

Eisenhower Returns Home Satisfied, While Democrats Shout Demagoguery At Him

President Eisenhower returned to Washington today from his cross-country belaboring of the Democrats while opposition party leaders shouted "demagoguery" after him and glibbed that Republicans are split.

Eisenhower seemed pleased with his six-day, 5,200-mile effort to steam up the Republican congressional campaign. When his plane landed after a flight from Chicago, he told GOP leaders "I didn't run into any pessimism or apathy."

And former Democratic President Harry S. Truman hooted at Eisenhower's talk of the Democrats as badly split.

"The only split I know of is the Republican party," Truman said, adding that the split is between "Eisenhower Republicans and old line economic royalists."

Talks To Reporters

Truman talked with reporters in New York. He was bouncing off to Boston to get in some more campaigns licks there.

Vice President Nixon, campaigning in New York for GOP candidates, hit the theme of a Democratic split indirectly. He challenged Stevenson and other Northern Democrats to get such Southern Democrats as Gov. Orval Faubus of Arkansas, Marvin Griffin of Georgia and J. Lindsay Almond of Virginia in line behind the Supreme Court's school integration decision.

Nixon pledged the Republicans will broaden the field of civil rights.

In Washington, Secretary of Agriculture Benson hit at "left wing" Democrats who he said want to socialize agriculture. And he told a news conference that Truman had knocked corn prices down 10 cents a bushel with "scare talk" about the prospects of declining farm prices if the Republicans win the election.

Eisenhower carried on his battle for a Republican Congress Wednesday night in Chicago with a renewed blast at "radical" Democrats and Democratic economic policies.

Same Hard Hitting Style

In the same hard-hitting campaign style he first unveiled in California, he told some 4,500 cheering party workers his administration has licked the recession without "a federal wheel chair," in spite of what he termed radical demands from congressional Democrats for huge spending programs.

Eisenhower's repeated use of the word "radical" during his tour brought heated criticism from Stevenson, Eisenhower's Democratic presidential opponent in 1952 and 1956.

"The old Nixon has been joined by the new Ike—or a new speech writer—in a desperate, intolerable demagoguery type of campaign," Stevenson told a meeting of Democratic precinct chiefs in Chicago.

Joining Eisenhower in praise of administration economic policies, Nixon told New England audiences that radical Democrats will go to Congress if GOP Senate and House candidates are defeated in the North and West.

D. A. Tells Of Struggle Against U. S. Tax Body

Avery W. Thompson, incumbent candidate for the office of Douglas County District Attorney, Wednesday told a Myrtle Creek audience of efforts by the DA's office to resist "encroachment" by the federal government on county tax liens.

Thompson, speaking to a gathering of Myrtle Creek Lions Club members, noted that litigation is pending in circuit court to determine the priority of federal and county taxes. The Internal Revenue Department has filed liens on property to which the county claims it has legal right by reason of superior tax liens.

The district attorney's office represents the county in the suit.

Anti-Communist Novelist Winner Of Nobel Prize

STOCKHOLM (AP)—Boris Pasternak, the Russian poet and author of the anti-Communist novel "Doctor Zhivago," today was awarded the 1958 Nobel Prize in Literature.

The award was the most dramatic in years. The 68-year-old author still lives just outside Moscow. The Soviet government has not permitted publication in Russia of his monumental novel about what communism has done to freedom and tried to prevent its publication abroad.

The award, worth \$41,420, was certain to be interpreted by many as a slap in the face for the Soviet government. There was speculation that the Soviet authorities would not allow Pasternak to receive his prize, or would take reprisals against him.

Greatest Russian Poet

Known as the greatest living poet writing in the Russian language, Pasternak despaired of publishing creative writing of his own under Stalin and for years devoted himself to translations of such foreign classics as Goethe and Shakespeare.

"Doctor Zhivago"—upon which he had been working quietly for 10 years—was completed in 1956 during the de-Stalinization period of comparative freedom for writers. But to make certain it was published, he sent it abroad by a friend.

The monumental novel first appeared in Italy in Italian last year and was published in the United States last month.

The 700-page book has for its hero Yuri Andreyevich Zhivago, a wealthy doctor and writer who tells, through literary bits he left behind, of the tragedy of Russia in this century.

It obviously expresses Pasternak's reaction to the Russian Revolution.

Cubans Release Two Americans

WASHINGTON (AP)—The State Department announced today that two Americans kidnapped by the Cuban rebels have been released.

The two are Kenneth Drewes and Charles R. Bennett.

Their release followed delivery of a virtual ultimatum to the rebel leadership Wednesday demanding full information on the condition of the men and saying that otherwise the United States government will determine its course of action.

The State Department said the U.S. government is studying measures to prevent further rebel kidnappings of Americans in Cuba and to cut down on damages to U.S. property there.

An official said "we're damn sick and tired of having Americans kidnapped from time to time."

The line of possible U.S. action was not clearly indicated, however, as State Department spokesmen also said that this government intends to stick strictly to a policy of nonintervention in Cuban affairs.

