**NEWPORT, Wash. (AP)**—Prosecutor Jay Jones said here that warrants have been issued charging obstruction of justice against Francis J. Handwerk, 27, the "lost" Spokane bear hunter who was never lost at all, and his wife. Jones said the charges were filed in Superior Court here Friday under a section of the Washington code pertaining to obstructing justice.

Handwerk went bear hunting in the rugged Z Canyon area near Metaine Falls, Wash., Oct. 8 and a widespread search was carried on for more than a week by sheriff's officers, volunteers, State Patrolmen and Air Force men.

Thursday, Handwerk was found hitchhiking near Ellensburg and was taken into custody on a charge of carrying a concealed weapon. He told police he and his wife had an argument and that he planned to "disappear" three days before leaving home on the hunting trip.

**Family Argument Told**

Mrs. Handwerk told reporters after her arrest that they had argued but that she didn't think it was serious. She had also joined the search for him in the canyon. Handwerk had gone to Los Angeles after leaving the hunting area, then started back home through Portland and Olympia to make up with his wife.

Jones said Saturday Handwerk was charged with delaying and obstructing an officer by failing to advise officers of his whereabouts at a time when he knew they were searching for him.

Handwerk had told Ellensburg police he picked up a portable radio in Olympia to follow news of the search for him.

Jones said the warrant on Mrs. Handwerk charged her with withholding from officers important information concerning motives for her husband's disappearance. The misdemeanor case will be heard by Judge Albert I. Kulzer of Chewelah on Thursday morning. The two will be free on their own recognizance until their arraignment in court here.

Maximum penalty for the offense is 90 days in jail or a \$250 fine.

### Permit To Build Columbia Bridge At Astoria Given

SALEM (AP)—The states of Washington and Oregon have been granted a permit by the Army Engineers to build a bridge across the Columbia River, Oregon Highway Engineer W. C. Williams said here.

"That doesn't mean a bridge is going to be built," he said. "It will have to be financed first."

Both legislatures must first decide if they can afford the span, which Williams estimated will cost about 20 million dollars.

The permit approval, Williams said, marks only one preliminary step. He said a joint committee of eight bankers will release findings on the economic feasibility of the bridge in about a month.

Preliminary plans call for a 4-mile span from Astoria, Ore. to Megler, Wash. The permit requires the bridge have a vertical clearance of 198 feet and be built to accommodate a ship channel 1,250 feet wide.

Williams estimated construction, once started, would take two years.
