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Karami's Cabinet Wins Unanimous Confidence Vote

BEIRUT (AP) — Premier Rashid Karami's coalition cabinet won a unanimous vote of confidence in Parliament today on a promise to maintain Lebanon as an "independent sovereign Arab state."

Karami's four-man cabinet — a compromise which ended the five-month crisis — was approved 50-0. Sixteen deputies were absent.

The Karami cabinet called a government of "national rescue." He pledged the government to erase misunderstanding among citizens.

"The citizen must feel that his ruler is unbiased, that his judge is impartial and that his government official is above suspicion," Karami told Parliament.

Karami said that in both domestic and foreign policy his government will follow the line broadly laid down by President Fuad Chehab in his inauguration speech Sept. 23. Chehab called for friendship with Arab states and withdrawal of U. S. forces.

The last of the U. S. forces called in last summer by President Camille Chamoun are expected to be gone by the end of the month. Chamoun then was the target of a rebellion led by Karami and others who objected to his pro-Western course.

Beirut clearly was approaching normal again after five months of rebellion.

The Karami government is half Moslem and half Christian. Karami himself is Moslem. Deputy Premier Pierre Gemayel and Minister of Interior Raymond Edde are Christian.

Drain Continues Work On Reservoir Project

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reservoir project was speeded by a unique fund-raising plan devised by the city fathers.

Some \$15,000 was raised through sale of timber on the Bear Creek watershed and additional money was obtained through a bank loan to be paid from city income.

A long-lasting increase in taxes and possible delay in beginning construction of the reservoir would have resulted had the usual plan of floating a bond issue been followed.

Several unforeseen problems were encountered which have raised the estimate of cost from the original estimate of \$35,000 to something just under \$50,000.

Uncharted Pipe Hit

One such complication came about when the city pipeline was found to run directly through the site of the new reservoir, although charts and plans had showed the pipeline to be in a different location. Two days were required to install a temporary line around the excavation.

Meanwhile, the city's "do-it-yourself" sewer system nears completion and the street beautification project is progressing at a high clip, said Mrs. Bush. Plans are under way to complete another block of sidewalk installation and shrub planting before winter weather begins.

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200 High School Students Expected Here For Session

An estimated 200 high school students from six Southern Oregon counties will stream into Roseburg Sunday night and Monday morning for a student council workshop.

Roseburg Student Body President Ted Sohn says 25 schools have indicated they are sending representatives to the Region 5 workshop slated for the entire day Monday, counties from which they will come are Klamath, Josephine, Jackson, Coos and Curry, as well as Douglas, Roseburg will be the host school.

The purpose of the workshop is to give the members of student councils an opportunity to exchange ideas and problems, Sohn said. The theme is "Gone Far, Going Further." It refers to aims of student participation in an active student council program.

The workshop will be climaxed Monday evening at 7 by a banquet at the Gold Room of the Umpqua Hotel at which Mark Hatfield, secretary of state and gubernatorial candidate, will speak.

Two highlights during the workshop will be student reports on national meetings during the summer. Sam Young, student president of Reedsport High School, will report on his attendance at the student burghesses conference in Williamsburg, Va. And in the afternoon, reports by three other young people will deal with the National Assn. of Student Councils Conference in Ferguson, Mo. The three who attended the national conference from this district are Noralou Preston of Riddle, Lawrence Gary of Myrtle Point and Jim Irwin of Rogue River.

Registration for the workshop starts Sunday afternoon and continues from 8:30 to 9:15 Monday morning at the Roseburg First Methodist Church. Most of the sessions will take place in the church's education building.

After a day of work, the students will be invited to a free time and recreation period from 4:30 to 6:30 p.m. at Central Junior High School.

Sohn is president of the Region 5 council. John Nordling of Canbyville is vice president.

TV Program '21' Goes Off The Air

NEW YORK (AP) — The NBC television quiz show "21" was discontinued after Thursday night's performance, a victim of rigging charges by former contestants on several TV quiz programs.

