

Bacillary Dysentery Cases Given Study In Grant County

PORTLAND (AP)—The state Board of Health's investigation into a series of cases of bacillary dysentery in Grant County is continuing.

No conclusions have been reached on the source of the outbreak.

A week ago Dr. Samuel B. Osgood, state epidemiologist, went to Grant County to open an on-scene investigation.

Osgood said today that field workers for the board, as well as local medical representatives in Grant County, still are trying to find the source of infection.

Several leads have been checked, he said, but no conclusions reached.

Osgood said the outbreak now is of special concern because many deer hunters from around the state are in the county. If they should come in contact with the contamination source, they might take the disease home with them, he said.

The board's laboratory has confirmed presence of the same type of germ in 12 cases in Grant County. It is the same type as that responsible for the death of a girl in Yamhill County last month.

That case, however, was confined to a single family, a board spokesman said. The Grant County outbreak caused concern because the disease occurred in several parts of the county.

It is usual for a few cases of the disease to occur each year in Oregon, the board spokesman said. It usually is not fatal.

Flooding River Chases Thousands From Rio Homes

BROWNSVILLE, Tex. (AP)—The flooding Rio Grande teamed up with heavy downpours to chase thousands from their homes on both sides of the border river.

More rains upstream on the Mexican side threatened even higher water.

Heavy releases of water were made from Falcon Reservoir, about 150 miles upstream, because the flood pool was full and more water was headed downstream.

The releases combined with downpours and inflows from Mexico to spread flooding and misery from the huge reservoir to the Gulf.

At El Paso, Tex., heavy rains of up to 5 inches flooded streets and houses, closed schools and sent some 120 persons to temporary shelters.

The Mexican city of Carmago was deserted except for police and army officials. The entire population, estimated at more than 5,000, sought higher ground when the Rio San Juan backed into streets and houses.

Penitas and Abilene, two small American villages south of Mission, were ordered evacuated as a precaution.

No loss of life was reported.

Another Atomic Shot Set Off In Yucca Flat

ATOMIC TEST SITE, Nev. (AP)—Another nuclear shot in the current test series was fired today from a balloon suspended 500 feet over Yucca Flat.

This was the first time three atomic devices have been detonated here within 24 hours.

The Atomic Energy Commission described the test as nominal, below one kiloton.

The blast was not seen nor felt in nearby Las Vegas.

The biggest tunnel shot ever fired here—but a baby as nuclear blasts go—jagged the ground two miles away Wednesday night.

Magnesium flares dropped from an Air Force plane illuminated the mesa as the second atomic blast of the day went off at 10 o'clock Wednesday night in a chamber 30 feet underground. The explosion was the seventh full-scale detonation and the second full-scale underground shot of the current test series.

The power yield was described as below one kiloton. A kiloton is the equivalent of 1,000 tons of TNT.

A device of less than one kiloton was fired Wednesday morning from atop a 50-foot wooden tower. Perfection of small battlefield weapons is one aim of the test series.

Communist Planes Fly Over Island

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP)—Four Communist planes flew over the tiny Wuchiu islands today, raising speculation on Formosa that the Reds might try to seize those Nationalist outposts midway between Quemoy and Matsu to offset their failure to invade Quemoy.

The Wuchiu islands in the Formosa Strait 15 miles from the mainland 80 miles from Formosa. One of the two islands, Wuchiu, is 128 acres, and the other, Little Wuchiu, is 37.6 acres.

The Chinese Nationalists use them as a lookout post.

Nationalist Defense Ministry said four Red planes circled over the Wuchiu for 26 minutes in midmorning, then returned to the mainland.

Observers on Formosa thought the Reds might calculate they could capture the islands with relative ease, then trumpet their victory as the first step toward their long-promised capture of Formosa.

The Nationalists have kept quiet about their defenses on the Wuchiu. There is no reason to believe U.S. forces would intervene in fighting there.

Navy Missilen Piece Together Shattered Rocket

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP)—Navy missilen today pieced together the shattered fragments of the second Polaris experimental rocket to explode in the last three weeks.

The 25-foot rocket was blown apart Wednesday after the second stage suddenly shot aloft a split second before launching and zigzagged over the Cape in a series of cartwheel turns.

On Sept. 24, its predecessor, was destroyed by the range safety officer's first shot over the Cape when it jerked out of control.

The upper section of the latest missile, named AX2, impacted in an isolated field on the Cape, igniting a brush fire that roared through a one-mile area for several hours. Hordes of rattlesnakes crawled onto a nearby road to escape the flames.

The Polaris is the Navy's 1,500-mile intermediate range ballistic missile designed for launching from nuclear submarines beneath the surface.

