

LSU Replaces Army In AP Poll

Three teams in the top 10 of the Associated Press weekly college football poll are unbeaten and untied, but at least one of them will have its record smeared next Saturday.

Louisiana State, which displaced Army as the No. 1 team this week takes on Mississippi, No. 6, at Baton Rouge.

Colorado is the only other top 10 team with a spotless record, and it is in dire peril. The Buffs, No. 9, meet Oklahoma. The Sooners, No. 7, and with a one-point defeat by Texas the only blemish on their record, have been picking up speed lately.

LSU displaced Army after the cadets played a 14-14 tie with Pittsburgh, Iowa, with a penchant for knocking off previously unbeaten teams, defeated Northwestern last Saturday and moved from seventh place to second.

Army moved up from fifth to fourth, and Ohio State, No. 2, a week ago, dropped to fifth as a result of its tie with Wisconsin.

The remaining top 10 teams as reported by the sports writers and sportscasters, in order: Mississippi, Oklahoma, Wisconsin, Colorado and Purdue.

LSU garnered 54 first-place votes in piling up 1,194 points for first place, Iowa was top choice of 33 voters as it accumulated 1,055 points. Army was first choice of 20 voters and Auburn of 23.

Three newcomers jumped into the top 10. Wisconsin took over the No. 8 spot on the strength of its tie with Ohio State; Colorado, beating Nebraska, now is No. 9; and Purdue, winning over Notre Dame, is No. 10. They replace Texas, Northwestern and Clemson all beaten Saturday.

Whitehurst Rates Johansson Over Heavy Champ

NEW YORK (AP) — Heavyweight Bert Whitehurst, who has trained with both, firmly believes Sweden's undefeated Ingemar Johansson will "dethrone" World Heavyweight Champion Floyd Patterson if they ever meet.

"Don't let anyone under-rate that Johansson," said Whitehurst today. "I saw him knock out Eddie Machen in the first round. It was no fluke, either. I predicted Johansson would beat him and I think he could beat him 10 out of 10 times."

Johansson is a very good fighter. He has a good left jab, a sneaky fast and powerful right hand and an excellent left hook. And he can take a good punch, too, if you hit him. But he's hard to hit square."

Johansson, 26, 6-feet and 198 pounds, has won all 21 of his pro fights, 13 of them by knockouts. Machen had been unbeaten in 25 fights, including a draw with Zora Folley, when he was flattened by Ingemar at Goteborg, Sept. 14.

Whitehurst, who lost a 10-rounder to Sonny Liston last Friday night, is very high on the hard-hitting Philadelphia.

Liston drapped Whitehurst over the ropes in the final seconds and the bell saved Bert from a knock-out. It was Liston's 14th straight victory and the 20th in 21 pro fights for the 26-year-old contender. He has scored 12 knockouts.

"He still has a lot to learn but he can beat most everyone around anyway," said Whitehurst. "His trouble is getting the other guys in the top ten to fight him. He and Johansson would make a great fight."

Meanwhile, Manager Bobby Gleason has given up hopes of matching his contender, Cuban Nino Valdes, with Patterson.

"Cus (Cus D'Amato, Patterson's manager) is mad at me. I guess," said Gleason. "He's mad at everyone except Patterson I think."

"I guess we'll have to go to Europe again," said Gleason. "My guy won six straight over there."

Sports PCL Prexy Is 'Dubious' On Expansion

SPOKANE (AP) — Directors of the Pacific Coast Baseball League gave 68-year-old Leslie O'Connor "a solid vote of confidence" here Monday in renewing his 1959 contract as president of the league.

O'Connor was no sooner comfortably back in the driver's seat when he put the damper down sharply on hopes of enlarging PCL membership, despite the fact directors voted approval of expansion to 10 or 12 teams, provided qualified cities were available.

O'Connor called league expansion possibilities "dubious."

New Members Mentioned

(Denver, Long Beach, Calif., and Edmonton, Alta., had been mentioned as possible new circuit members.)

The directors discussed O'Connor for three hours in a morning session then issued this afternoon statement:

"The Pacific Coast Baseball League unanimously reaffirms president Leslie O'Connor's contract for 1959 in a solid vote of confidence."

The statements, issued under the name of Dick Walsh, acting league president, who is president of the Spokane Indians, killed any talk about O'Connor being benched for a younger man. There was speculation earlier that general manager Soriano, former general manager of the Seattle Rainiers, might be in line for the job.

State Approved

Directors at a dinner-time meeting approved a 154-game schedule for 1959 to start in the four Southern league cities April 10. Northern cities opening dates would be two weeks later. They picked San Diego as the site of the 1959 all-star game, as close to July 4 as possible.

Consideration of any new teams probably will be hashed over Tuesday. In any event, the meeting here will be only recessed until after the minor league meeting on the possible realignment as held in Memphis, Nov. 5. PCL directors will get together in Washington, D. C., after the Nationals conference.

