

Evaluators Recommend Hiring Business Manager For School District

7 Of Top Prep Teams Win Fri.

Seven of Oregon's top high school football teams piled up smashing victories Friday night. Two, however, were defeated. And one was tied.

The Jefferson Democrats rolled on this time 48-0 over Franklin, another Portland League squad. It was the 18th straight victory and the 7th this season for the Democrats.

Coach Tom DeSilva cleared the bench. The Reno brothers led the onslaught as usual. Ray scored four times and Mel went over twice.

The Democrats churned out 523 offensive yards—75 per cent of it

by Raye Renfro and quarterback Terry Baker.

Jeff's Set Mark

The Jefferson season point total—332—shattered a 38-year-old Portland League mark set by Washington's champions of 1920 at 317.

The victory virtually assured the Democrats top billing for the fifth straight week in the Associated Press poll of sports writers and broadcasters.

No. 2 Medford belted Eureka, Calif., 33-0, but Crescent City, Calif., stopped No. 3 Roseburg 25-13. This dropped once-tied Roseburg from the unbeaten ranks.

Only Jefferson and Medford remained unbeaten among major Oregon prep squads as ninth place Baker fell 19-6 before Milton-Freewater.

North Salem, No. 4, dropped Sweet Home 42-0 and became the first team to qualify for the state tourney.

Astoria, in fifth, bowled over Hillsboro 31-0. The victory, a giant stride toward the Metropolitan League title, was paced by the two TD's each of Jerry Olson and Larry Hill.

Bucs Win

Marshfield topped South Eugene 34-0. North Bend was tied 19-19 by Springfield. Grants Pass beat Klamath Falls 32-0 and McMinnville defeated Tillamook 36-14.

A pair of Portland Leaguers just below the top ten easily defeated opponents. Roseburg dropped Madison 31-7 and Cleveland beat Benson 32-6.

Norm Patena, the driving Cleveland fullback, broke two 27-year-old Portland League records. He scored three TD's and one extra point, which brought his individual season scoring mark to 118 points.

This was one more than the 7-game record of 117 set back in 1931 by Bobby Grayson. He also tied the 9-game record of 118 set by Paul Goodard of Lincoln last year.

All other prep teams ranked in the poll secondary won handily. The scores were: Willamina 41, Philomath 0; Redmond 43, Madras 0; West Linn 52, Tigard 7; Pendleton 31, Hermiston 0; Vale 54, Payette (Idaho) 0; and Oregon City 33, Newberg 0.

There is a good deal of talk in each game, features of a full six-game NFL Sunday program. In the others, the Cleveland Browns bid for their fifth straight victory against the Cards at Chicago, the Detroit Lions meet the Rams at Los Angeles, the Pittsburgh Steelers challenge the Giants at New York, and the Philadelphia Eagles meet the Packers in Green Bay.

Baltimore Leads

The Colts lead the Western Conference with a 4-0 record, one step ahead of the Bears (3-1), who suffered their only loss at Baltimore.

Both the Bears and the 49ers (2-2) have an explosive scoring punch featuring breakaway halfbacks Willie Gailor of Chicago and San Francisco's Hugh McElhenry.

The Colts are 7½ point favorites over Washington and the Bears listed at 6½ over the 49ers.

The Rams (2-2) are favored by 9½ points to make it two in a row over defending champion Detroit, which has three losses and a tie to show for four starts.

The Giants are listed at 6 over Pittsburgh, while Green Bay (0-2-1) is a 3 point choice against Philadelphia (1-3).

More Salmon, Steelhead Spawn On Snake River

BOISE, Idaho (AP)—Despite the failure of its Oxbow fish trap, Idaho Power Co. said more salmon and steelhead have reached spawning grounds this year than did last year.

The officials said 11 per cent more fish had been transported around Brownlee and Oxbow dams in the Snake River than in 1957.

By Oct. 23, the company said, 19,277 salmon and steelhead had been taken upstream compared with 17,426 taken in the entire 12 months of 1957.

