Holmes Pleased With Democratic Registration Gains

Democratic registration gains in Oregon were viewed Monday by Gov. Robert D. Holmes as a "pleasing endorsement."
His opponent in next month's election, Republican Mark Hatfield, in a talk made at about the same time, said however, that Holmes has shown "inability or lack of interest" in efficient, economical government.
Holmes, in a statement released at Salem after voter registration figures showed the Democrats to have a lead of 52,165, said this was the voters' "endorsement of the kind of government they have been getting under the first Democratic administration in 20 years."
Moreover, he said, "positive action in the interest of all the people" had been given by the legislative and executive branches of state government.
Hatfield in his talk said that substantial money gains in state operation could be achieved through a series of small savings. But, he said, the governor "seems to think that savings can be made only in chunks of millions, such as by closing some state school or institution."
Hatfield said that as secretary of state, he had made separate savings of \$25,000, \$45,000, \$30,000, \$35,000 and \$11,000 through various reorganizations and modernizations. Similar savings can be made in other departments, he said, "if there is the desire and leadership."

Cardinals Draw Lots For Cells

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Forty-one cardinals of the Roman Catholic Church drew lots today for the three-room cells they will occupy from Oct. 25 until they elect a new Pope.
The draw was set to favor the most elderly and the more ailing of the cardinals. They automatically drew the apartments in the closed conclave quadrangle nearest to the Sistine Chapel, where votes will be cast, and the Borgia Guardroom, where meals will be served.
For the others, however, it was an even chance.
The rooms have been prepared for the past week and will not be ready until Saturday, when the cardinals are locked in conclave. Each cell consists of a bedroom for the cardinal, a study, and a room for his clerical aide.
Jose Maria Caro Cardinal Rodriguez, archbishop of Santiago, Chile, who at 92 is the oldest member of the Sacred College, received one of the favored locations.