Runnels Wins 'Comeback' Title

NEW YORK (AP) — Pistol Pete Runnels of the Boston Red Sox, who moved up from a .230 batting average to shoot a near bull's-eye for the batting title, made the American League Comeback-of-the-Year in 1958.

This was the majority opinion of the 103 members of the Baseball Writers' Assn. of America who participated in the annual Associated Press poll.

Runnels collected 61 votes. Bob Cerv of Kansas City was next with 20, followed by Cal McLish of Cleveland with 9, Arnie Portocarrero of Baltimore, 8, Yogi Berra of New York 2 and Jack Harshman and Hoyt Wilhelm of Baltimore and Mickey Vernon of Cleveland, 1 each.

Runnels, 30, with a .322 batting mark, finished second to teammate Ted Williams in a torrid race that was not decided until the final day. Williams wound up with .328.

In 134 games with Washington in 1957, Runnels collected only 109 hits and had his poorest of seven years in the majors. He was traded to Boston last Jan. 23 for Albie Plant and Norm Zauchin.

Cerv batted .305 with 38 homers and 104 runs batted in in the past season. His hefty hitting kept the Athletics in the first division over the initial half of the season. In 1957, the big outfielder hit only .272 with 11 homers and 44 RBIs.

McLish, a journeyman right-handed pitcher, was the ace of the Indians' staff. He won 15 games and lost eight, finishing with a commendable earned run average of 2.99. Cal's record last year was 9-7.

Portocarrero was another in the long line of Paul Richards' re-treads. The Baltimore manager obtained him for pitcher Bud Daley of Kansas City last April 18.

Hurdle-Like Yard-Line Stripes Draw Attention

BATON ROUGE, La. (AP) — The old chestnut about players tripping over the yard-line stripes was never truer than on Saturday night's Louisiana State-Florida game.

Florida Coach Bob Woodruff was the first to notice something was amiss. He wasn't too happy anyway, since the highly-rated Bengals had whipped his team 10-7.

Woodruff went to the LSU dressing room to congratulate rival coach Paul Dietzel.

"I'm not alibiing," Woodruff said. "But those yard-line stripes are just like oyster shells. Why, it's like having ropes stretched across the field."

So Dietzel asked a reporter to test the yard line markers with a few well-aimed kicks.

The reporter did, and was immediately sorry he had. The harmless looking stripes were like hunks of concrete rising an inch or so above grass level.

"I thought something was strange, the way the boys kept falling down," Woodruff said. "Obviously, a poor line solution was used to mark the field."

"But no complaints," Woodruff said. "After all, the LSU team had to run across the same stripes."

Famed London Boxing Arena To Be Warehouse

LONDON (AP) — Twenty-two-year-old Harrington Arena breathes its last tonight and among the mourners on hand will be former world champions Henry Armstrong, Max Baer and Les Lesnevich.

The famous old club will become a grocer's warehouse after the card of three 10-rounders topped by one between British lightweight champion Dave Charlley and Carlos Ortiz of New York.

Cards Bomb Japanese For 9-1 Diamond Win

SAPPORO, Japan (AP) — The St. Louis Cardinals bombarded four Japanese pitchers for 10 hits, including a three-run homer by first baseman Joe Cunningham, and defeated the Japan All-Stars 9-1 today.

Redbird starter Bob Blaylock gave up only two hits, one of them an inside the park circuit clout, in seven innings. Wilmer (Vinegar Bend) Mizell finished up, allowing one hit.

The National Leaguers came back with a vengeance to make up for their 6-3 defeat Monday — the only one thus far in the four games played in their 15-game tour of Japan.

Rochester Gridders Seek Shutout Slate

ROCHESTER, N.Y. (AP) — Unbeaten, untied, and unscored on for the first time in the school's history — that's the ambition of the University of Rochester football team.

The Yellowjackets have a good start. They've racked up Allegheny, Hobart, Union, Vermont, and Kings' Point with 157 points to none. They have only to dispose of DePaul on Nov. 1, Tufts Nov. 8 and RPI Nov. 15.

Rochester's undefeated, untied and unscored on status is a nationwide exclusive. The Yellowjackets had one previous undefeated season — 1952 — when they won eight games, but that team was scored on.

Portland Pair Leads In The Dalles Golf Event

THE DALLES (AP) — The top pro-amateur pair at the \$1,500 The Dalles Country Club invitational tournament Monday was Bill Egger and Jim West, the amateur. Both are from Portland.

Eggers and West gained a first round lead when they shot a seven under par 65 Sunday, but fell into a final four-way tie Monday with a 71 for a 136 total. They fired two birdies to win the two-hole sudden death playoff.

Other high scores: Dick Hanson 201, Ed Oldfield and Dr. Ed Palmrose, amateurs, of Astoria; pro Joe Greer of Yakima and Jack Heva of The Dalles; and pro Sid Harman and Vic Pitzer, both of Yakima.