Three Robbers Escape With \$84,000 Payroll

TOLEDO, Ohio (AP)—Three men, timing their crime perfectly just after a delivery by a Brinks armored truck, robbed the cashier of the Buckeye Brewing Co. of \$84,000 and escaped in a car with approximately \$84,000 in payroll money.

Tipped on the license plates on the car, police traced it to a residence here and surrounded the house. But it appeared later that the plates used had been stolen from another auto.

Richard (Red) Smith, general manager of the brewery, said one of the men was wearing a suit and the other two were in work clothes when the Brinks guards handed a bag containing money to the cashier, Tony Carlos.

An armed accomplice was at the door of the apartment. The two robbers fled to a car which a third accomplice had kept running outside.

Eisenhower Gives Nixon Go-Ahead On Policy Talks

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower today gave Vice President Nixon the go-ahead to go on answering Democratic attacks on administration foreign policy.

Eisenhower did so in a telegram to the vice president, now campaigning on the West Coast.

He told Nixon he thinks a statement Wednesday by Secretary of State Dulles on the question of injecting foreign policy into the campaign "should clear the atmosphere, particularly in pointing out that there is no real difference between the two of you."

Nixon has been whacking back at Democratic critics of administration foreign policy, while Dulles appeared to be critical of some of the vice president's language and then later to be backtracking on the criticism.

There's A Difference

Eisenhower himself told a news conference Wednesday that foreign policy should be left out of partisan political debate. At the same time he said there is a difference between foreign policy as such and the day-to-day operations carrying it out, so that he could not deny debate on specific points.

Restating that view in his telegram to Nixon, Eisenhower said the basic elements of foreign policy, with rare exceptions, should not and do not lend themselves to political argument. But he said, the matter of administrative operation of foreign policy has been challenged both by Republicans in the past and recently by some of their political opponents.

Referring to Dulles, Eisenhower added, "I pointed out, these need to be answered when ever they occur. Questions and criticism have involved Lebanon, our relationship with Nationalist China, the defense of Quemoy

Private Donations Will Be Accepted For Clinton School

CLINTON, Tenn. (AP)—The Anderson County School Board, given little encouragement about private donations to help rebuild bombed Clinton High School.

The board voted Wednesday to accept \$562 in private donations from all parts of the nation and to take up columnist Drew Pearson's suggestion for a "Committee on the Clinton School House."

Pearson said his committee, which will be incorporated, will seek financial and other assistance for the repair job.

The School Board also instructed Supt. James A. Newman to prepare papers necessary to get the only kind of federal aid available to it. Engineers have estimated \$250,000 will be needed to repair the damage caused to the school's interior by three pre-dawn dynamite blasts Oct. 5.

President Eisenhower said at Wednesday's news conference that federal aid is available only under existing laws providing funds for areas heavily populated with federal workers. Many Clinton residents work at atomic installations in nearby Oak Ridge.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Higher than seasonal temperatures are likely for most of the nation during the next 30 days.

The Weather Bureau, in its 30-day outlook today, said exceptions will be in the areas east of the Appalachians, along the Gulf Coast and in the Pacific Northwest.

The prediction:

"The Weather Bureau's 30-day outlook for the period from mid-October to mid-November calls for temperatures to average above seasonal normals over most of the nation, except for near to below normal east of the Appalachians, along the Gulf Coast, and also in the Pacific Northwest."

There are some indications of a sharp break in the prevailing warm regime, perhaps during the first half of November, but it is too early to specify the nature of the new weather pattern.

"Precipitation is predicted to be subnormal over most areas, except for near to above normal in the western quarter of the country and also along the Gulf Coast."

Funeral Masses Held For Pope

VATICAN CITY (AP)—Funeral masses were celebrated today for Pope Pius XII in St. Peter's Basilica and at a chapel near the pontiff's tomb in the grotto of the great church.

Bricklayers and carpenters built barriers to isolate the Sistine Chapel and adjoining Vatican buildings to be occupied by the College of Cardinals during the conclave to elect his successor.

The workmen were arranging living quarters for the cardinals, who cannot leave the conclave area from the time they enter Oct. 25 until a new Pope is elected.

Pope Pius XII was elected in a day. This time the Vatican is taking no chances, preparing for a prolonged meeting. Vans are moving in beds, and kitchens are being set up in Vatican courtyards.

Other workmen in St. Peter's are putting up stands for final week-end funeral services for Pius XII.

Homemade Bomb Blasts Near Witnesses Meeting

BOSTON (AP)—A homemade bomb exploded near a meeting place of the Jehovah's Witnesses religious sect Wednesday night.

The meeting of the group at the home of Mrs. Agnes Haroutinian, about 45, had adjourned about an hour before the explosion.

No one was injured, but the blast blew out about 30 windows in nearby tenements and shot pieces of the bomb into walls of several buildings.

Police refused to comment on the possibility the explosion was in any way connected with the recent bombings of synagogues in Peoria, Ill., and Atlanta, Ga.

