

Saudi Arabia Negotiating Spectacular New Oil Deal

Terms Can Jolt International Oil Industry

The deal now will be placed before the board of Standard Oil of Indiana. It would strike a new blow at the 50-50 concept of oil profit sharing in the Middle East. In addition, it would prescribe Saudi participation in operations and profits all the way to the consumer in an "integrated" company.

If Indiana Standard accepts the terms, now being offered on an all-or-nothing basis by Saudi Arabia, the giant Arabian American Oil Co. faces a difficult decision. Under its concession agreement it must have an opportunity to meet these terms. But in doing so it could increase heavy pressures upon its own organization.

The deal is being negotiated by Frank C. Hendryx, an American attorney retained by the Saudi Arabian government. If it is accepted, or if the terms are met, it then goes before the government for final approval. The company involved is Pan-American Petroleum Corp. This company is owned, through another affiliate, by National Standard. Pan-American already has breached the 50-50 pattern in non-Arab Iran. It concluded a deal with the National Iranian Oil Co. giving the government a half interest in a joint producing company. Thus, Iran gets half the profits as host government and half the producing company's profits. This became known as a 75-25 deal.

The 50-50 pattern also was broken in the Saudi peninsula in a Japanese 50-44 deal with Saudi Arabia and a 57-43 deal with Kuwait, both in the off-shore neutral zone.

The new concession would seem to go well beyond the other deals in according to a producing country's demands.

The exact Saudi share in the Pan-American deal would be difficult to assess now because of the ramifications of the industry. It obviously goes well beyond other Arab oil deals. But more importantly, it lays down a pattern of company-government relations which would exert increased psychological pressure on all Middle East oil companies to abandon the present mould of their operations.

At headquarters of Standard Oil Co. (Indiana) in Chicago, officials declined comment immediately.

Holmes Declares Hatfield 80 Per Cent Inefficient

Democratic Gov. Robert D. Holmes said Monday his Republican opponent, Secretary of State Mark Hatfield, is "80 per cent inefficient" in his office.

"This young man who wants my job," Holmes said, "hasn't much to do except inspect state buildings in his role as 'custodian'."

This apparently was a reference to Hatfield's charge that Holmes has not complied with the law by inspecting state institutions every 90 days. Hatfield said he has done so.

Holmes defended the record of his administration saying: "It took only 19 days for a special session of the Legislature that I called to cut tax and add 20 per cent to the basic school support fund."

Holmes told the Multnomah County Labor Council that Hatfield voted for a selective sales tax, that he was supported by private power groups, and that he had done nothing to support regional power development.

Forest Grove Chamber of Commerce said that Oregon citizens income was not keeping pace with that of neighboring states.

One of the reasons, Hatfield said, is the Holmes administration attitude toward business. He said the present administration "does not even encourage existing industries to stay, to say nothing of encouraging new payrolls to come to the state."

Hatfield also blamed the state's tax structure, which he said is not competitive with that of neighboring states.

Judge Schedules Another Hearing For Jim Elkins

PORTLAND (AP) — Circuit Judge Charles W. Redding Monday scheduled another hearing Oct. 23 on a move by Portland gambler Big Jim Elkins to have a burglary conspiracy indictment against him dismissed.

Walter H. Evans Jr., attorney for Elkins, said the case should have been handled by Atty. Gen. Robert Thornton because the governor ordered Thornton to handle the Portland vice investigation.

The indictment against Elkins and six others was returned by a grand jury under the direction of Multnomah County Dist. Atty. Leo Smith.

Judge Redding asked for a transcript of a doctor's testimony before the grand jury.

Evans questioned the physician's testimony, contending it might have violated the medical ethics of a patient relationship. The patient was Harry H. Huether, one of the six co-defendants with Elkins.

Judge Redding also ordered the defense to file a brief on the case by Oct. 20.

Upper Crust Folk Demanding Muzzle Of Wolf Whistler

LONDON (AP) — The upper crust folk of Esher Park Avenue are demanding a legal muzzle for the Cockney esgar bird that whistles girls and sings like a drunken sailor.

The bird is an Indian mynah, one of the more articulate members of the starling family. It lives in a superheated aviary at one of the biggest houses on the respectable, tree-lined avenue.

Its raucous repertoire—rendered largely in Cockney accents picked up from a friendly garbage man—sends outrage and shudders through the sedate, suburban neighborhood.

Wolf whistling seems to bore the mynah fairly quickly. But then it launches into the song "All the Nice Girls Love a Sailor" in a voice like that of a matelot lurching from the grog shop.

When this rolls, the bird can give a passable imitation of suddenly screeching car brakes, throwing scares into many a passer-by.

The mynah's owner, John Luttmer, was summoned to court Monday, accused of keeping a pet that causes "a serious nuisance."

Buknessman Clifford Blackmore complained that he can hear the bird over his garden hedge from dawn till dusk. On summer evenings he has trouble getting the children to sleep and finds it unbearable to sit out in his garden.

Luttmer, a 49-year-old potato importer, stoutly maintained that his pet is "pretty and amusing."

The case was adjourned for the weekend.

Sen. Morse Says He Won't Let Up On His Criticism

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore) said he will not let up on his criticism of Dulles-Eisenhower Far Eastern policy.

Morse, a member of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, forewarned the committee chairman, Sen. Theodore F. Green (D-R.I.): "News reports reaching me are to the effect that Secretary Dulles yesterday urged that you try to persuade Democrats to confine to discussion with the President and Department of State their differences with the administration Chinese policy and not debate it in public."

"I wish to assure you that I shall continue to criticize the Eisenhower-Dulles foreign policy on the public platform because it is a matter the American people are entitled to have discussed freely and openly."

Morse urged Green to lead the Senate in debate on the Far Eastern policy.

Green said after his talk with Dulles only that the two agreed it would be "a serious mistake on the part of the Chinese Communists to misconstrue Democratic discussion as a sign of weakness."

Widow Admits Embezzlement

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A war widow admits embezzling \$54,000 from a department store to help support her four children and pay medical expenses.

The medical care apparently resulted at least partly from the embezzling.

"I got ulcers worrying about it," Police Inspector Gil Dowd quoted Mrs. Flora Lopez as saying.

Dowd said Mrs. Lopez, 48, had signed an admission and told him the reasons she took the money from the City of Paris store.

She was a \$250 a month cashier and wrapper, whose Filipino husband, Joaquin, was killed by American bombs during World War II near Baguio in the Philippines. As a result she had been getting \$30 a month from the U.S. government.

Her statement said she had taken \$60 a day during the past year and from \$30 and \$40 daily during the three previous years, Dowd said.
