, and if qualified, transportation of household goods and payment of re-enlistment bonus to those who have been discharged within a preceding 90-day period. In some cases, the bonus may exceed \$1,600. Training schools and refresher courses also are available to most former sailors, Warren said. He said he has details in the recruiting office in the courthouse.

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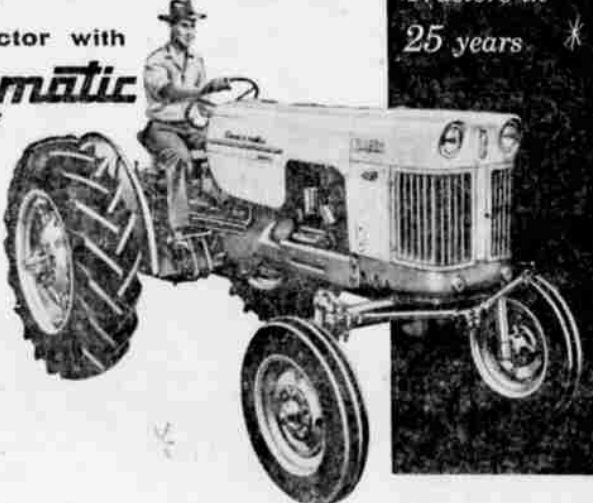


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
