

Space Probers Now Confident That They Can Hit Moon With New Rocket

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. space probes are more confident than ever that they can reach the moon. They may try again early next month.

Although no official date has been set for a new moon shot, there were reports that the next rocket may be launched at Cape Canaveral, Fla., between Nov. 3 and 11. During that period the moon will swing closer to earth than at any other time in its 28-day orbit.

The Air Force directed last week's spectacular shot which sent Pioneer—the first moonbound rocket to clear the earth's atmosphere—79,120 miles into space.

After losing speed, Pioneer turned back and disintegrated in the atmosphere over the South Pacific early Monday.

Maj. Gen. Bernard A. Schriever, chief of the Air Force Ballistic Missile Division, said he could not disclose just when another rocket would be sent aloft. But he added: "I can assure you we're not going to waste any time."

In a Los Angeles dispatch, the New York Times said the Air Force is reported to have received authority for two additional space probes early next year. One, the newspaper said, may be an attempt to obtain scientific data in the vicinity of Venus.

Venus and the earth come within 26 million miles of each other in the closest approach on their orbits around the sun.

Pioneer soared one-third of the distance to the moon, where it is about 221,500 miles away.

The Pentagon's Advance Research Projects Agency said it instructed the Air Force some time ago to provide two Thor-Able rocket combinations for some unspecified future investigation.

But officials declined comment on the report the rockets might be used for possible shots toward the planet Venus.

Voter's Pocketbook Election Issue, Maintains Nixon

CHICAGO (AP) — The voters' pocketbook is the prime issue in congressional elections three weeks away, Vice President Nixon said today.

"Citizens will take stock of where they stood in 1952 and where they stand today," Nixon declared at a news conference, the stock-taking can only mean good things for the GOP candidates, he believes.

Unless Democratic candidates follow the lead of the party's advisory committee, which issued a blast Monday against the administration's Far East policy, foreign policy will not be the major campaign theme, Nixon declared.

"In my opinion, many Democratic candidates once again will be happy to run on President Eisenhower's foreign policy, not Truman's or Acheson's," Nixon said.

Nixon, stopping the country to arouse the GOP to greater efforts, said he had noted a sharp upturn in GOP morale and organization. He took issue with pollsters who picture the Republicans as desperate.

He said, however, that the GOP still is the underdog in the campaign. "But we are not conceding a single seat," Nixon insisted. In only one area would he predict a GOP victory—"we will elect a senator and governor in New York."

Prospects in California look better, too, he said.

Two Burglaries At Riddle Net Thieves \$300

Sheriff Ira C. Byrd said today his office is investigating two burglaries at Riddle carried out early Sunday morning that netted thieves nearly \$300 in cash.

Approximately \$200 in currency and change was taken from Clark & Linder Union Oil Co. along with some checks and a paymaster's check protector, according to owner D. W. Clark.

It is believed burglars entered the premises after jimmying the front door lock sometime between 11:30 Saturday night and 6 a.m. from a metal cash drawer under the counter.

The second burglary occurred in the early morning hours Sunday when \$95 in change and seven cases of beer were taken from Veder's Grocery, sheriff's deputies said.

Entrance was gained through a small rear window about 14 feet from the ground, it was reported. Burglars left by a freight door which they unlocked from the inside.

The cash was taken from a drawer at the check out station near the cash register after drawers and filing cases were rifled in the store office.

has come before the City Council for discussion without Slocum being on hand to present his side. Last Tuesday, after learning that the council met as a committee to discuss possible legal action to remove him from office, Slocum fired off a letter of resignation.

Slocum charged that in a session with City Manager George Farrell, Building Inspector C. N. Currier and County Surveyor Fred Darby he had agreed to pay his share of a possession survey to establish properties in Laurelswood Addition.

He claimed the survey made by Darby wasn't a possession survey and "the only thing to come out of the survey was to cut out of my bedroom."

The irate lawyer claimed he hadn't applied for a permit for the patio when Currier broached the matter because "he told me I couldn't save my time because I wouldn't get it."

Slocum, Currier Differ

Slocum contended that according to law Currier must accept an applicant's word on property lines. Currier maintained he couldn't issue a permit if the proposed structure violated property line setback law.