Fused Dynamite Found In A Rural Mailbox

MARSHALL, Wash. (AP)—A stick of fused dynamite was found in a rural mailbox near here Thursday and three hours later a shattering explosion rocked another farm house some 10 miles away.

Sheriff's officers said an "odd bomber" may be loose in Spokane County, a man who steals dynamite and delights in setting it off with no apparent motive.

Two dynamite explosions were touched off along a country road in the area Sunday and another house was damaged Wednesday.

There are some county and private dynamite warehouses in the region and thefts have been reported recently.

A short fuse on the stick of dynamite found in Robert Jacques' mailbox Thursday afternoon had been lit but went out before it caused an explosion.

Roseburg School Supt. M. C. Delier's office should spend more time in curriculum supervision, according to the school evaluation Subcommittee on Supervision.

The report on supervision was one of 12 subcommittee reports. The general committee did not make recommendations on this item.

The supervision subcommittee further states that greater priority could be placed on curriculum supervision in the superintendent's office if administrative duties are reduced through the employment of a business manager.

Art Supervision

Other opinions of the subcommittee are that no additional supervision is recommended for the special education department, supervision at the junior high schools is adequate at this time, health and physical education and vocal music supervisors are providing adequate supervision. A full-time supervisor of art and more time being given to supervision by principals also is recommended.

Roseburg's School Board should define its aims and objectives in a revised pamphlet, according to the Subcommittee on Administration.

The pamphlet should be given wider distribution and three similar pamphlets should be distributed concerning different phases of the Roseburg education program.

Other recommendations are: 1. The School Board should take full advantage of the information and services offered to it by the School Board operation and current problems. 2. The School Board should initiate a more thorough indoctrination program for Budget committee members to acquaint them with the needs of the district. 3. The School Board should be aggressive in presenting all phases of the educational program to the press and full use made of public service time over radio and television. 4. The board should have a formal induction ceremony for new teachers.

Adequate Housing

One of the recommendations has been brought up in School Board meeting several times. That is, adequate housing for the school administration. The recommendation on this point states the district should construct office space "as soon as the district is financially able."

Under the subcommittee report on achievement, it states that Roseburg school children are making progress in studies that compare favorably with national norms.

Three areas for further study were suggested. They are a program for superior and gifted students, the improvement of understanding of the attitudes and interests of children, and provision for continuity and sequence in the child's school experience so that he may grow and develop according to his potential.

Doing Good Job

"On the whole, our schools seem to be doing a good job," the report states. It goes on to say that "improvements certainly can and should be made."

Subcommittee recommendations of the administration group state the board should determine exact duties of the clerk's office and place them in writing, conduct more detailed audits, improve storage and warehousing facilities and simplify the procurement policy.

The board should also establish an adequate accounting system, see that the clerk is given some training in advance of assuming duties and responsibilities and make the clerk directly responsible to the board in accordance with the state law, according to this subcommittee.

Three Men Are Credited With Wave Of Burglaries

SALEM (AP)—Three men arrested early today were credited with a wave of mid-Willamette Valley burglaries since August.

Sheriff's Deputy John Zabinski said they admitted 30 of them, ranging from Oregon City south to the Sweet Home-Foster area and east to Falls City.

Howard Parker of Salem was jailed in Albany. David A. Connelly, 18, Salem and Eugene Harrison, 24, Scott Mills, were jailed here.

CASTING TROUBLE

SALEM (AP)—The Oregon State Hospital is having casting troubles for next Sunday's play at which the hospital will celebrate its 75th anniversary.

When practice started six weeks ago, 15 patients were given roles. But 11 of them have been sent home as cured.

Mrs. Marie Clark, director of the play, says the show will go on with replacements.

Search For Missing Pair Switches To Yukon Territory

FAIRBANKS, Alaska (AP)—The 62-day search for the missing Clarence Rhode party switched Friday to the vast Yukon territory.

Two ski-equipped Cessna 180's were sent to the area in a last ditch effort to find Rhode, 45, his son, Jack 21, and Stan Frederickson, fish and wildlife service agent here.

Rhode was area administrator for the FWS in Alaska.

Theron Smith of Anchorage, FWS aircraft supervisor and three other FWS men left Fairbanks in two planes to scour the Yukon.

