

Cougar Coach Trying End To Solve Quarterback Woes

Even with two injured quarterbacks, the Washington State Cougars may not be at wit's end. They may just rely on an end's wits.

Coach Jim Sutherland pulled Mike Agee out of one of the end positions Tuesday night and had him running at quarterback with the first unit. Agee's competence at the new position was such that Sutherland said he might start him there against UCLA in Los Angeles Saturday.

Actually, quarterbacking is not entirely new to Agee. He played the position part time for the WSC from two years ago. And he did some passing in high school.

Until Tuesday night, Sutherland had indicated he would go with his No. 3 quarterback, George Price, against UCLA. The No. 1 man, Bobby Newman, definitely is out for the week because of a knee injury. Newman's first replacement, Dave Wilson, suffered an eye injury in the USC game last week. Wilson was expected to be back at practice again Wednesday, however, and may be ready to play Saturday.

UCLA Changes Due
UCLA drilled behind closed doors again and Coach Bill Barnes said after the practice that he'll make at least two changes in his starting lineup. Phil Parslow will be at wingback instead of Marv Luster, and Tony Lango will replace Paul Oglesby at left tackle.

Another closed session was held at Corvallis, where the Oregon State Beavers are getting ready for their critical game with California. Cal goes into the weekend with a 3-0 record in Pacific Coast Conference action and the Beavers are right behind at 2-1.

OSC Coach Tommy Prothro said California's Joe Kapp "probably is the best T-formation college quarterback I have ever seen."

"When the season started," Prothro said, "I felt Cal would be improved. But I sure didn't think they would improve this much."

From Berkeley, however, there was evidence that Oregon State will see more than the T-formation Saturday. Cal Coach Pete Elliott said he'll use the single wing against both OSC and UCLA.

The Bears haven't employed this formation since the Michigan State game early in the season.

Two Bears Injured
Cal may be two men short for the OSC game. Center Frank Dorsetti has a sprained ankle and left halfback Hank Olguin has two of them.

Washington Coach Jim Owens ran his squad through another vigorous scrimmage and remarked: "They were hitting better, but they'll have to improve a lot before they're ready to take on Oregon."

At Eugene, Oregon's first unit ran through an offensive scrimmage and scored three touchdowns in 17 minutes against reserves.

The doctors had encouraging words for the Southern California Trojans. Willie Wood, USC's first-string quarterback, will be ready to play against Stanford Saturday.

Wood, injured early in the season, had trouble with his left arm in the WSC game Saturday, but the medical staff said he emerged in no worse condition than he entered.

At Stanford, guard Larry Lacey and halfback Dick Bowers returned to practice after being idled by injuries. The Indians scrimmaged against USC plays and Coach Jack Curtice said: "We've got a long way to go but I think we're making real progress."

Idaho Coach Skip Stahley, drilling for another non-conference game—against San Jose State—said three of his men may be idle Saturday. Fullback Ken Ifall, end J. D. Lawson and halfback Mike Sheeran were injured in the Arizona game last week.

Big Offensive Show Seen In Colorado-Sooners Contest

Colorado, the nation's only major college football team that has gained more than 400 yards a game all season, and Oklahoma, which has rolled in oldtime form for 893 yards in its last two games, collide Saturday at Boulder, Colo. Something's gotta give.

That was the indication today from the weekly NCAA Service Bureau team statistics.

The figures show Colorado's Golden Buffaloes, who have been showing the way in rushing offense for three weeks, also have climbed to the top in total offense, displacing the Army team that was limited to 165 yards by Pittsburgh.

Oklahoma, which dropped out of sight, statistically speaking, after its loss to Texas, has come right back in routing Kansas and Kansas State and now is fourth in total offense and fifth in rushing.

Colorado is second and Oklahoma third in the major scoring race behind Rutgers.

Here's how the comparative statistics look:

Rushing — Colorado has averaged 347.2 yards per game to 233.3 yards for runner — up Brigham Young. Oklahoma's fifth place average is 233.6. The Buffs have gained more running yards in five games than any other team has gained in six.

BYU, unranked last week, picked up 465 against Montana to move into second place. Total offense — Colorado, with an average gain of 411.2 yards a game, is the only team above the 400 yard level which at least one major team has reached for the full season every year since 1941.

It's Army 385.6 yards, Iowa 383.8 and Oklahoma 382.2 in a close race for second.

Scoring — Rutgers, with 173 points in five games, has an average of 34.6 per game. Colorado has a 31.2 average and Oklahoma 30 even. Other high scoring teams are Houston, 29.3; Syracuse, 28.8; Northwestern, 27.8; Army, 26.8; VMI, 25.3 and Virginia and Tulsa, 23.2.

The inconsistency of forward passers has been one of the season's mysteries and this week saw five new teams in the first ten.

Hardin-Simmons held its place as the No. 1 team. The Texans are first in attempts (190), completions (91), yards (979) and gains per game (163.2).

Navy, which made 545 yards and 50 points in a breeze against Penn., moved from 13th to second with a 158-yard average. San Jose State and Holy Cross, now third and fourth, came up from 15th and 18th. Iowa and Wake Forest also joined the top ten.

Ike Selected For Hall Of Fame

NEW YORK (AP) — President Dwight D. Eisenhower, whose football career at West Point was shortlived because of a broken kneecap, nevertheless today held one of the game's greatest honors.

The President was selected as the first recipient of the Gold Medal Award of the National Football Hall of Fame.

The inscription read: "Presented to Dwight David Eisenhower, President of the United States, in recognition of a lifetime of devotion to American intercollegiate football. October 28, 1958."

In addition to the Chief Executive, nine of the game's playing immortals were inducted into the Football Hall of Fame. This brought the total to 118 players and 44 coaches.

Three of those inducted — Charles Barrett of Cornell, David C. Campbell of Harvard and Tad Jones of Yale — have died.

The other six — Harry Stuhldreher of Notre Dame, Marshall (Biggie) Goldberg of Pitt, Harry Kipke of Michigan, Francis (Pug) Lund of Minnesota, Frank John (Dutch) Schwab of Lafayette and Harry Killinger (Cy) Young of Washington and Lee — were on hand.

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
