

Second Phase Of Colombo Plan Economic Conference Opens In Seattle Monday

SEATTLE (AP) — The second phase of the Colombo Plan Economic Conference opens today with officials of 18 nations and three colonial governments searching for means to expand the rate of economic growth in Communist-threatened South and Southeast Asia.

Preliminary studies by technical experts indicated greater assistance will be needed from the United States, Britain, Canada and Japan.

Charles W. Adair Jr., head of the 11-man U.S. delegation and host to the officials was expected to be named conference chairman at an opening plenary session.

Gov. Albert D. Rosellini of Washington and Mayor Gordon S. Clinton of Seattle arranged to welcome the delegates at a midday flag-raising ceremony.

Prepare Papers
In the first round of talks last week, technical experts from all of the Colombo countries prepared working papers on lagging economies in an area subject to mounting Communist pressures.

Political differences are parked outside the conference room. There is too great a split between such neutral nations as India, Indonesia, Ceylon and Burma on one hand and the Philippines, Thailand, Pakistan and South Vietnam on the other for any discussion of a political nature.

Instead, the delegates concentrate on common economic problems and how they best can be met.

The Colombo Plan was organized in Ceylon in 1950 as a consultative group in which the advanced industrial nations cooperate in assistance to the less developed nations.

Outside help to the needy new countries of free Asia has taken a variety of forms.

Trained 2,000 Students
Australia has trained more than 2,000 Colombo Plan students in en-

gineering, nursing, science, education, teacher training and agriculture. Technical training will be stepped up by Japan, the United States, Britain and Canada.

Canada has given more than 200 million dollars in assistance and expects to expand this with larger supplies of wheat to India and Pakistan.

Canada provided India with an atomic reactor and a hydroelectric generating station, aided Pakistan with a power project and supplied equipment for a technical high school in Burma.

Japan provided medium term loans to exporters of capital equipment and sent 76 experts to other Asian countries. India has provided technical experts for Ceylon, Indonesia and Singapore and helped Nepal with road building, irrigation and water supply.

Britain is planning to step up its supply of credit and private investments after making available more than 300 million dollars in grants and loans.

The United States has provided more than 2½ billion dollars in economic and technical assistance through grants and loans.

Weekend Highway Accidents Blamed For Two Deaths

A traffic accident claimed a life today, and raised Oregon's weekend traffic toll to two persons.

John Huff, 64, Astoria, died in a Hillsboro hospital today of injuries suffered in a Sunday accident.

Police said a car driven by George Wilde, 59, Portland, was sideswiped by another car and thrown into the path of the Huff car.

Wilde and Mrs. Jennie Huff, 55, Astoria, both were hospitalized. Both were reported in good condition.

Earlier, William Edward Bauer, 24, Portland, was killed while en route to lunch.

State police said a car in which Bauer was riding skidded off the Pacific Highway near Salem and toppled end over end along a ditch. He was thrown out and crushed beneath the car.

Police said the driver, Jack Myers of Milwaukee, suffered broken ribs.

Another Oregon man, Jesse William Hackey, 48, was killed while walking along U.S. Highway near Merced, Calif.

Merced County Coroner Kenneth Riggs said Hackey, a transient farm worker, listed his address as Box 155, Rt. 2, Hood River. He had been working in Merced County.

Sutherland Man Succumbs To Heart Attack Sunday

Earl Salisbury, 67, Sutherland, died Sunday afternoon from a heart attack.

Salisbury was born Aug. 19, 1891, at Centralia, Wash., and had spent his entire life on the Pacific Coast.

He is survived by his wife, Ruby; two sons, Euryce and Jimmy; two daughters, Mylene and Carol; all of Sutherland, and two sisters, Mrs. Danny Green of Oakland and Mrs. Jessie Stevenson of Washington state.

Funeral services will be Wednesday at 1 p.m. at the Calapooia Free Methodist Church with the Rev. Harvey Timm officiating. Burial will be in Fair Oaks Cemetery.

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Man Arrested For Attempt To Dynamite Car

PORTLAND (AP) — A Tigard man was in jail today in connection with an attempt to dynamite a car that police said could easily have taken the life of a Portland woman.

Police said Roger H. Mobley was held in lieu of \$10,000 bail on charges of unlawful use of explosives with intent to injure persons and property.

Detectives Roy Benson and Ray Duerst arrested Mobley, whose car matched a description given by Mrs. Scott Partridge.

Mrs. Partridge told officers this story:

She said she was visiting a neighbor when she heard a hotrod racing in the neighborhood and she spotted someone near her car.

She called and the person fled, but returned later. She rushed out and found four bullet holes in the smoking car.

Frightened, she called her husband and police, who found two sticks of dynamite that had failed to explode because a copper fuse failed to detonate.

Police said the faulty fuse saved the woman from being blown up. Another blast damaged a brick wall and two windows at the All-state Insurance Co. at 1035 E. Burnside St.

Two others, which police believed were touched off by a different person, exploded near a school and a golf course southwest of Portland, but neither caused serious damage.

Another Army Man On Trial

FT. JACKSON, S.C. (AP) — An Army sergeant, charged with threatening to hang one recruit and mistreating others, was accused by the government today with dictatorial and sadistic use of power.