R. E. Morgan Places High In Horse Judging Course

R. E. Morgan, Roseburg, placed among the top 10 scorers in a light horse judging short course at Oregon State College last weekend.

He was one of nine persons from Douglas County who attended the two-day course. Others included: A. J. Farenbaugh, Katherine Richmond and Betty Murray, all of Roseburg; Mr. and Mrs. Paul B. Bitt, Doreen and Lee Albert, and Gertrude and Allen Sherlock, Glendale. One hundred thirty-two persons from over the state were enrolled.

Glendale School Board Decides On Application

Court Rejects Idea School Can't Hold Broadcast License

WASHINGTON (AP)—The U.S. Court of Appeals rejected today a contention that a Jesuit educational institution is ineligible to hold a broadcast license.

The ruling affirmed the award of a license to Loyola University in New Orleans for a Channel 4 television station.

The legal right of Loyola to hold a broadcast license was challenged by James A. Noe & Co., an unsuccessful applicant, and by a predominantly Protestant organization—Protestants and Other Americans United for Separation of Church and State. The group, not a party to the action itself, filed a friend-of-the-court brief urging the court to overturn the award, made by the Federal Communications Commission.

The Times-Picayune Publishing Co. also was an original applicant for the Channel 4 permit. The court said The Times-Picayune had withdrawn its appeal under an understanding with the Justice Department "in connection with an antitrust problem."

The Noe Co., headed by James A. Noe, a former governor of Louisiana, contended that Loyola by reason of its connection with the Society of Jesus is a representative of an alien within the meaning of the Communications Act, a section of that law makes foreign control of an American broadcasting station illegal.

Speaking for a unanimous three-judge court, Judge George T. Washington said the university is legally and financially autonomous and does not receive support from the Society of Jesus in a monetary way.

"The relationship of Loyola to the Society of Jesus hardly seemed to endanger our national security," Washington wrote.

Lending Library (Not Competitive) Feature Of Fair

The Douglas County Fair has branched out into a new field.

Dick Turley, fair manager, announced today that the fair has begun operation of a lending library. But the move doesn't mean the fair is in competition with the Douglas County Library.

Articles to be loaned aren't books. They're prairie dogs, skunks (deodorized), Peruvian guinea pigs and other critters—all alive and frisky.

Turley stressed that animals will be loaned to schools and other institutions only—at least for the present. In most cases, he added, cages to hold the animals will be included in the loan.

Here are the animals Turley said are available under the new "library" system:

Three raccoons, four prairie dogs, six Peruvian guinea pigs, two squirrel monkeys, two skunks, one red fox, one wood chuck, one spider monkey and one white rat.

Turley said teachers interested in borrowing animals should contact him at Box 730, Roseburg.

State Expected To Have Surplus For Biennium

SALEM (AP)—The state Tax Commission and State Finance Department reported Wednesday that the 1959 Legislature in sight to sustain a budget of \$285 to \$310 million dollars in the 1959-61 biennium.

The budget for the current biennium is \$278 million dollars.

The state, the report said, will have a surplus of about \$3 million dollars on hand at the start of the biennium, next July 1.

This surplus is added to estimated revenues for the biennium to get the figure of \$285 to \$310 million.

"It appears resources may be available to meet the minimum requirements of the next biennium," the two departments said.

The estimate is required by law before each general election.

Knowland Charges Political Machine In Brown Campaign

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Sen. William F. Knowland, GOP candidate for governor, sought Wednesday night to link Democratic National Committeeman Paul Ziffren of Los Angeles with a dead Chicago gangster and "the machine political boss" of the Illinois city.

The Senate minority leader then told a Republican rally that Ziffren is "one of the chief supporters" of Alty. Gen. Edmund G. Brown's "Campaign to capture the governorship of California and with it the control of the executive structure of our state government."

Knowland charged Ziffren is the "political architect behind my opponent for governor," Democrat Brown. He cited testimony from the Kefauver committee crime report indicating Ziffren had business dealings with Alex Louis Greenberg, slain in Chicago Dec. 8, 1935.

In Los Angeles, Ziffren told the San Francisco Chronicle by telephone, "This sounds to me like another Joe Kamp pamphlet of absurdities."

"I've never believed in talking about dead men and I don't propose to engage the Knowland-Kamp campaign on such a ghoul level," he said.

Joseph Kamp is a right-wing pamphlet writer of Connecticut. Some of his leaflets were distributed by Knowland's wife, Helen. Mrs. Knowland said she did not know Kamp's background, and her husband ordered use of the pamphlets discontinued.

The Senate minority leader asserted also that Ziffren was a partner in the law firm of Jake Arvey of Chicago—"the same Arvey who is the machine political boss of Chicago and a business affiliate of Alex Louis Greenberg."
