Dulles Rebuffs Russ Bid For Foreign Ministers' Meet

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of State Dulles today rebuffed a Soviet bid for an early foreign ministers meeting on ending nuclear weapons tests. But he offered to attend a later East-West conference if that "seems necessary and desirable."

In notes delivered in Moscow, the U. S. and British governments called on the Soviet Union to begin diplomatic negotiations on the test issue Oct. 31, as previously agreed.

Dulles said he, Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd and Russia's Andrei Gromyko should not attend the initial sessions.

"If, as the discussions at the diplomatic level proceed, the presence of foreign ministers seems necessary and desirable the secretary of state would be prepared to attend," the note added.

By this move Dulles and Lloyd obviously sought to avoid being placed in a completely negative position on the issue of a foreign ministers' meeting.

Russia proposed a meeting of foreign ministers in a note Oct. 1. There was immediate suspicion here that the Reds were trying to find an excuse to assure the failure of the scheduled Geneva negotiations and put the blame on the Western powers.

The United States reminded the Soviet Union that President Eisenhower had offered last Aug. 22 to suspend U. S. nuclear weapons tests for a year, with subsequent one year extensions, if Russia also would refrain from testing and if progress were made toward setting up a control system to police the test ban.

Salmon Fishing Zone Meet Dated

TOKYO (AP) — Japan will press for a reasonable line dividing the salmon fishing zone in the North Pacific, says its chief delegate to the International North Pacific Fisheries Commission which opens a session here Nov. 4.

Iwao Fujita, vice president of the Great Japan Fishers Assn. and chairman of the commission, said in an interview "we only want to arrive at a reasonable line dividing the salmon fishing zone in the North Pacific."

The 1952 Japan-Canada-U. S. Fishery Treaty places the provisional dividing line between the North American and Japanese fishing fleets at 175 degrees west meridian running north and south through the Aleutians.

United States conservationists and fishing interests are reported to have become worried over the seasonally small run of young salmon in Bristol Bay, Alaska.

They reportedly are urging the U. S. government to have Japan move the line 50 miles further west.

New Hunt Slated For Lost Alaskan Game Official

JUNEAU, Alaska (AP) — Winter search efforts for Clarence Rhode will be concentrated in wooded country on the southern slopes of the Brooks Mountain range, a U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service official said here.

Theron Smith, FWS aircraft supervisor from Anchorage, said the winter freeze up in the remote northeastern corner of the territory now was almost complete enough to support ski operations by light planes.

Search efforts have been stalled for the past three weeks while search pilots waited for lakes in the area to freeze over and for snow conditions to settle.

Rhode, 45, regional director of the agency's bureau of sports fish and wildlife here, has been missing since Aug. 25.

He was on a light over the remote sheep country, and was accompanied by his son, Jack, 21, and Stan Fredericksen, 34, FWS agent at Fairbanks.

Smith will direct the winter search efforts for the three men from Fairbanks.

Planes taking part in the renewed hunt will be based at Bettles and Fort Yukon.

PORTLAND (AP) — Malcolm Bauer of Portland, associate editor of The Oregonian, is the new president of the Oregon Historical Society.

He was elected at the organization's 61st annual meeting here.

Serving with him will be Eugene Marsh, McMinnville, vice president; Robert Ellis Jr., Portland, secretary; and C. B. Stephenson, Portland, treasurer.

New directors include: Marsh; Robert E. Dodge, Eugene; Alva C. Goodrich, Bend; W. F. McCulloch, Corvallis; and Robert Wilson, Madras.

The society previewed a film of Oregon history, made from the society's library of photographs. Special music was written for the film by Robert Crowley, Portland composer.

Thai Cabinet Resigns Monday

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — The Thai Cabinet headed by Premier Thanom Kittikachorn resigned Monday, the government radio announced.

The mass resignation came after the return to this capital Sunday of strongman Marshal Sarit Thanarat. He slipped quietly into the country after returning mysteriously from a convalescent leave in England. He went into a huddle with top political leaders as soon as he arrived.

There had been rumors Sarit planned some government changes and perhaps a Cabinet shakeup.

Sarit, an army marshal, led a military coup which overthrew the regime of Field Marshal P. Pibul-ngom in September 1957.

Two Boys Sail High Seas, But Not For Very Long

OJAI, Calif. (AP) — Two boys who set sail for Tahiti in a homemade boat are back home today. A Navy PT boat intercepted them 17 miles at sea.

Herbert G. Dorsey and Dominick Suniga, both 16, built the 15-footer, stocked it with provisions and left on the cruise Saturday with their parents' blessings.

Then Mrs. Suniga changed her mind. She telephoned police, who put the Coast Guard on the trail.

At the same time Chrysler reported all its plants were back in operation as workers returned at the last strikebound plant in Detroit.

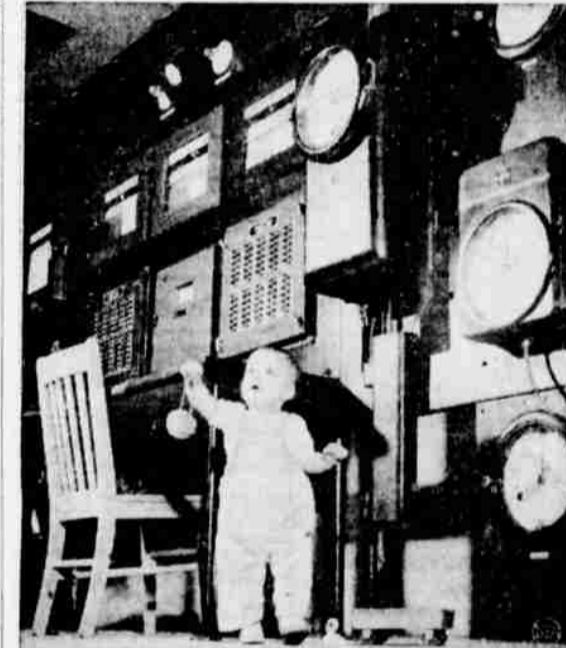
Strikes over local issues remaining after national contract agreements at the big three have tied up new model output. Ford cleared up all its local grievances two weeks ago and has been producing cars.

The former adviser to President Eisenhower on disarmament questions will go to Turkey toward the end of this month to take up the job.