It thus joined two other big-money giveaway programs in oblivion — "Dotto" and "The \$64,000 Challenge."

A spokesman for Pharmaceutical Inc., sponsor of "21," said the show's viewer rating had been falling steadily in the last five weeks. He said the company had concluded that the widespread quiz show probe was the reason for the waning interest.

Pharmaceuticals, Inc. said it will replace "21" with Concentration, an audience participation show that awards mostly merchandise prizes. The program—8:30 to 9 p.m., New York time, Thursday—will have "21's" emcee, Jack Barry.

Concentration also will continue with its present daytime show, 11:30 a.m. to 12 noon, Monday through Friday. Hugh Downs will continue to emcee the daytime program.

Charles Van Doren first brought fame to "21" by winning \$129,000. He was defeated by Elfrida von Nardoff, who went on to win \$220,500, making her top money winner for any TV quiz program.

Both Van Doren and Miss von Nardoff have strongly denied any knowledge of answer-rigging or coaching on "21" as have a number of other former contestants.

Sutherland Man Faces Contributing Charge

Oscar Melton, 35-year-old Sutherland box factory worker, was booked Thursday night in county jail on a charge of contributing to the delinquency of a minor.

He was held to answer Thursday by Ward Watson, Sutherland justice of the peace. Bail was set at \$1,000.

Melton is alleged to have been involved with one or more young boys. He was picked up Thursday by a sheriff's deputy, and jailed after his hearing in lieu of the bond.

State Policeman Fired From Job By Trial Board

PORTLAND — Robert H. Wampler, state policeman who was dismissed Thursday on an insubordination charge, said today he will appeal to the state circuit court.

A three-man state police trial board ordered Wampler's dismissal after a hearing in which Wampler, a private first class in the Milwaukee state police office, was accused of "insubordination and conduct unbecoming a member of the department."

The trial board said Wampler violated state police regulations against discussion of grievances with anyone but superior officers and forbidding policemen from being disrespectful to their commanding officers.

SALEM (AP)—Pvt. Robert H. Wampler was fired from the Oregon state police today for "insubordination and conduct unbecoming a member of the department."

He was dismissed, effective today, by the state police trial board which heard his case Tuesday and Wednesday.

The trial board said that Wampler violated state police department rules forbidding discussion of grievances with anyone but superior officers, and forbidding officers from being disrespectful to their commanding officers.

Further Claims

The board continued that Wampler on several occasions spoke critically of Superintendent H. G. Maizon "did solicit other members to join with him in his efforts to bring about changes in the management of the department and its policies, and by these actions did cause unrest and dissension among the membership to the serious impairment of the service."

in self defense, and that the policeman, warned of possible trouble, "apparently acted first."

Other witnesses said on the stand that Beecroft had threatened the police chief before leaving for his house the night of the incident, saying he was going to "mop up the town with Criminal."

One officer said he phoned the chief immediately afterward and told him the trio was on their way to see him, and to expect trouble.

Sutherland officers also told the jury that Beecroft and his two companions tried to get a fourth member of their party out of jail. Police told them he would be released the following morning, but that the chief was the only one who could authorize the release.

Treated At Hospital

He turned himself in at a Roseburg hospital for treatment of tear gas burns about the face and four cuts on his head which required stitching. Beecroft was hospitalized six days, according to testimony.

Avery W. Thompson, district attorney and prosecutor for the state, emphasized the size of Beecroft's fists, in summing up his arguments before the jury he said, "I certainly hate to be hit by one of them, wouldn't you?"

State Policemen's foe, Rep. Groener, Is Arrested, Fined

WOODBURN (AP)—State Rep. Richard E. Groener (D-Milwaukee), militant foe of the Oregon State Police high command, was convicted and fined \$25 Thursday for violating the basic speed law.

The fine was imposed by Justice of the Peace Irving Brown. Groener said he would appeal to the district court.