The department said it had word of release of Bennett and Drewes but no immediate details.

Bennett is a construction chief at a Texas Oil Co. refinery near Santiago in the rebel stronghold, Oriente Province. Drewes also is a Texas Co. employee.

Intercontinental Snark Blazes Across Atlantic

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP)—A sleek Snark guided missile, the only U.S. weapon now capable of flying intercontinental range, blazed across the Atlantic early today.

Launching of the 49-foot missile on what reportedly was a 3,000-mile halfway shot and return to the Cape came in the wake of the Army's failure to blast a balloon satellite into orbit.

Two high-thrust booster rockets toppled away in flames shortly after takeoff and a powerful turbojet engine roared into action to carry the Snark over the leaky route.

2-Year-Old Boy Rescued From 11-Foot-Deep Hole

MAGNOLIA, Ark. (AP)—A 2-year-old boy was plucked from the bottom of an 11-foot hole Wednesday after rescue workers labored three anxious hours.

Fifty men worked in shifts to scoop out a trench parallel to the hole to reach little Johnny Carmichael.

The child fell into the hole while walking with his father, E. C. Carmichael, about 100 yards behind their rural home. The hole, about 12 inches in diameter, was dug to hold a lightning arrester.

32 Mechanical Employees Of SP Laid Off Work

PORTLAND (AP)—Thirty-two mechanical employees of the Southern Pacific Railroad here received layoff notices Wednesday.

It was the first mass dismissal to result from the firm's plans to move its engine repair shops from the Brooklyn yards in Portland to Eugene.

The layoffs are effective Oct. 31. Some of the men have been offered jobs at Eugene.

Twin Baby Boys Found Stabbed, One Fatally

SYRACUSE, N.Y. (AP)—A newly born twin boy was stabbed to death today and his brother was wounded immediately after birth. The mother told police she knew nothing of the wounds.

William Pearson, 41, a salesman identified as her husband, told police he had not known she was pregnant, although a doctor said the births were "normal, nine-month births."

Police found two scissors in the flat where the boys were born early today. They did not identify the weapon.

The mother, Gertrude Pearson, 33, was known as Miss Pearson at her job as a telephone operator. But police said the two were married last December and were living with her mother, Mrs. Gladys O. Noyes.

Police questioned Mrs. Pearson at a hospital.

Pearson and Mrs. Noyes were held as material witnesses.

Mrs. Pearson told police she and her mother were alone in the house.

A doctor who arrived after the early morning births said he found Mrs. Pearson in a bathroom and one boy, just born, with 13 puncture wounds over his body. He was alive, however.

The doctor saw evidence that two children had been born. He called police, who discovered the body of the other boy in a suitcase in a bedroom closet.

Pearson, a salesman, had a son, now 19, by a previous marriage. Mrs. Pearson had no children.

Rose City Transit To Take 16 Cars Out Of Service

Portland (AP)—The Rose City Transit Co. will take 16 trolleys out of service here, City Commissioner William B. Bowes said Wednesday night.

Bowes said he learned that the firm, which operates the mass transit system here, also will take down all trolley wire systems by Nov. 1.

The commissioner said a city ordinance passed earlier this year permits the company to take both steps.

But Bowes said he will introduce a law designed to block such action.

The ordinance was passed when Public Utilities Commissioner Howard Morgan was about to step into a squabble here when the firm asked a fare increase.

With an all-gas-bus operation, which the ordinance allowed, the commissioner had no clear jurisdiction in the matter.

Bowes said the general manager of the company had acted on orders from Rose City Transit's parent firm in San Francisco.

RR Brotherhood Endorses Hatfield

PORTLAND (AP)—The Railroad Brotherhood's Legislative League of Oregon Wednesday endorsed Republican Mark Hatfield for governor.

But at the same time, an official of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen endorsed the Democratic candidate, Gov. Robert Holmes.

The league said it was withdrawing its support from Holmes because he apparently is under the domination of Oregon Public Utilities Commissioner Howard Morgan.

The league also accused Holmes of failing to help the railroads when they were seeking a freight rate reduction.

But Jerry Rutledge, legislative representative for the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, said he was supporting Holmes.

He said the governor was "as fine a friend of railroads as anyone could be."

fully achieving that mission is through nationalism, democracy and social well-being. "and not the use of force," the communique said.

The communique also went a step closer toward an American commitment to defend the Nationalist-held offshore islands, although it did not make such a flat commitment.

The statement said that the United States and the Nationalist regime "recognized that under present conditions the defense of the Quemoy's together with the defense of Taiwan (Formosa) and Penghu (the Pescadore Islands) in the Formosa Strait."

This was interpreted as a new warning that any lie attempt to take the offshore islands might provoke U.S. intervention.

Rep. Porter Takes Verbal Swings At His GOP Opponent

Speaking at a rally Wednesday night at the Roseburg Labor Temple, Charles O. Porter, Democratic candidate for re-election to Congress from the 4th district, took some verbal swings at his Republican opponent.