The embittered former judge said that an accurate survey of the subdivision would show most of the houses improperly located. He claimed he has right to the property by adverse possession because it has been held and used openly for more than 10 years.

Warning to his subject, Slocum said he had tried to attend last Monday's council committee session and had sat in the council chamber for about an hour waiting for the members. Later, he learned the meeting had been held in Farrell's office, and that firing him had been discussed. "I have taken that worry out of my mind," he declared in referring to his resignation. "If this is the way things are to be handled I'm glad to be out," he added.

Jacklin Reads Letter

Mayor Jacklin interrupted to read a letter written in June by Currier to the council. In this, the building inspector had outlined his side of the question and stated that Slocum appeared to be in violation of city law and that Slocum had informed him (Slocum) didn't know where the property lines were.

At one point Slocum charged, "If it is required that I get down on my knees to that building inspector, I'll never do it."

Currier then took the floor to read two city ordinances which cover setbacks and building permits. Slocum's covered patio violated the setback law, he said, and pointed out that it is attached to the Slocum house.

"If it will ease any gastronomic disturbance, I will sever it," growled Slocum. "It will still be attached by the earth. I could build a moat, I guess."

Other comments and expressions of opinions during the session included:

Councilman Robert Harris: "The thing that bothers me is we have a city official who builds without a permit."

Councilman Ross Myers: "We have only tried to see the law was applied equally to all."

Slocum: "I have never refused to apply for a permit."

Councilman James Knudson: "We have a building inspector to keep things like your back bedroom from being over the line."

Neighbor Ed Tauscher: "The place has been improved. I'm perfectly satisfied."

Councilman William Adair: "How can we take any stand on this survey?"

Slocum: "I think someone surveyed that subdivision with a gallon jug."

Mayor Jacklin: "It has been ticked because the man involved was an employee of the city."

Inspector Betty Svarverud: "Is there any way we can get our city judge back?"

Little Rock Board Protests Hearing On Integration

ST. LOUIS (AP) — A hearing before three judges of a federal appeals court Wednesday on the Little Rock school integration dispute was protested by the Little Rock School Board today as a "summary proceeding."

Some of the principal parties to the litigation will not even be represented at the hearing, the school board said.

The hearing involves validity of a plan—already banned temporarily—for leasing of Little Rock's four public high school buildings for use as private, segregated institutions.

Directly at issue is an appeal by the National Assn. for the Advancement of Colored People from the refusal by Arkansas Dist. Judge John E. Miller to declare the leasing plan invalid. Judge Miller refused to accept jurisdiction and held a special three-judge court should decide the question.

It was on this point that the NAACP appealed to the U.S. Eighth Circuit Court of Appeals here.

Richard C. Butler, a school board attorney, said in a brief filed today that the Little Rock Private School Corp. should be classified as an indispensable party to the action. Judge Miller's court also should be represented, Butler said.

The occasion is an appearance of the U. S. Air Force Band from Washington, D. C. The musical organization will present two concerts Sunday in the Douglas County Fairgrounds community building.

Appearance of the band is being sponsored by the Roseburg Knights of Pythias Girls' Drum and Bugle Corps.

Proceeds from the program will be used by the girls to help defray expenses on a trip to the 1959 national Pythian convention at Denver, Colo.

The Air Force band will present a matinee and evening performance Sunday. The 30-piece band will also be accompanied by the Singing Sergeants.

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and better weapons so they can defend the islands with less troops.

This presumably was urged by U.S. Defense Secretary Neil McElroy in two conferences with the Nationalist President, Manuel Roxas, last week.

But local newspapers including semiofficial organs continued to denounce the idea of a cut in the offshore garrisons.

McElroy visited military installations in the Pescadore Islands today, between Formosa and the mainland, and then joined the U.S. 7th Fleet en route to Manila.

Nationalist officials continued to insist that the Communists would resume hostilities when it suits them. They contended that the Reds had extended their ceasefire for two weeks because they had lost the battle of Quemoy, and any reduction of the islands' garrisons would convert a Communist military defeat into a political victory.

Both the Communists and Nationalists continued to strengthen their installations in the Quemoy area.

Glide Logger Acquitted Of Charge Of Assault

A circuit court jury, after deliberating seven hours, found defendant Floyd Dean Smith innocent of a charge of assault and battery.