Groener was arrested by a state police officer at Brooks. He was charged with driving 65 miles an hour in a 35-mile zone on Pacific Highway East.

Groener has demanded the ouster of State Police Supt. H.G. Maizon.

Gov. Robert D. Holmes has stood by Maizon, calling him one of the best police officers in the country.

The State Department of Motor Vehicles said Groener has been arrested seven times for traffic violations, and was convicted each time.

Three of the convictions were for speeding, one having been in Feb. 1954, and another last March. He also has 13 accidents listed against his record.

Groener claims the state police are persecuting him by arresting him.

Officials of the Department of Motor Vehicles said they expect to interview Groener about his record. It could lead to suspension of his driver's license, they said.

Makeshift Bomb Explodes Killing Bearer At Airport

WICHITA, Kan. (AP)—An aircraft tool designer who said he had just found a bomb was blown to death in a terrific explosion as he carried a mysterious package through Wichita's multi-million dollar municipal airport today.

Police Chief Eugene Pord identified him as Forrest Don McCusick, a tool designer in the engineering department of the Douglas Aircraft Co., plant at Tulsa, Okla.

He had flown to Wichita from Kansas City on a Braniff airlines plane after a flight Thursday night to Kansas City from Phoenix, Ariz.

"I just talked to that man," sobbed Mrs. Joann Embree, 26-year-old clerk at a car rental stand in the airport. "He said he had found a bomb and I didn't believe him. . . I told him to take it to the manager's office. Oh, my God, oh my God."

Mrs. Embree told police the man told her seconds before the blast he had found a bomb in a telephone booth nearby.

Nixon Maintains U. S. Policy Works; There Is Peace

SALT LAKE CITY — Vice President Richard M. Nixon says the answer to critics of administration foreign policy is this: the policy works — there is peace.

There had been some question as to whether President Eisenhower and Secretary of State John Foster Dulles wanted foreign policy debated in the campaign.

But the President told Nixon Thursday he could answer any Democratic charges against the policy. And Nixon told a press conference here that foreign policy was not only a legitimate campaign issue, but a primary one.

He said U.S. policy in Lebanon and Formosa was one of the most effective issues for the Republicans, though he did concede that some Democrats also favored American action on those spots.

At a rally Thursday night he said the answer to critics of both domestic and foreign administration policies was simply to point out that there is peace and economic progress.

Nixon also outlined the role he believes Cabinet members should fill in the campaign. He praised Agriculture Secretary Ezra Taft Benson of Utah as "a fighter for the principles and policies in which he believes."

"If all the members of the President's Cabinet will in the last three weeks of this campaign fight as effectively and as articulately for their policies as he has fought for his, hundreds of thousands of votes will be shifted from the Democratic to Republican candidates in key House and Senate races," he said.

Wilbur Merlich Heads Douglas Co. School Board Assn.

Wilbur Merlich of Sutherland was elected to a two-year term as president of the Douglas County School Board Assn. at the organization's annual fall meeting Thursday night at Riddle.

The new president, who is serving his first term as a member of the Sutherland School Board, replaces Eugene H. Fisher of Elkton. Gilbert Weaver, a Myrtle Creek School Board member, was elected vice president, and County School Supt. Kenneth F. Barnburg was re-elected secretary.

Seventy-four school board members and school administrators from throughout the county attended the meeting. Dr. Elmo Stevenson, president of Southern Oregon College at Ashland, spoke on "Factors that will affect public education and prognosis of their effect upon education."

Meeting Places Set

Reedsport was set as the location for the association's spring meeting and Sutherland for the fall meeting. No dates were established for either meeting.

The association went on record Thursday night as opposing diversion from O & C counties any O & C funds. They are also opposing the consideration of any O & C funds in the distribution of the basic school support fund.

The Douglas County School Board Assn. took a leading part in making recommendations under the resolution and many of the county's recommendations are now law, Fisher said. He also pointed out that the county association has the best participation of any association in the state.

School board members from as far as Gardiner attended the Thursday night meeting. Among guests present was Mrs. Casey Morgan, county PTA president.

