

Supreme Court To Rule On Security Disk Firing

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Supreme Court agreed today to review a defense plant's firing of an \$18,000-a-year vice president because the Navy Department questioned his security qualifications. The main legal issue is whether the Defense Department has exclusive authority to rule on security qualifications of workers in plants having government contracts. The case is that of William L. Greene, former vice president of the Engineering and Research Corp. of Riverdale, Md. Greene was fired in 1953 after the Navy wrote the company that to continue to give him access to classified security information would be inconsistent with the best interests of national security. Greene denied charges that he had associated with Communists and Communist supporters.