The 35-year-old logger who lives east of Glide had been indicted by the Grand Jury on Aug. 7 for assault on his brother-in-law, Loren Jackson, with a dangerous weapon.

The indictment alleged he slugged Jackson with a pipe on May 10 of this year.

Smith, in telling his story to the jury, said Jackson had first thrown a plumber's nipple at him in a "family beef."

The jury, in the court of Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly, took the case shortly before noon Monday, and returned with the "not guilty" verdict at 6:10 p.m.

The defendant was represented by court-appointed attorney, James Richmond.

Britain Appeals To Russia To Join Test Ban

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — Britain appealed to the Soviet Union today to join her and the United States in a year's suspension of nuclear weapons tests Oct. 31.

That is the day the Big Three begin Geneva talks on the subject.

British Minister of State Allan Noble also charged the Soviet government with presenting an ultimatum by threatening to go on with its tests unless the West agreed to an immediate unconditional cessation for all time.

Noble told the U.N. General Assembly's Political Committee: "We want the cessation of tests with real disarmament because only so will real security be achieved. They want us to agree now to renounce all nuclear weapons tests forever, whether or not there is ever any real disarmament."

Not Disarmament

"The cessation of nuclear weapons tests is not in itself disarmament. It will leave a number of powers to go on arming themselves with nuclear weapons as they please. The suspension of tests, however, may increase confidence and may help to bring about real disarmament."

Noble said that the Big Three were closest to some real agreement on the suspension of tests, which they are to discuss in Geneva. But he said it would be unrealistic to try to commit them to a particular course of action in advance.

"To facilitate the Geneva negotiations," he declared, "the United States and United Kingdom governments have offered to suspend their nuclear weapons tests for one year if the Soviet government will do the same."

Noble noted that a pending 17-nation resolution backed by Britain and the United States urged the three powers not to undertake further testing while they were negotiating.

Noble said the Soviet Union by pressing its own resolution for an immediate, unconditional test cessation, sought to "stampede the Assembly into a hasty and unrealistic declaration."

Fred Travis Succumbs At Vancouver, Wash.

Fred Travis, 73, resident of Roseburg for the past nine years, died Monday while visiting relatives at Vancouver, Wash.

He is survived by two sons, Ted and Harvey, both of Westport, Wash.; a daughter, Pauline of Aberdeen, Wash., and five grandchildren.

Travis was a member of the Roseburg Scottish Rite and Masonic Lodge and past president and life member of the Eagles.

Travis will be buried at Aberdeen where funeral services are pending.

Housewife First Hunting Casualty

GOLDENDALE, Wash. (AP) — A housewife who was out walking near her Klickitat County ranch home became the first fatality of the 1958 Washington hunting season Monday.

Mrs. Loretta Shelton, 32, was killed when struck in the head with a bullet believed fired from a deer rifle.

Held for questioning in the shooting was William E. Ingalls, 23, a Yakima coast guardsman home on leave. Ingalls told officers of finding the woman's body when he jumped over a log in pursuit of deer he had fired at.

Ingalls said he then ran to the Shelton ranch and notified the woman's husband, Joe, of the accident.

Sheriff E. C. Kaiser said Mrs. Ingalls was wearing a greenish-yellow sweater, with a red bandanna tucked into the waistband of her slacks.

She had apparently gone out to meet her husband and son who had been hunting, but they returned home without meeting her.

Integration Issue Switches From Schools To Church

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) — There were rumblings of a possible denominational split here today as the focal point of Little Rock's integration trouble switched from schools to churches.

About 300 persons formed a Council of Methodist Laymen Monday night with the announced intention of combating church integration. They indicated they would favor a split from the Methodist Church if it doesn't change its policy.

And a segregationist minister claimed a victory when a Southern Baptist group did not move to oust him from his ranks, as he had predicted it would.

Even as the city awaited another crucial federal court ruling from St. Louis Wednesday on the status of its closed high schools, there were indications that church segregation will play a bigger role in the ever-growing struggle here.

Fails In Effort

Mrs. L. C. Bates, Arkansas president of the National Assn. for the Advancement of Colored People, said she has tried to dissuade a Little Rock Negro from his campaign to integrate a white church.

But she said she was unable to get any assurance from Albert Hudson, 45, that he would give up his efforts.

