One of the only, if not the only, freshman undefeated, unscored upon winning streaks in the state high school ranks was increased by one Saturday morning at Finlay Field. The Roseburg Chiefs won their fourth game of the year as they downed the South Eugene sophomore eleven 29-0.

The win was the fourth blanking of an opponent by the big, talented Roseburg yearlings. Previous games saw the Chiefs down North Bend 18-0, South Grants Pass 25-0 and Cottage Grove 29-0.

The fourth win came after the South Eugene crew had threatened to end the Chiefs' unscored-upon skein. Taking the opening kickoff, the visitors drove 60 yards to the Roseburg eight picking up four first downs en route. On the eighth, the Chiefs dug in and sent the South Eugene club back to 22 on three successive losses.

It was with 5:54 remaining in the second period that the Chiefs hit pay dirt. Starting on the 28, the Roseburg club moved the ball to the 39 on three plays for a first down.

Webfoots Halt Trojan Attack In 25-0 Verdict

EUGENE (AP) — The Oregon Ducks, in good physical shape after their 25-0 victory over Southern California, begin practice today for next Saturday's game with the pass-minded Washington State Cougars.

In last Saturday's contest before 32,734 fans at Multnomah Stadium in Portland, the Ducks overcame a vaunted ground attack. But Washington State is one of the top teams in the nation for gaining yardage on passes because of Bob Newman and Dave Wilson.

Newman was injured in WSC's game with Idaho and may not play against Oregon. But Wilson still is a threat.

In last Saturday's game, Southern Cal got into Oregon territory only four times and the deepest penetration was the Oregon 24 yard line.

The Ducks scored the first time they got the ball. They took the opening kickoff and three plays later halfback Willie West sprinted around right end and went 66 yards to score. West also ran end for a two-point conversion after the tally.

In the second quarter, Oregon added a short field goal by John Clarke. Clarke, who also kicked two extra points after the Ducks fourth quarter touchdowns, played for the Oregon State Rose Bowl team of 1956. He transferred to Oregon in 1957 and had been ineligible until last week.

Oregon was scoreless in the third period, but in the fourth the Ducks gained more touchdowns.

One climaxed a 60-yard march with Dave Groez plunging the final two yards. Later the reserves advanced 49 yards to score with a 34-yard pass from quarterback Sandy Fraser to halfback Len Read providing the touchdown.

CCC Mark Perfect

It was Oregon's second Pacific Coast Conference victory against no defeats. The only other team with a perfect conference record is California, which has played only one game so far this season.