Sgt. L.C. Charles Moman, 28, of Empire, Ala., pleaded innocent to all charges at the outset of his general court-martial before a board composed of six officers and three enlisted men.

Most of the recruits called to testify against Moman had testified last week at the general court-martial which led to the conviction of M. Sgt. George Sovie on similar charges. Sovie, 30, of Ogdensburg, N. Y., was reduced one rank and fined \$450.

One of the specifications alleges that Moman tied a rope around the neck of Pvt. Jimmy Cope of Mountain Creek, Ala., threw the rope over the limb of a tree and tugged on it as if to carry out a threat to hang the youth.

Pvt. Benjamin Flint of Norfolk, Va., testified that Moman slapped and kicked him for brushing at a fly during a company formation.

"I was too scared to defend myself," Flint said.

Nixon Maintains Dramatic Upsurge In GOP Strength

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Vice President Nixon's claim that there has been a dramatic upsurge in Republican strength in the congressional campaign drew a Democratic challenge today.

Rep. Eugene McCarthy, contesting GOP Sen. Edward J. Thye, said Nixon was whistling in the dark with a statement Sunday night that there had been a striking shift in voter opinion in the last 10 days.

"If this has happened, no one but Nixon has been able to discern it," McCarthy said in an interview. "I have been campaigning four months and there is nothing to indicate a change in the Democratic tide."

McCarthy is regarded in the Republican camp as one of the states where the GOP may be able to stem the Democratic current that seems likely to increase the latter party's hold on both houses of Congress.

Local observers count Democratic Gov. Orville Freeman as a sure bet for re-election over his Republican opponent, George Mackinnon.

Nixon said anybody who tries to predict the outcome of this and other races across the nation at this point is likely to "find him- self as confused as a beginner with a hula hoop."

He said polls which predict a Democratic victory reflect conditions of 10 days ago, not now.

"It is in these last 10 days," Nixon said, "that I personally have witnessed the most striking shift of voter opinion that I have ever seen in any political campaign."

With this in mind, McCarthy said he wondered if Nixon got his information on Minnesota in South Dakota and Nebraska — the two states where the vice president campaigned Saturday.

Neuberger Says Tax, Other Issues Political Football

PORTLAND (AP) — The 1959 will find it increasingly difficult to solve tax and fiscal problems because they have become a political football, Sen. Richard Neuberger (D-Ore.) said yesterday.

Mark Hatfield, the Republican candidate for governor, simultaneously promised to remove thousands of homes from tax rolls and to provide new educational institutions and scholarship funds.

Neuberger said.

Then Hatfield promised new conservation program and opposed new taxes, Neuberger said, adding:

"Has he found some substitute for money in the financing of such benefits?"

Neuberger said he voted against a federal income tax reduction in the last Congress because it would have been inconsistent to vote otherwise when he asked appropriations for Klamath Indian reservation, the John Day Dam and the Fort Clatsop National Memorial Shrine.

"It is downright demagoguery for any politician to tell the people in one breath he is going to increase government bounties and benefits and in the other breath he is going to cut down their taxes," he said.

Pilot Is Killed As Light Plane Crashes House

CLARKSTON, Wash. (AP) — A light plane crashed into a house on the edge of the Clarkston airport early Monday, killing the pilot and the four persons sleeping in the house.

Ralph Schmidt, about 40, a prominent Weippe, Idaho, lumberman, apparently was killed instantly when the plane struck a power line, smashed into the bedroom of the house and exploded.

Somehow, Mr. and Mrs. Allan Johnson, who were sleeping in the bedroom, managed to scramble to safety with their two young children before fire destroyed their home.

The children were sleeping in another bedroom.

"I thought the furnace had exploded," Johnson said. "We were mighty lucky."

Schmidt apparently had taken off in for about 5:30 a.m. on a flight to his lumber mill.

The Johnson house was at the end of the runway at 520 Monroe Street here.

Urges Holmes Re-election
Neuberger sent out some 400 letters to conservative Saturday, urging re-election of Holmes.

He said that while in the Legislature, Hatfield supported Portland General Electric Co.'s Pelton Dam while Holmes opposed it.

Neuberger said that raised a question whether Hatfield would stand up for conservation, against pressure groups, if he were governor.

An advertisement for Hatfield was rejected by the Oregon Labor Press, Lamar Toole, Hatfield campaign chairman, said today, adding that the newspaper had attacked Hatfield editorially, then denied him the right to reply even in a paid advertisement.

James Goodsell, Labor Press editor, said it had long been a policy to accept political advertising only from candidates endorsed by labor. It is a small newspaper, he said, and without such a policy "it would be easy for candidates unfriendly to labor to blanket the entire paper."

The 3rd District congressional campaign in which Republican John Johnston seeks to unseat Rep. Edith Green, continued quiet as it has been throughout. Elsewhere, candidates were on a busy speaking schedule.

In the Eastern congressional district, Rep. Al Ullman, the incumbent Democrat, urged more conservation measures and his opponent, Republican Marion Weatherford, called for an end to what he termed a federal government spending spree.

