

Legal Status For Lotteries In Washington State Urged By Its Federation Of Clubs

SPOKANE (AP)—A constitutional amendment to legalize certain forms of gambling in Washington state has been proposed by the Federation of Clubs of Washington. Perry Williams, federation secretary, said here Saturday.

He said the federation, with nearly half a million members in the state, passed a resolution at a convention meeting last week urging the legislature to offer a suitable amendment to the state constitution which would liberalize existing restrictions on lotteries in the state.

The federation represents social, country and city clubs and similar organizations which were permitted to operate mechanical gaming devices until Sept. 1932, when the legislature passed an act which declared to be in contravention of the constitutional provision prohibiting lotteries.

In the resolution, the federation reported that since 1932, the state

and clubs have lost an estimated 60-million dollars in revenues. "Between 1936 and 1952, the state and cities of Washington realized in taxes from mechanical devices operated in club rooms about 105-million dollars," the resolution said. "In addition to taxes derived from those operations, many charities, public improvements, parks, playgrounds, stadiums and like installations were built by the donations made by member organizations."

Williams said the federation advocated definite restrictions on any amendment so that profits derived from lottery operations would be used for worthwhile projects, rather than going to private individuals.

The federation also is seeking Gov. Albert Rosellini's support of the proposal to submit such an amendment. Williams said. Ralph Cannon, of the Olympia Eagles Lodge, is state federation president.

'Lie' Reportedly Uttered In Hot Exchange Between Gov. Holmes, Rep. Groener

Curse words flew during a heated conversation between Rep. Richard Groener (D-Milwaukee) and Gov. Robert D. Holmes at a Democratic rally in Oregon City Thursday night.

Rep. Groener said the governor swore at him. Gov. Holmes declined to comment on the issue other than to say he did not use swear words.

The Oregonian quoted Frank Filpott, president of the Clackamas County Labor Council, as saying that he had learned that Groener did the swearing.

Groener said that he was recalling to the governor previous criticism which Groener had made of policies of the state police, and that Holmes had agreed with this criticism.

Then Groener said he told the

governor he apparently had changed his mind.

"I told him a 'lie,' Groener quoted the governor as saying.

"I told him he was lying and he knew it. But I did not curse the governor," Groener said.

Holmes, reached at Salem Saturday, said he did not care to discuss the incident. He said, however, that the conversation was within hearing distance of other persons and that he thought they could confirm that he did not use swear words.

Groener has charged that state police are on a quota system for issuing traffic citations. Groener said this is wrong and he called for the dismissal of State Police Supt. H. D. Maison.

Holmes said he has no intention of dismissing Maison.

Firing Of Democrat National Committeeman Starts Scrap

BATON ROUGE, La. (AP)—Camille F. Gravel Jr., handsome, black-haired Louisiana, has touched off a political scrap that may provide a clue to the Democratic party's attitude toward the South in 1960.

An angry coalition of segregationists, states rights and supporters of Gov. Earl Long voted this week to fire the 43-year-old Alexandria attorney as Louisiana national committeeman.

He was high in party affairs. The state charge was that Gravel betrayed the South in his open support of the national party on civil rights.

Gravel, with backing of Democratic National Committeeman Paul Butler, insists the state group had no right to remove a national committeeman.

Gravel, a Catholic lay leader in heavily Catholic Louisiana, describes his stand on segregation as moderate.

Youngster Help Urged On Church By Mark Hatfield

DES MOINES (AP)—Mark Hatfield, Oregon Secretary of State and Republican nominee for governor, addressed the closing session of the National Sunday School Assn. convention here Friday.

He urged that church members everywhere aid troubled young people who are released from training schools in their states. Church, confederate and Sunday school can aid in putting such youngsters back on the right track, Hatfield said.

In Oregon, he explained, boys and girls released from correctional institutions are sent to a halfway house, or foster home. Church members, he said, can be of important help in opening their homes to such youths and helping them re-adjust to the community.

Hatfield expressed the view that the church has drifted from objectives for which it was organized.

"Religion has too much ritual and a false life today," he added. "It's the thing to do—like joining the country club."

"I talk Republicanism in Oregon as a Christian should talk to his neighbors about being aware of Christ and his church."

Cancer Society Planning Personal Habits Survey

NEW YORK (AP)—The American Cancer Society plans a survey of more than a million persons in an effort to pinpoint any relationship between personal habits and cancer.

The study will not be conducted primarily with smoking habits but will include them along with questions about diet, exercise, sleep, occupation, physical complaints, health history and other factors.

Pilot studies preceding the major survey are expected to be made soon in Cleveland; Baltimore; Nashville, Tenn.; Harrisburg, Pa.; and Tampa, Fla.

Consumption of alcoholic beverages, fried foods, tea, coffee and certain soft drinks; X-ray treatments; baldness, nervous tensions, height, weight and heredity are among topics about which questions will be asked.

Body Of Alcatraz Convict Found Circling The Rock

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—The unrecognizable body of tough Alcatraz convict Aaron Walter Burgett of Pottsville, Mo., was found Sunday circling the Rock, from which he escaped Sept. 29. It was spotted by prison guard Lyndon J. Cropper, bobbing face down in San Francisco Bay just yards off a Coast Guard cutter picked it up.