Smith, pilot of one of the planes, said the Yukon had not been thoroughly searched previously and is considered a likely area on the theory Rhode may have been heading back to Fairbanks from the Arctic coast.

If so, the Yukon route would have been taken rather than the more difficult Brooks range approach.

Smith added it was possible Rhode may have been following a caribou herd roaming in the Alaska-Canada border area when the plane vanished.

The second Cessna was piloted by Roger Allen, biologist of the bureau of sports fisheries.

Two days will be devoted to the Yukon search. The party will put down Friday night at Old Crow, a village on the confluence of the Porcupine and Old Crow rivers about 100 miles east of the border.

The search party plans to return to Fairbanks Saturday night if their search of the Yukon and near-eastern approaches to the Brooks range is unsuccessful.

Apple Bits, Tire Marks Give Clue To Missing Boy

CALDWELL, N.J. (AP)—Fresh apple cores and bicycle tire marks in the mud around a hidden dug-out here are the latest clues in the nine-day-old search for young Paul Grochowicz.

The seven-year-old boy disappeared from his home in Pompton Lakes, about nine miles away, Oct. 15. That was the day he jumped on a girl's bicycle and rode off, saying he was going to visit his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Stephen Paine. They live in Tacoma, Wash.

Police estimated 1,000 persons would take part in Saturday's search, fanning over six communities. The search will center around the dugout, which was uncovered Friday.

"This is the hottest clue yet," said Pompton Lakes Police Chief William F. Charles. He said someone had been living in the dugout since the rains ended Thursday, and police believed Paul may have used it as a hide-out since last Saturday, two days after he disappeared.

The hunt focused here after some boys remembered playing with someone answering Paul's description on Saturday.

Paul is the son of Peter Grochowicz, a representative of the Boeing Airplane Co. He moved to Pompton Lakes from Tacoma with his family seven weeks ago as an adviser on work being done at the Kearslett Co., in nearby Little Falls. The family was to return to Tacoma as soon as the job was finished.

Paul left, police said, after a misunderstanding with his teacher and his father. He had said several times he was homesick for his grandparents.

Congregational Church Will Rise In Hucrest Dist.

Members of the Congregational Church in the Roseburg area are looking forward to the day when they will attend services in a house of worship of their own.

Members of the church have attended services under makeshift arrangements for some time. But the first step toward a bonafide church building was taken this

month when a spacious tract of property was purchased in North-west Roseburg's Hucrest District.

The property, located on the 1500 block of NW Keasey St., formerly was owned by Walter J. Olmscheid. Congregationalists have used the former Olmscheid house as a place of worship since the property was purchased.

Serving as pastor is the Rev. Edward A. West, who operates a ranch near Oakland. The interim pastor noted that the congregation

officially was accepted as a church last Sunday by the Oregon Council of the Congregational Church.

The Rev. N. C. Wallin, chaplain at Roseburg Veterans Hospital, and student missionary Robert Kettelhut have served as pastors in past months. Services have been held at various times at the hospital chapel, the Rev. Wallin's home and at Edenbower School on NW Garden Valley Rd.

The Rev. West said plans call for construction of the church building atop an incline overlooking the VA Hospital at the rear of the two and three-fourths acres of land. He said a playground will be installed on the frontage portion of the property.

Arthur Godfrey Unhurt In Helicopter Crash

LEESBURG, Va. (AP)—Arthur Godfrey escaped injury when his helicopter crash landed here Friday, but the two-place craft was wrecked.

The radio-TV entertainer blamed the mishap on a "malfunction of some kind." He said the trouble developed when the helicopter was about a foot from the ground as it came in for a landing.

Godfrey has a home at Leesburg, which is about 30 miles from Washington.

NAMED CAPTAIN

SALEM (AP)—Hoyt C. Cupp, a penitentiary correctional officer for 10 years, will be captain in charge of custody at the state reformatory, Supt. P. J. Squier said today.

The reformatory, which will be for first offenders, is now under construction east of Salem. It will be open about March 1.

Cupp has been in charge of the training program for officers at the prison for the past four years.