Around-The-World In-50-Days Show Ended For Banfe

NEW YORK (AP) — Around-the-world-in-50 days, a one-man show starring pilot Charles F. Banfe Jr. in his stocking feet aboard a single-engine plane, has closed after an extended run.

Banfe, 39-year-old flier from Palo Alto, Calif., touched down at Idlewild Airport Sunday in his low-winged Mooney single-seater to complete in 50 days a 22,000-mile globe-circling flight he had planned to accomplish in eight days.

"Boy, am I glad to be back," said Banfe as he climbed wearily from his orange and black craft into a chilling rain. "I thought I'd never see this airport again."

Banfe began his around-the-world flight from Idlewild Sept. 6. He said he flew at altitudes from 150 to 12,500 feet and sat at the controls in his stocking feet because it gave him a "more sensitive feel."

Banfe's ambitious plan received a setback on the first leg — a planned nonstop hop from New York to Rome, 4,312 miles away.

A balky fuel pump forced him to crash-land on the Mediterranean island of Corsica, 230 miles short of his goal.

Bad weather and mechanical difficulties plagued him the rest of the way, and he had to make forced landings 12 times. Various troubles added 12 unscheduled cities to his itinerary.

Banfe, married and the father of four, is on vacation from Pan American World Airways. He regularly flies the Pacific.

Caril Ann Fugate Goes On Trial

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — Caril Ann Fugate, 13-year-old companion of convicted killer Charles R. Starkweather on a three-day bloody rampage last January, goes on trial today for her life.

Caril is being tried on the same charges on which her bow-legged ex-sweetheart was convicted and sentenced to die Dec. 12 in the electric chair. Starkweather admitted involvement in 11 deaths, 10 while with Caril.

The state needs only to convince the jury that Caril aided and abetted Starkweather in the slaying of Robert Jensen, 17, Bennett, Neb., to qualify for her first degree murder conviction and one of two penalties — life imprisonment or death.

Selection of a jury is expected to take three days at least.

The couple's three-day flight was marked by the finding of bodies of six slaying victims in Lincoln, including Caril's parents and half-sister, three at nearby Bennet and one in Wyoming where they were captured. Starkweather also admitted killing a Lincoln filling station attendant in a robbery attempt.

Caril has denied any part in the killings.

Starkweather has told conflicting stories, including one that he tried to surrender and she wouldn't let him.

Missing Auto Found Wrecked South Of Here

State police reported today a 1955 car belonging to Curtis Birdge 2136 SE Crescent St., Roseburg, was found abandoned and wrecked early Sunday morning south of the city along 98BR.

Bridges reported the vehicle missing about 12:30 a.m. yesterday after finding it gone from its location in front of a south side tavern. At 3 a.m. it was located near the Winston cutoff by the side of the road.

Another car, stolen over the weekend, is still being sought by police. It was a 1951 sedan belonging to William K. McFarland of 246 NE Chestnut St., Roseburg.

The owner reported the right front door was smashed and the rear bumper loose.

Police also reported locating an abandoned vehicle in a ditch early and a half north of Scotts Valley Junction on Highway 99. The owner had not been identified this morning. However, it was not the McFarland car, they said.

Private Schools Being Expanded At Little Rock

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) — The expanding private school system prepared today to admit another group of Little Rock's displaced white high school students.

Orientation programs were scheduled for about 250 juniors enrolled with the Little Rock Private School Corp. and for about 350 students—sophomores, juniors and seniors—who will attend a new Baptist High School. Classes for them will begin Tuesday.

The corporation school was organized as the principal replacement for the three white public high schools closed by Gov. Orval Faubus to avoid court-ordered integration. It began classes for 229 seniors Tuesday and expects to get its program in full operation Nov. 3 with the start of classes for sophomores.

The Baptist High School and several interim church schools were set up to take care of the overflow.

No private school has been established for Negro students, whose public high school also was closed.

The governor's closing order last month left a total of 3,698 high school students without classrooms. However, many of them found other ways to continue their studies.

Nuclear Blast Readied Today

ATOMIC TEST SITE, Nev. (AP) — The Atomic Energy Commission readied a small nuclear device for firing today and rushed plans for three more blasts before the Friday test ban deadline set by President Eisenhower.

Two powerful explosions rocked the desert Sunday, the 13th and 14th in the current series and the 10th in two weeks of unprecedented activity at the Nevada test site.

The shot scheduled for today has a force of less than one kiloton, which means less than 1,000 tons of TNT. It will be fired from a 50-foot steel tower.

Blasts in tunnels in the side of a mesa are scheduled for Tuesday and Wednesday. Tuesday's below surface blast will be less than half of nominal. A nominal blast has the force of 20 kilotons, about the same as those which shattered Hiroshima and Nagasaki in World War II.

Also scheduled for Tuesday is a sub-kiloton shot from a 50-foot tower.

Wednesday's underground blast, dubbed Blanca, will be a big one, packing 20 kilotons of power.

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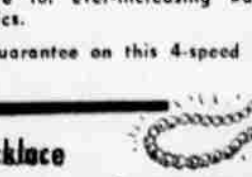


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