Porter said, "It is of utmost importance that a congressman have his facts right." Taking a dig at Paul E. Geddes, the GOP candidate, Porter said "misinformation" currently being passed out by Geddes regarding bills Porter had sponsored, the South American defense bases and the plywood industry did not fit the facts.

Porter told his audience he had filed a total of 76 bills and that 24 in whole or in part, had become the law of the land. He compared this record with Congressman Walter Norblad's, which Porter said was two bills in 14 years.

Porter described so-called "right-to-work" laws as discriminatory, not only toward working people but injurious to business and the economy of the state as a whole. Stating his opposition to such legislation, Porter charged, "My opponent, as usual, is straddling the fence and trying to carry water on both shoulders."

The speaker claimed the offshore island dispute concerning defense of Matsu and Quemoy could involve the United States in a war. He said, "The Constitution of the United States vests in the Congress sole power to declare war and I believe, in the interest of peace and to save American blood from being shed, that the President should call a special session of the Congress."

Boy, 12, Slays Girl, 2, In Rage

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—A 12-year-old boy has been charged with slaying a 2-year-old girl playmate in a fit of rage after she struck his injured eye.

Olden Goldberg was charged with homicide Wednesday night and taken to the youth study center to await a formal hearing in Juvenile Court today.

Police said marks on Geraldine Williams' body indicated that Olden hit the child, then strangled her. Patrolmen found her body in a yard near her home. It was wrapped in newspaper and stuffed in a wicker shopping basket. She had been missing for two days.

The boy is white; the girl was Negro.

The boy reportedly told police he was playing at his home with Geraldine Monday when she struck his previously injured eye and that brought on the fit of anger.

His mother, at work at the time, had told him not to bring any children to the house.

Hungary Bluntly Refuses To Release Mindszent

VIENNA (AP)—Communist Hungary has bluntly rejected any American request to let Josef Mindszent leave his refuge in the U.S. legation in Budapest to vote in the Vatican for a new pope.

Mindszent, freed from Red imprisonment by the 1956 Hungarian revolt, found asylum in the legation when the Russians crushed the revolt a few days later.

The U.S. charge d'affaires in Budapest, Garret G. Ackerson Jr., disclosed Wednesday night that Washington asked safe conduct for the cardinal at the Vatican's request.

Distance Flier Forced To Land

SEATTLE (AP)—Distance flier Charles Banfe Jr., forced down here Wednesday when his light plane developed engine trouble, planned to continue on to New York Thursday to complete the first round-the-world solo flight in a single-engine aircraft.

Banfe took off from Juneau, Alaska, Wednesday morning, intending to fly non-stop to New York's Idlewild Airport. He ran into icy conditions soon after leaving Juneau and his plane's engine began to run roughly as he approached Seattle.

Banfe, 39, a commercial airlines pilot from Palo Alto, Calif., left New York Sept. 10 to attempt a solo around-the-world flight. He also had planned to attempt to break the world long-distance flight record for a single-engine plane but failed when he was forced down Friday at Cordova, Alaska, a point less than halfway on his intended non-stop, 7,022 mile route between Tokyo and Miami.

Banfe set out from Cordova intending to fly non-stop to New York but was again forced down at Yakutat, Alaska, Monday.

Jury To Deliberate Fate Of Accused Knife Slasher

PORTLAND (AP)—A circuit court jury here is expected to begin deliberating today the fate of Pvt. Alfred Gust, accused of slaying a woman with a knife in downtown Portland the night of Aug. 3.

Gust, a soldier from Fort Lewis, Wash., signed a statement shortly after his arrest that night, admitting knife attacks on Mrs. Josephine Jach, 33, and two other women.

His attorney, Nicholas Granet, based his defense on a plea of insanity. A psychiatrist, Dr. Henry H. Dixon, testified that Gust was mentally ill and unable to determine right from wrong.

But a prosecution psychiatrist, Dr. William Thompson, said Gust was not insane—he blamed Gust's actions on drinking.

Faubus Claims Schools Better Off If Closed

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP)—Gov. Orval E. Faubus said Wednesday night it was better for Little Rock Central High School to be closed than demolished.

Faubus told a meeting of educators the South is not ready to accept integration. He closed Central High and Little Rock's three other high schools last month to avert court-ordered racial mixing of classes.

"It's better that it (Central) be empty than to be demolished, and that's what will happen when people like me are gone," the governor said.

In his address to a regional conference of the National Assn. of Guidance Supervisors and Counselor Trainers at nearby Hot Springs, Ark., Faubus also struck at the U.S. Supreme Court.

"It seems that Communists can get more consideration in the United States than a white segregationist can, sometimes," Faubus asserted.

Meanwhile, enrollment of sophomores was scheduled at the Little Rock Private School Corp.'s all-white high school today. About 240 juniors registered Wednesday.

Police located the driver of the truck, Robert Walker of Silverton, at a nearby hotel. He came to the scene and quickly removed the truck and trailer.
