

School Discipline Should Be Tightened Up, Evaluators Believe

(This is the fifth of a series of 10 articles outlining findings and recommendations of the Roseburg School District Evaluation Steering Committee and its subcommittees. All articles in the series are designed to be informative and objective.)

Discipline in the Roseburg schools, particularly in the classroom, should be tightened up, according to the School Evaluation Steering Committee report.

Teachers and principals should be given the authority necessary to effectively enforce a sterner discipline, the steering committee recommends.

The Subcommittee on Teaching Methods sent 565 questionnaires to parents and 162 of the questionnaires were returned. One of the questions asked was: "Are you satisfied with the regulation and control in your child's school room?" A total of 99 replied yes and 27 no.

Another question asked was "How do you feel about discipline in Roseburg schools?" Twenty-eight parents replied they thought the discipline is "much too easy," 34 said it was "little too easy," 34 said it was about right and one said too strict.

A similar questionnaire sent to the teachers revealed that 95 per cent felt discipline was good in their room and 5 per cent felt discipline was fair. This questionnaire, which was sent to 216 teachers, also revealed that 97 per cent felt discipline was good in their school, 2 per cent felt it was poor.

Position Recommended
Still another Steering Committee recommendation is the creation of the new position of business manager for the school system.

Various business functions now performed by four persons should be delegated to the position of business manager. Those four persons are clerk, superintendent, assistant superintendent and superintendent of buildings and grounds.

The position of assistant superintendent could be eliminated, according to the evaluation report. The report explains that the financial savings which could be effected by carrying out this recommendation would more than pay for any cost of making the change. The business manager also would have control of the procurement and purchasing.

Duties Outlined
Meanwhile, the Subcommittee on

Administration reports that the business manager would handle all purchasing for the district, supervise receiving, warehousing and issuing of supplies, handle all employment of teaching personnel, and act as liaison between superintendent and principals relative to supplies, equipment and maintenance of buildings.

He would be responsible for establishing and maintaining property records, conduct school census, prepare census reports for the school clerk, establish and maintain a budget control record by accounts and handle preliminary planning of new buildings.

Husband Follows, Shoots His Estranged Wife
GRAND FORKS, N.D. (AP) — An estranged husband who followed his wife here from California wounded her with a shotgun blast Sunday, then fired into an occupied car in which she sought safety.

The assailant later walked into the police station and surrendered, asking officers how his wife and the children in the automobile were.

Leo Boese, 40, Ontario, Calif., was held here without charge. His wife, Bernice, 31, a former Grand Forks resident, was reported in critical condition with lower back and arm wounds. She also had been living in Ontario.

Mrs. Boese, who returned for the funeral of her father, told police she had agreed to a rendezvous at a drive-in restaurant with her husband.

She said he grabbed a shotgun in the car and fired at her when she refused to go back to him. The couple has five children.

Ladies Auxiliary Takes Fire Fighting Lessons
GREEN HAVEN, Md. (AP) — Man the pumps, gals.

The ladies auxiliary of the Green Haven Volunteer Fire Department wants to do more than cook dinners and bake cakes to raise money for their fire-fighting husbands.

Reuther Believes Warren Would Get Labor Backing
CHICAGO (AP) — Chief Justice Earl Warren would receive serious consideration from American labor if he became a candidate for president, says Walter Reuther.

Reuther, head of the United Auto Workers, said in a television interview Sunday the Democrats have a dozen excellent potential candidates for president.

Among them, he said, are Gov. G. Mennen Williams of Michigan, Sen. Stuart Symington of Missouri, Sen. John Kennedy of Massachusetts, Gov. Robert Meyer of New Jersey and Gov. Averell Harriman of New York.

Reuther termed Vice President Nixon an extremely competent technician and politician but said he has "a streak of opportunism" that bothers him as an individual.

The UAW president said there are several Republicans on whom labor might look kindly. When pressed to name them, he said, "Earl Warren would be entitled to serious consideration by the American labor movement and would get it."

Labor does not favor either political party, Reuther said, but considers each individual candidate on his record.

But, he said, "it gets more difficult to find a Republican candidate worthy of our support."

43 Japanese Fishermen Missing, Thought Drown
TOKYO (AP) — The Japanese coast guard said 43 Japanese fishermen are missing and believed drowned in the heavy seas off northern Japan.

A spokesman said the 39-ton Myoju Maru had sunk 200 miles northeast of Tokyo Saturday with 27 crew members aboard. Ten were rescued by fishing boats and a coast guard patrol ship, the spokesman said.

The 40-ton Komei Maru with 26 aboard has not been heard from since last Friday. The spokesman said debris of the vessel were discovered by rescue ships Sunday.

Movie Spurs Japanese To Carve Onlookers
NAVOYA, Japan (AP) — Masanori Hosokawa said a movie Friday showing the derring-do of Japan's old-time swordsmen, and it went to his head.

Police said he went to another theater, stood up halfway through the performance and stabbed 13 members of the audience with a kitchen knife. Some were severely wounded.

Washington Voters' Okay To Revise Boundary With Oregon Sought In Election
OLYMPIA (AP) — A move to ease the method of revising the boundary between Oregon and Washington will be put to a vote of the people of both states Nov. 4.

Under the present setup, the boundaries of the states are fixed in their constitutions and can not be changed except by the involved process of amending the two constitutions.

The new plan would permit revision of the boundary by an agreement between the two states as soon as such agreement was ratified by Congress.

The proposal, with no known opposition, will appear on the Washington election ballot as Senate Joint Resolution No. 10 and on the Oregon ballot as Proposition No. 1.

If both states approve the change, the boundary will immediately be slightly changed in conformance with an agreement signed by compact commissions of the two states Dec. 21, 1956.

The agreement already has been ratified by the legislatures of both states and the Congress of the United States.

The revised boundary was developed and approved by an interstate compact signed for Oregon by the Oregon commission on interstate cooperation and approved for Washington by the Washington-Oregon Boundary Commission.

Objection Simplified
M. G. Walker, secretary of the Washington group, said the compact does not materially change the boundary between the two states "but it does tie down to specific points the location of the boundary as it relates to the storage dams and bridges."

CORVALLIS (AP) — Voters will be asked to approve a \$1,400,000 bond issue to meet the city's increasing need for water.

City department heads and City Attorney Verne Johnson were permitted to begin working out legal details for the bond approval after financial and engineering problems were ironed out.

The bond issue, if approved, would finance the first phase of a 15-year program to expand and improve the city's water supply and distribution system.

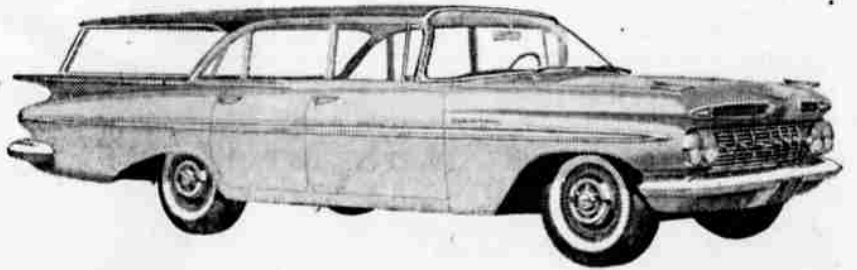