Enthusiastic Cougar Fans Go On Spelling

A chartered bus carrying the Cougar football squad stopped here en route from Pullman to Spokane Saturday morning. The coach was decked out with a long streamer on each side, bearing football slogans in black letters a foot and a half high.

One side read: "Kill Call!" The other: "Trounce the Trojans."

Moore-Durrelle Battle Might Go To Toronto

MONTREAL (AP) — The Dec. 10 light heavyweight title bout between champion Archie Moore and Yves Durrelle, the Canadian champ, may be shifted from Montreal to Toronto.

Promoter Eddie Quinn said he was negotiating with Toronto promoter Frank Tunney because of the five per cent tax the Montreal Athletic Commission imposes on fight proceeds. Quinn said the commission also is attempting to tax American television of the bout.

In Toronto, the tax bite would be two per cent.

'Papa Bear' Is In Hassle With SF Pro Fans

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Papa Bear George Halas arouses animosity among West Coast pro football adherents on a week to week basis.

In the latest episode, an infuriated San Francisco 49er fan tossed a punch at him during halftime Sunday and landed in jail.

That made three straight Sundays that the 68-year-old owner and coach of the Chicago club has become an object of acrimony — first when the 49ers lost in Chicago, then when Los Angeles lost there and finally as the Bears won here.

Three weeks ago San Francisco Coach Frank Albert charged Halas influenced the officiating as the 49ers lost 28-0. Then an assistant Ram coach declared someone was tapping his telephone conversation in the Los Angeles bench.

And there were general complaints that Halas strayed out of the coaching confines between the 40-yard lines.

Bears Boos

With that background the crowd of 59,441 in Kezar Stadium flexed its vocal muscles with mighty boos as Halas and his Bears took the field.

The noise became crescendo in the second quarter with the Bears leading 10-7. Referee Ron Gibbs signaled that 49er Leo Nomellini recovered a fumble by Chicago's Willie Calhoun at the San Francisco 24.

Backfield Judge George Smith overruled, saying he had blown his whistle ending the play before the fumble. After a huddle, watched closely by a gesturing Halas at the sideline, the officials awarded the ball to Chicago.

For six minutes the howls of anguish drowned out even the public address system. At the intermission, Albert, Halas and some players conferred with officials at midfield.

Fans Attack

As the session broke up, some fans swarmed onto the field and one swung at Halas. Albert pulled the fan away and assistant Chicago coaches threw punches at the assailant before police hooked him on a charge of battery. He was identified as 33-year-old William Dunn of Palo Alto, Calif.

Boeing continued throughout the game, won by the Bears 27-14 as they stayed in second place of the NFL Western Conference.

In the dressing rooms, 49er President Vic Mearns and Albert apologized to Halas who replied: "You can't help that."

Next stop for the Bears and Mr. Halas—the Memorial Coliseum in Los Angeles for a game with the Rams on Sunday.

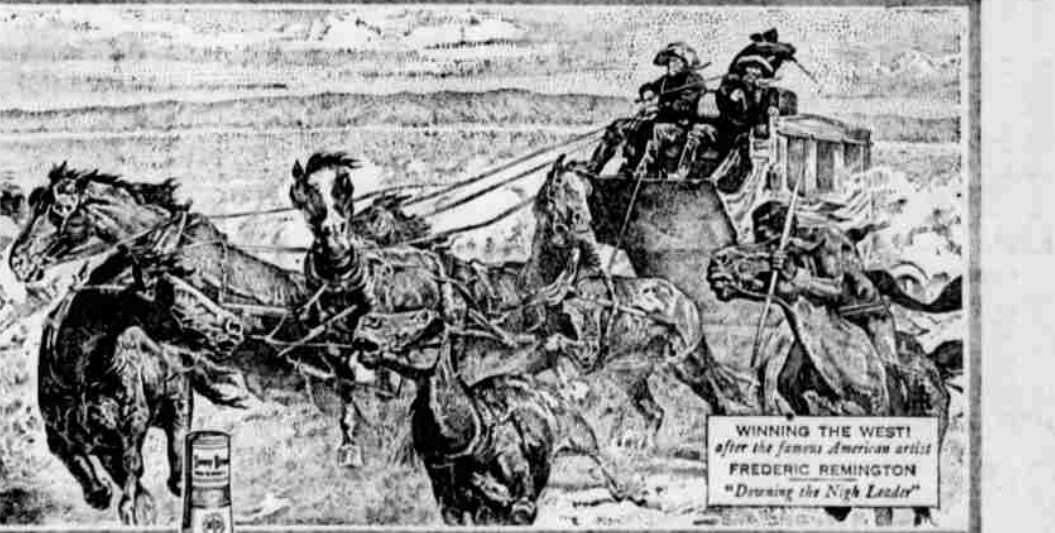