Last Survivors Rescued From Crashed Plane

AUCKLAND, New Zealand (AP)—The last three survivors of a U.S. Globemaster crash in the Antarctic were rescued by helicopter today.

U.S. deep freeze headquarters at Christchurch reported the men were flown to McMurdo Sound.

Four others were rescued by helicopter earlier during a break in the bad weather that hampered ground rescue. The plane crashed near Cape Hallett Thursday, killing six airmen.

Earlier today a ground party got within four miles of the crash scene but had to turn back and detour around an impassable ice field.

The three men had huddled in the tail of the four engine plane. They were in good condition.

Pan American Jet Flights Started

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP)—Pan American World Airways inaugurated American transatlantic jet passenger service today with a Baltimore-Brussels flight that averaged about 540 miles per hour.

The Boeing 707 jet airliner with its crew and 39 guest passengers landed here at 6:15 a.m. (2:15 a.m. EST), completing a 3,910-mile flight in 7 hours 15 minutes flying time.

Before its takeoff from Baltimore Thursday night, the 165-passenger plane was christened Jet Clipper America by Mrs. Dwight D. Eisenhower in a Washington ceremony.

The 707 has a rated cruising speed of 575 miles an hour, and Pan American officials had hoped the trip would take only about 6 hours 15 minutes. Local officials of the airline requested a later landing so the official greeters would not have to get up so early.

Plans Regular Service

Pan American plans to inaugurate regular transatlantic jet service Oct. 26 and to begin daily service Nov. 17.

Basil L. Walters, executive editor of the Chicago Daily News, commented: "It was amazing to notice how easily the plane handles. We could hardly feel the takeoff and landing, and once in the air everything is so quiet on board. It is a great improvement over piston engine flying."

The passengers will stay here until Sunday.

LOS ANGELES HOTTER

LOS ANGELES (AP) — It was hotter than Hell here Thursday. Hell is a usually simmering desert community about 175 miles east of here.

The high temperature in Hell was a mere 97. In Los Angeles it was 104—the hottest Oct. 16 on record.

Sec. Dulles Plans Formosa Visit To Talk With Chiang

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of State Dulles will fly to Formosa in the next few days for consultation with President Chiang Kai-shek.

The State Department in announcing this today said only that Dulles will fly to Taipei "in the near future." Informants said Dulles will fly by special Air Force plane from Rome Sunday after he attends memorial services for the late Pope Pius XII.

Other sources had disclosed the plan in outline just before the official announcement.

The State Department said Dulles' talks with Chiang will be "in accordance with Article IV of the Mutual Defense Treaty between the U. S. and Nationalist China." It said Nationalist China had invited the secretary of state.

The pact, under which the United States pledges to help defend Formosa against outside attack, provides that foreign ministers of both sides will "consult together from time to time" about defense problems.

Dulles' decision to fly to Formosa coincides with mounting belief within the administration that the present ceasefire around Quemoy may drift into a prolonged truce.

Top administration officials are reported eager to reach some firm understanding with Chiang about future defense operations before the truce officially ends.

had been made to hurt the little girl. She wasn't harmed. The Welfare department later came and got her," the doctor said.

Police said the murder weapon apparently was a .30-30 caliber rifle that was found propped against a living room wall, muzzle down. It was about 10 feet from the bodies in the kitchen.

Only two shell casings were found. Both were under Nickel's body.

Preliminary examinations disclosed that Miss Johnson had been shot once in the breast. Nickels was shot in the chest. His wife also had been hit once, in the shoulder, with the bullet coming out in the chest.

The interior of the white cabin, where Conrad lived alone, was torn up, as if there had been a violent argument.

In addition, police said the cabin was littered with dirt, and paper was peeling from the walls.

It was from the cabin that neighbor children at play heard four shots echo Thursday night.

They at first paid little attention, but later ran screaming when they saw Conrad crawling bleeding down the slope in the gloom for help.