Warden Paul J. Madigan said he was convinced now that Ralph Coe and Theodore Cole, the only ones of 29 would-be escapees never accounted for, "drowned just as Burgett has. They just can't escape from here."

Burgett, 28, fortified himself with artificial aides for the swim. The Missouri post office robber was found still wearing a plastic bag inflated for water wings. He had a plywood fin strapped to one shin. He still carried the sharp knife with which he threatened guard Harold Miller. He and convict Clyde Johnson, once labeled Public Enemy No. 1, gauged Miller and left him, bound. Burgett entered the water, but Johnson didn't and was captured.

The tides and currents were too much for Burgett. His battered and gnawed head and body were nearly unidentifiable. But a thumb print and his prison-issue clothing made identification positive.

The warden said that he would provide a coffin and transportation of Burgett's remains to the small hamlet near Banner, Mo., where he once held up a post office. His parents live there now.

Missouri Bishop Elected To Head Episcopalians

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP)—The Rt. Rev. Arthur Carl Lichtenberger, bishop of Missouri, was elected presiding bishop of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America. He became the spiritual leader and chief executive officer for the 3 million member denomination, effective Nov. 15.

The 58-year-old Missourian was elected by fellow ranking prelates, the 190-man House of Bishops, at the church's triennial General Convention.

He succeeds the Rt. Rev. Henry Knox Sherrill, who reached mandatory retirement age of 68 for presiding bishop after occupying the post 11 years. When a bishop is named to the church's foremost office, he retains it until he retires.

Besides leading the denomination, he also is the main representative in this country of the worldwide Anglican communion of 40 million Christians.

Bishop Lichtenberger is the 21st elected to the presiding office in the nearly 200-year history of the American church.

Atty. Gen. Thornton Criticizes Opponent

McMINNVILLE (AP)—Atty. Gen. Norville Thornton, seeking the post held by Rep. Walter Norblad (R-Ore.), this week criticized his opponent's voting record.

Thornton told a Democratic rally Norblad had voted against Rural Electrification Administration and rural telephone loans and against federal aid to schools.

Thornton said Norblad had voted for the "infidel and god-averse" Norblad for the many cards and stamps he had received for his "bankers highway bill."

Thornton added that, more recently, Norblad voted against the Kennedy-Ives anti-labor racketeering bill and the federal food stamp plan which would allow greater use of government surplus foods for the needy.

Sanitarians Elect Oregon Assn. Head

PENDLETON (AP)—Leon Skelton of the Multnomah County Health Department was elected president of the Oregon Assn. of Sanitarians for 1959-60 at biennial sessions here of a two-day conference of the state organization.

The sanitarians elected a president two years ahead so he can work with the current president. Succeeding Bill Bower, Portland, of the State Board of Health, is current president is E. J. Reiser, The Dalles, of the Wasco-Sherman County Health Department.

Others elected were Jim McAllister, of the Portland Health Department, vice president; John Stoner, Eugene, of the Lane County Health Department, secretary; and Max Braden, Portland, with the State Board of Health, director.

Candidate Urges Less Control Of Agriculture

BURNS (AP)—A candidate for Congress says that, with few exceptions, there should be less control of agriculture by the federal government.

One of the exceptions, said Marion Weatherford, should be in research into cattle diseases.

Weatherford said the government should undertake broad research programs, but he added: "We need less government, less regulating and spending within the federal income."

Weatherford, a Republican, is seeking the seat held by Rep. Al Ullman in Oregon's 2nd Congressional District.

Thornton Plans Action For Fish Destruction

SALEM (AP)—Oregon Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton is considering legal action against the Idaho Power Co. for fish loss at the Oxbow Dam on the Snake River.

At least 1,000 salmon died earlier this week when the firm shut off the stream's flow through a bend in the riverbed. The company did this in an effort to get a damaged fish trap back into operation.

Thornton Friday sent a letter to Idaho Atty. Gen. Graydon W. Smith asking if he would join in a legal action against the firm.

Thornton conceded that it might be difficult to win such an action.

Red Fire Alarm Box On Way Out With Hitch Post

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—The familiar red fire alarm box on the corner may be on its way to antiquity along with the hitching post and the gas lamp.

City Commissioner Stanley W. Earl said this week he will decide within the next month whether to do away with the alarm boxes in favor of telephones.

He said the telephone company is making a study now on the cost of installing emergency telephones on street corners. The telephones would be available for emergency calls other than fires, since users would speak directly to an emergency switchboard operator.

It is a question of cost. Earl said he thought it would cost at least \$500,000 to change over.

There might be a saving though, because of one startling fact: Ninety per cent of the alarms turned in on the present boxes this year were false alarms, Earl said.

The 360 runs to false alarms brought out 1,600 pieces of fire equipment. "A very expensive proposition," Earl said.

The telephone system cuts down on false alarms, for the voices are recorded on tape, said the city commissioner.
