Nation's Population Reaches 175 Million

WASHINGTON (AP)—The nation's population reached 175 million at 11:08 a.m. EDT Thursday, by the estimate of the Commerce Department's census clock.

The digits on the speedometer-like counter turned over with a clanking of cams and plungers before a small crowd attracted by a goody throng of motion picture and still photographers.

The clock's population tally increases by one every 11 seconds. This represents the average net effect on the population of one birth each 7½ seconds, one death each 20 seconds, one immigrant arrival each 1½ minutes and one emigrant departure each 20 minutes.

French Paintings Change Hands In Record Auction

LONDON (AP)—Seven French impressionist paintings changed hands here this week at a 20-minute auction which set records both for the price paid for a single picture and for the total realized at one art auction session.

Cezanne's "Boy in the Red Waistcoat" fetched \$616,000, more than twice as much as ever was paid before for a single painting at auction.

The seven paintings brought

\$2,180,000, topping the 65 lots of the Georges Lurcy collection that brought a total of \$1,702,000 at an auction in New York last year.

"This will put up prices in the art world everywhere," said Peter Wilson, who auctioned off the paintings at Sotheby's.

All the paintings were part of the collection of Jacob Goldschmidt, the late banker, who had ordered them sold in his will. He had been forced to abandon the collection when he fled Nazi Germany in 1933 and part of it was auctioned by the Nazis.

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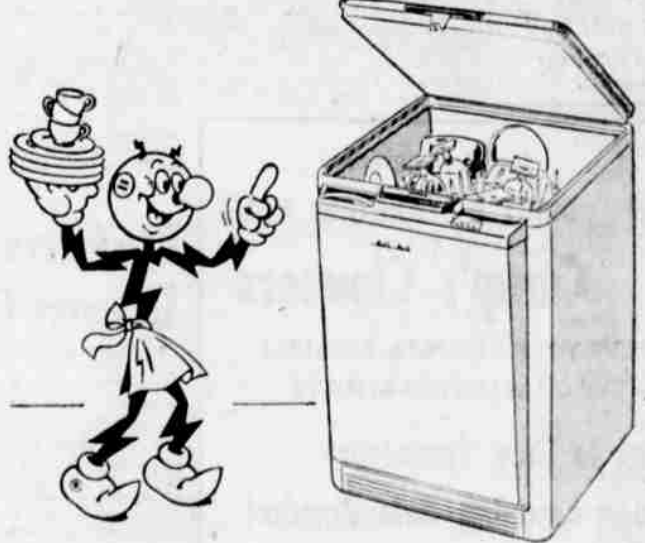
