

Four PCC Counters Slated Next Weekend

A full slate of Pacific Coast Conference games comes up this week with the University of California testing its new-found power against the Trojans of Southern California at Los Angeles in a headliner.

After losing their opening battles to College of the Pacific and Michigan State, the Bears of Coach Pete Elliott have surged back for victories over Washington State and Utah by impressive margins.

Going against the Trojans Saturday, they'll meet the only club they could beat last season, but one showing strong improvement over its 1957 efforts.

The University of Oregon, currently leading the PCC with a 2-0 record, takes on Washington State at Eugene. UCLA plays at Washington and Oregon State at Idaho

in the other conference encounters.

Stanford, a surprise 22-12 winner over Washington, plays host to the undefeated Air Force Academy that showed power in fighting Iowa to a tie two weeks ago and tumbling Colorado State 36-6 last Saturday.

Cougars 8, Vandals 0

MOSCOW, Idaho (AP)—The Washington State Cougars found out Saturday what it's like to have a disabled Bobby Newman on the bench and they may have to get along without him for another three weeks.

Newman punted, then limped off the field after the first nine plays with torn ligaments in his left knee and WSC had to struggle with a rugged Idaho defense for an 8-0 fourth quarter victory.

Without Newman, the nation's leading passer last week, the Cougars were outgained in the air and had to rely on an enemy pass to win. Larry Rath intercepted a Gary Farnworth pass and returned 43 yards to set it up.

From the seven, Davey Wilson, Newman's replacement, pitched to a diving Don Ellingsen in the end zone.

It was a touchdown the Cougars missed in the second quarter when Carl Ketchie fumbled out of the end zone for a touchback from the Idaho four.

"It was the craziest game I've ever been associated with," Sutherland said, then referred to the whopping 145 yards assessed against his team.

After Newman was knocked out on a block by Idaho fullback Ken Hall, WSC drew four 15 yard penalties for personal fouls, two of them in the same series of downs.

Indians 22, Huskies 12

PALO ALTO, Calif. (AP)—After proving they can, after all, move the football, Stanford's Indians this week meet the Air Force Academy here in a game that could truly become an aerial battle.

The Indians snapped a three-game losing streak with a 22-12 upset over Washington last Saturday as the running of Rick McMillen and the throwing of Bob Nicolet shocked the Huskies.

The 186-pound McMillen, a junior left halfback, scored on runs of five and 20 yards, did the Stanford punting, caught a key pass that set up the third touchdown and intercepted a Washington pass that cut off a third period scoring threat.

Senior quarterback Nicolet, returning to full duty after injuring a shoulder in the opener, completed 15 of 29 passes, including a touchdown throw. He also intercepted a pass from Bob Hivner at the Washington 40 and returned to the 25 in what proved the turning point of the game.

The Indians trailed 12-7 at half-time and Nicolet's interception came with the second half only about a minute old. Seconds later McMillen went around end with a pitchout for his 20 yard scoring dash.

The Huskies, who lost a tough one to powerful Ohio State, rolled to a touchdown on a 54-yard drive the first time they controlled the ball against Stanford.

Stanford mounted a scoring drive of 65 yards in eight plays with McMillen making the first touchdown. The Indians had two

Australians Garner World Golf Title

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland (AP)—Australia won the World Amateur team championship of golf and the big Eisenhower Trophy today by defeating the United States by two strokes in an 18-hole playoff.

The three low scorers of the four-man Australian team compiled an aggregate score of 222 to 224 for the three low U.S. players.

The playoff, like the main part of the 29-nation competition, was decided on aggregate scores for the three low men on each team. Australia and the U.S. tied in the 72-hole competition Saturday with 918 totals.

Today Bruce Devlin shot a par 72 over the testing 6,906-yard Old Course of St. Andrews and Peter Tuogood and Bob Stevens had 73.

For the United States, Charlie Coe of Oklahoma City, the U.S. amateur champion, had a 73, Billy Joe Patton of Morganton, N.C., a 75 and Dr. Frank (Bud) Taylor of Pomona, Calif., a 76 for the 224 aggregate.

Bill Hyndman of Philadelphia, U.S. leader through the main part of the competition, was out of contention today with a 78 and Australia's Doug Rachli, former British amateur champion, made the same score.

Atom Radiation Found Effective Against Cancer

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP)—A leading nuclear scientist says atomic radiation has been used successfully to destroy cancerous tumors in humans without harming surrounding tissues.

Dr. Lee E. Farr, director of the medical institute of the Brookhaven National Laboratory, said the tumors were destroyed by radiation from nuclear reactors.

Treatment of humans was carried out at Brookhaven and the results were called encouraging.

Farr made the disclosure in dedicating the Hunter Radiation Therapy Center here.

The center, housing radiation equipment for the treatment of cancer and other diseases, is part of the Yale-New Haven Medical Center.

Farr said he has been conducting exploratory experiments with the reactor method for several years.

Briefly, this is the method: The element boron is fed into the patient's bloodstream. Boron is attracted to cancerous regions, so it accumulates in a tumor.

A nuclear reactor fires a bath of thermal neutrons into the patient. When the neutrons reach the boron, a radioactive reaction is set up.

The tumor — with its concentration of boron — is disintegrated. Surrounding, healthy tissues, which do not attract boron, are not harmed.

Brookhaven, which is supported by funds from the Atomic Energy Commission, is controlled by nine universities, including Yale. The highly secret installation is located at Upton, Long Island, N.Y.

Reventlow Race Entry Wins California Test

RIVERSIDE, Calif. (AP)—Beating the boss isn't usually the best way to get ahead, but race driver Chuck Daigh's victory in the \$14,500 Riverside Grand Prix suits Lance Reventlow fine.

For Daigh, of Long Beach, Calif., defeated a top field of drivers in one of Reventlow's power-packed Scarabs, establishing the young heir to the Woolworth millions as a major figure in the sports car field.

A crowd of 70,000 watched Daigh outduel the favorite, Phil Hill, and go on to win easily when engine trouble forced Hill out of the race a little past the half-way mark in the 200-mile grid.

Polish Cardinal May Attend Pope's Funeral

VIENNA, Austria (AP)—Stefan Cardinal Wyszynski of Poland is expected to go to Rome for the funeral of Pope Pius XII and the election of a successor.

Secretary Seaton Will Take Stump For Republicans

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of the Interior Seaton plans upwards of 20 Republican campaign speeches before election day.

He leaves Monday on a two-week tour into the south, west and Midwest.

Associates say that by the time he winds up in Wisconsin Oct. 31, Seaton will have made more than 75 political speeches and party appearances since August in behalf of Republican Congressional candidates.

His schedule beginning Monday calls for visits during this month to 11 states.

The schedule includes:
Oct. 15, a Montana rally at Billings; 16, speeches at Missoula, Browning and Great Falls; 17, a luncheon rally at Boise, Idaho, and an evening rally at Caldwell, Idaho.

Since August he has made campaign speeches in Alaska, California, Arizona, Illinois, Minnesota and other states.

RESERVE TRAINING CENTER
WASHINGTON (AP)—The office of Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore.) announced this week that a \$500,000 Army Reserve training center will be built in Portland.

It said the building, to be erected in the southwest district, will have facilities for 400 men.

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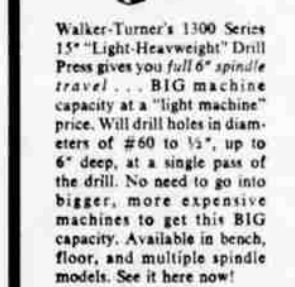
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