Hudson and other Negroes have appeared at the Second Baptist Church for two consecutive Sundays. They were turned away the first time and on the second occasion left when asked to listen to the sermon over a speaker in the basement.

The Methodist Church's General Conference has taken a stand favoring racial integration since the Supreme Court's 1954 desegregation rulings.

As the Puaski County Baptist Assn. opened its annual meeting Monday night, the Rev. Wesley Pruden arrived predicting steps would be taken to eject him because of his strong stand against integration.

The predicted ejection move never came. Pruden is president of the pro-segregation Capital Citizens Council.

Eisenhower Joins Other Mourners In Final Tribute

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower joined hundreds of other mourners in a farewell tribute to Pope Pius XII today at a pontifical Requiem Mass in St. Matthew's Cathedral.

At the solemn rites in the crowded church were Cabinet members, other top government officials, members of Congress, and the diplomatic corps, together with richly robed members of the Roman Catholic hierarchy and scores of priests and nuns.

Eisenhower was accompanied by the three representatives he has designated to attend services for the Pope in Rome Sunday. They are Secretary of State, Dean Rusk; Mrs. Clare Boothe Luce, former ambassador to Italy; and John A. McCone, chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission.

The President escorted Mrs. Luce to a front-row pew on the left side of the aisle. A few feet away, just outside the sanctuary rail, was a symbolic catafalque, draped in black with a white cross and the dead Pope's coat of arms. On either side were three lighted candles.

The Pope was eulogized by Archbishop Patrick O'Boyle of Washington as a martyr for peace, a foremost leader in the fight against communism, and a great shepherd who gave his life for his flock.

On leaving, Eisenhower was escorted to his car by Archbishop O'Boyle. They chatted quietly on the sidewalk for a moment, and the President told the archbishop: "It was a very great honor."

Madagascar Proclaims Self Republic Under French Rule

TANANARIVE, Madagascar (AP) — The local assemblies of this vast French island proclaimed Madagascar a republic but decided that it would remain a member of the new French community.

The assemblies met in congress here in the capital.

The decision means that Madagascar—to be known hereafter as the Malagache Republic—will be self-governing for internal matters.

The supervising body to be formed for the French community will control foreign relations, defense, finances and certain judicial, educational and cultural matters.

No Surprise

The decision was no surprise. It came in the framework of Premier de Gaulle's far-reaching emancipation plan for the vast French colonial empire.

It was the second change in France's overseas possessions since de Gaulle loosened the bonds of empire. Guinea, on the west coast of Africa, voted overwhelmingly against the new French constitution and became an independent state.

Although Madagascar did not go that far, the proclamation of the republic was regarded as a momentous first step toward eventual complete independence.

Madagascar approved the new French constitution in the referendum Sept. 28 by a vote of 1,363,039 to 292,557.

The new constitution provides that all French overseas territories must choose their status before Feb. 5, four months after the promulgation of the constitution.

The territories which accepted the constitution—all except Guinea—have three choices: (1) integration with France as an overseas department, on an equal status with the departments of France itself; (2) continuing their present status of dependent territory, or (3) proclaiming a republic within the French community, as Madagascar did.

Although it became an autonomous republic, Madagascar will not have its own symbols of state. Its official flag will remain the French Tricolor and the official anthem "La Marseillaise."

Its five million inhabitants—less than 7,000 of them Europeans—will be officially known as "citizens of the French community."

Madagascar, the fourth largest island in the world, lies 240 miles off southeast Africa in the Indian Ocean and is slightly smaller than Texas.

Persons may enroll by attending the classes which meet at 7 p.m. in Roseburg High School. Classes starting tonight are basic radio, party foods and cake decorating, shorthand, English and basic Photography.

Wednesday night, industrial electronics and typing classes will start, and Thursday, advanced welding and Spanish. At least 12 persons must enroll in each class and if the minimum enrollment is not attained the class cannot continue, Kennedy added.

Students who enroll for a class which is not continued because the minimum enrollment is not reached are put on a waiting list until 12 people sign up for the class. Classes besides those listed will be offered throughout the year. Those in the planning stage are Constitution and government, public speaking, drawing and painting, automotive mechanics, body and fender and blueprint reading.

Sunny Skies And Mild Weather To Continue
