Symbolic Coffin Of Pope Returned For Requiem Mass

VATICAN CITY (AP) — The symbolic empty coffin of Pope Pius XII was returned today to the center of St. Peter's Basilica for a Requiem Mass beginning the last three days of mourning.

The coffin had been in the Chapel of the Choir since the late pontiff was buried Monday in the grottoes beneath the basilica. It was moved from the chapel at one side of the huge church to a position before the Altar of the Cathedral Chair.

Marcello Cardinal Mimmi celebrated the Mass. He was assisted by four other cardinals—Gregory Peter Agagianian, Angelo Roncalli, Joseph Wendel, and James Francis McIntyre, the latter the archbishop of Los Angeles.

The nine-day mourning will end Sunday when U.S. Secretary of State Dulles and other representatives of foreign governments will attend the Requiem Mass.

Dulles is scheduled to fly into Rome Saturday. Unconfirmed reports circulated in the Vatican that he might hurry to St. Peter's to attend the 10 a.m. Mass Saturday in a private capacity.

In London, flags were at half-staff on public buildings as the official Solemn Requiem Mass for the Pope was celebrated at Westminster Cathedral. Queen Elizabeth was represented by the Duke of Norfolk, Britain's Earl Marshal and premier duke, who is one of the country's leading Catholic laymen.

Republican And Democrat Chairmen Express Opposite Views On Foreign Policy

CHICAGO (AP) — The Republican and Democratic national chairmen expressed opposite views Thursday night on foreign policy being an issue in the 1958 political campaign.

GOP Chairman Meade ALCORN said the Democrats have injected foreign policy into the campaign when it should not be there.

Paul M. Butler, Democratic national chairman, said the Republicans are responsible for it being an issue because they are campaigning on the issue of peace in which foreign policy is a prime consideration.

Campaign Debate

The two chairmen made their remarks in a question and answer period after their fourth 1958 campaign debate at a dinner meeting of the Radio and Television News Directors Assn.

ALCORN earlier had said preservation of the peace is "the great overriding issue" of the campaign.

Butler said the GOP has campaigned on the foreign policy issue in every election, and now the party does not like it because the Democrats are bringing it up.

"It may be that we shall have to devise some current public subsidy for railroads, just as many of the railroads' rivals rely on public expenditures."

"One way is to promote and support undertakings like the Portland Zoo Railway. A child who is a railroad fan may grow up to ship a lot of tonnage."

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Federal Judge McCulloch Resigns Because Of Health

PORTLAND (AP) — Federal District Judge Claude McCulloch, who has been absent from the bench about a year, has sent in his resignation, the Oregon Journal reported today.

The newspaper said its Washington correspondent had learned McCulloch's resignation will become effective Jan. 31.

The resignation cites age and poor health for McCulloch's failure to remain active on the bench, the dispatch said, adding that McCulloch asked to be placed on retirement.

The dispatch also said McCulloch will give up his position as chief judge of the Oregon district within 10 days.

Judge Gus Solomon would succeed as chief judge.

Unemployed Man Admits Raping Several Women

SHELTON, Wash. (AP) — A young unemployed meatcutter has confessed to raping women in Portland and in eight counties in Washington, Jug Potter, Mason County sheriff, said Thursday.

George Templeton, 25, of Renton was charged here with the rape of a Shelton woman. Potter said the man also signed a statement admitting other attacks on women in Lewis, Cowlitz, Grays Harbor, King, Yakima, Pierce and Snohomish counties in recent weeks as well as two other assaults in Portland last week.

Templeton also admitted the burglary of an Everett grocery store last Friday, Potter said.

Templeton was arrested in Renton Saturday and brought here. He is being held on \$50,000 bail.

Bryon McClanahan, Mason County prosecutor, said Templeton was to be arraigned in superior court Friday on charges of burglary, assault and rape.

Rita Hayworth Wins Legal Battle With Aly

RENO, Nev. (AP) — Actress Rita Hayworth has won another legal battle with her ex-husband Aly Khan despite his claim of diplomatic immunity as Pakistan ambassador to the United Nations.

A district judge ruled that the Moslem prince must pay three attorneys who arranged for the couple's daughter, Yashmin, to visit Aly in France in 1955.

The prince's Reno attorney, Kenneth Dillon, said he would appeal the ruling which ordered Aly to pay Bartley Crum of New York \$18,300, Suzanne Blum of Paris \$5,000 francs and a Reno law firm \$3,036.



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
