KEEP ALL MEDICINES UNDER LOCK AND KEY



A local pharmacist today warned parents of small children — keep all apparently harmless non-prescription drugs and medicines under lock and key.

"The seemingly innocent aspirin tablet sends more than 100,000 preschool age children to hospital emergency rooms each year," E. R. (Buck) Buckingham, owner of Fullerton Rexall Drugs, declared.

He pointed out also that improper use and overdosages of drugs and medicines is the number one cause of accidental poisoning among all ages.

"Don't place any pharmaceutical product where children can reach it. Not even the top shelf of the medicine cabinet is safe. Lock it up," he cautioned.

He explained that non-prescription drugs and medicines if properly used in recommended dosages with due regard for any caution or warning information on the label afford safe and effective relief for minor temporary discomforts for which they are intended.

However, according to Buckingham, it is foolhardy to suppose that a product is harmless merely because it can be purchased without a prescription.

"To the pharmacist, there is no such thing as a 'harmless' drug or medicine. If it is to have any pain-killing or curative value at all, it has to contain potentially dangerous ingredients," he emphasized.

Buckingham suggested what to do if a child should accidentally swallow a drug or medicine:

Make him vomit immediately. Then rush him to a physician or hospital as fast as possible.
