

Pitt Coach Works On Way To Stop Army's Lonely End

PITTSBURGH (AP)—Pitt's football team is pulling out all stops for Saturday's game here with the unbeaten Army. The Panthers have several reasons.

For one thing a victory would give Pitt the prestige of winning the nation's No. 1 ranked team.

For another, the game will go a long way toward deciding the eventual winner of the Lambert Trophy, emblematic of Eastern football supremacy. Army, winner in four games, and Pitt with a 4-1 record, currently are one-two in the weekly balloting.

Pitt Coach John Michelosen figures, quite naturally, his biggest problem will be stopping Army's fabulous halfback duo of Pete Dawkins and Bob Anderson and "Lonesome" George. Bill Carpenter, Michelosen's own tailback, "kept me awake trying to figure a way to defend him. He's so fast you almost have to use two men to

cover him. And he can come in diagonally for a quick pass or go deep."

If Michelosen has figured a way to stop the Cardinals, who last week regained the national lead in total offense, he's keeping it under wraps.

The taciturn Pitt coach brushed aside suggestions that Army's pass defense isn't quite what it should be to remain unbeaten.

"We understand their linemen are pretty good at rushing a passer," he said.

In a radical departure for Pitt, the Panthers have opened up their offense considerably. Quarterback Ivan Tunicke is especially prone to relay on aerials. He has completed 29 of 39 passes, including three for touchdowns.

Pitt's defense record speaks for itself. In limiting four of five opponents to no more than one touchdown the Panthers have yielded only 378 net yards on the ground and 393 through the air.

Newman Loaded For Grid Play

The best football player in Oregon last week was quarterback Bobby Newman of Washington State, an Associated Press Regional Advisory Board said today.

And with his brief but brilliant performance, Newman became a leading candidate for All-Coast honors, said the board—which will help pick those stars.

On a rain-soaked field at Eugene last Saturday, Newman went into the game with a knee injury, sprained a falling drive and then dove over for a touchdown that beat Oregon 6-0.

"Anyone who can come in there with one leg and keep a drive going is a pretty fair boy," said one member of the board.

"Washington state doesn't win without Newman," he said.

In crucial plays

When Newman hobbled off the bench Saturday in the game's second quarter, he flipped a crucial pass and later ran the final yard into the end zone.

"If he hadn't thrown that pass, called those signals or sneaked over, the score would have been 0-0," said the board member.

That touchdown gave WSC a 3-1 Pacific Coast Conference record, and kept the Cougars in contention for the title and trip to the Rose Bowl.

When told of Newman's selection, Washington State coach Jim Sutherland said: "That's wonderful. I'm sorry he didn't play more."

And, when Newman was addressed, he said: "It's a very great honor."

The 6-2, 190-pound senior from El Cerrito, Calif., last season led the Coast in both passing and total yardage gained.

Farmer Shoots Wife And Self, Wounds Daughter

SPERRY, Okla. (AP)—A farmer shot and killed his wife, critically wounded his small daughter, and took his own life last night outside the Sperry Football Field Wednesday night. The woman and her three children were watching a high school game from a station wagon.

The dead: Mrs. Imogene Tracy, 32, and her estranged husband, William Anthony Tracy Jr., 35, who only recently had undergone a mental hearing. In a critical condition at Hillcrest Medical Center in Tulsa is the couple's daughter, Lynn Tracy, 3, with a bullet wound in her lung.

The child underwent emergency surgery early today.

The couple's other two children, Roger, 6, and Billy, 8, watched from the back seat of the station wagon as their father opened fire. They were not harmed.

Mrs. Tracy died within minutes from two bullet wounds, one in her chest and the other in her left side. One of the shots also killed the child.

Tulsa County Dep. Sheriff Louis Powell quoted witnesses as saying Tracy then turned the rifle on himself, sending a bullet through his chest.

A native of Star, Ore., he spent his active life in and near Eugene where he was married Dec. 25, 1937, to Gladys Fisher, a former Roseburg resident.

Surviving are the widow, a stepson, Ray Collins, and a daughter, Charlene Thatcher.

He was a member of Masonic orders and was a veteran of World War I.

Pilot, Passenger Trapped For Week Safely Rescued

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP)—An Anchorage bush pilot and his passenger, trapped a week in the plane with the mercury dropping to 35 degrees below zero, were safe Wednesday.

Pilot Kenneth Oldham was picked up by an Army helicopter piloted by Capt. Richard L. Johnson of Ft. Greely Tuesday night. A Weidemann, a military photographer at Ft. Richardson, was found eight miles from the downed plane, with both feet frozen, but trying to walk out.

Oldham, who had remained with the plane in the hope they had built a shelter here, Weidemann was airlifted by helicopter to Gulkana.

The two left Chistochina for McCarthy a week ago Tuesday in a light plane equipped only with wheels. They landed in the Nabesna Glacier area about 50 miles east of Nabesna Village, and then the snow came.

They built a lean-to, Oldham told his rescuers, and spent most of the next several days in sleeping bags in the freezing cold. A friend of Oldham's, Fred Frakes of Anchorage, spotted both men from the air and dropped sleeping gear and rations to them.

Then Weidemann started to walk out. Frakes located him about five miles from the downed plane and dropped snowshoes to him.

Government States September Living Costs Unchanged

WASHINGTON (AP)—The government reported today that living costs remained unchanged in September. At the same time, earnings of factory workers rose to a record level.

It was the second straight month that living costs, after a steady two-year climb, failed to rise. In August there was a slight decline.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics said its living cost index was unchanged in September from the August level of 123.7 per cent of the 1947-49 base period.

About 900,000 workers in the railroad industry will get a one-cent an hour wage boost effective Nov. 1 as a living cost adjustment based on the new index compared with what it was six months ago.

Factory workers' earnings, after deducting federal income and social security taxes, rose to \$77.25 a week in September for the worker with three dependents, and to \$69.80 for the single worker. Both spendable earnings figures represented record highs.

They were both about 65 cents above August levels and about \$1.80 per week above the figures for September last year.

The bureau said factory worker buying power has been increasing steadily from a low point last April because of gradually longer working hours, higher hourly earnings and comparatively steady price levels.

Ewan Clague, Labor Department statistics commissioner, said that the gain in spendable earnings promises to increase national consumption and thus buoy economic recovery.

DeGaulle Asks Algerian Peace, Invites Rebels

PARIS (AP)—Premier Charles de Gaulle today called for peace in Algeria and invited nationalist rebels to attend military talks at the French embassies in Tunis and Rabat.

It was the first time he had proposed direct negotiations with Algerian nationalists who have been fighting French rule nearly four years.

The Premier pleaded with the rebels to "return without humiliation to their families and their jobs."

He said they could lay down their arms by the usual military methods, through the use of white flags and contacts with commanders on the scene.

"If representatives of the rebels were designated to regulate an end of hostilities with the French authorities, they could address themselves to the embassies at Rabat or Tunis, and they would be transported to France," he said.

He gave them a guarantee of safe conduct and return to Algeria.
