U. S. Asks Red China To Extend Cease-fire

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — The United States called on Red China Friday to extend the cease-fire at Quemoy, authoritative sources reported.

Informants said U.S. Ambassador Jacob Beam urged the step when he met Wang Ping-nan of Red China for a seventh, and possibly crucial, session of their series of talks on the Formosa crisis.

The cease-fire proclaimed by Red China Sunday expires in two days. The meeting lasted 2 hours and 35 minutes. Next meeting will be Oct. 15.
