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Many Doctors Brush-Off Patients Wanting Health Check-ups, Official States

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Too many doctors brush-off patients seeking periodic health check-ups, a public health official says. He says it's because too much emphasis has been placed on medical education for treating disease as distinguished from maintaining health. Dr. Lester Breslow, chronic diseases chief of the California State Health Department, said it's true there aren't anywhere near enough doctors to give everyone in the

country an annual check-up — apparently the "ideal approach to preventive medicine."

Most Don't Ask It
Most people don't seek one anyway, he said, partly because of the cost involved.

He said in a talk Sunday to the Assn. of Teachers of Preventive Medicine on the eve of the 86th annual meeting of the American Public Health Assn.

"In addition to the present impossibility of periodic health examinations for everyone from the standpoint of physician time, there is also the fact that physicians in the United States are still not oriented toward or interested in health maintenance work."

"Those in public health practice are all too familiar with the lament of the public health nurses who encourage people to go to physicians for a periodic check-up, only to have the physicians give patients the 'brush-off.'"

He said another thing that probably has held down the development of the periodic health examination "is the poor quality of it when it has been offered."

"Experience with the cursory school health examination or usual life insurance examination would not seem to provide much encouragement for regular check-ups," he said.

Dr. Breslow said while the ideal of annual comprehensive check-ups for everyone remains a goal for the future, a partial approach to the ideal lies in a health examination called "multiple screening."

He defined this as the combination into a battery of several disease-detection, or screening, tests performed by technicians under medical direction and applied to large groups of apparently well persons.

Sen. Morse Gives View On Governor Post Candidates

THE DALLES (AP) — Gov. Robert Holmes has stood unequivocally on vital issues, but Secretary of State Mark Hatfield, the Republican candidate, has been all things to all men, Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.) said here.

Morse called on Hatfield to demonstrate if he can say yes or no, by answering some questions posed by the senator.

"Are you for the Eisenhower administration partnership in power?"

"Are you for... the basic account program for the development of our river basins of the Pacific Northwest?"

After asking the two questions, Morse said regarding the first: "If you are for it, then you stand against the future public interests of the state of Oregon and the development of power resources of this country."

Then, regarding the basic account program, Morse challenged Hatfield: "If you are against it, you are against Eisenhower's power program."

Changing to national issues, Morse said that Eisenhower in speeches across the nation "has removed his mask and we now see his narrow partisanship as some of us have recognized it since 1952."

"He's going to discover," Morse said, "that the American people will support the Democratic party in opposition to any compromise of the 14th Amendment."

"As President of the United States he should tell the American people whether he agrees with the United States Supreme Court that the 14th Amendment should not be compromised."

Morse said the President has failed to give one word of approval in support of the U.S. Supreme Court school case decision.

National Debt At All Time High, Treasury Reports

WASHINGTON (AP) — The national debt has reached an all-time high of \$280,851,000,000.

The Treasury disclosed today that the total direct and guaranteed debt had shattered the old record last Thursday — the most recent day for which government accounts have been tallied.

Until then, the highest debt was when it was \$280,821,000,000.

The biggest chunk of the direct and guaranteed debt is \$280,739,000,000 owed directly by the Treasury.

The rest is 112 million dollars of securities sold by the Federal Housing Administration which the Treasury must pay in the unlikely event that FHA defaults.

The direct debt is still about 29 million dollars shy of its Dec. 31, 1955, record high.

In the past month, the debt has risen sharply as the government borrowed about 4 billion dollars in new cash to help finance a record peacetime deficit estimated at 12 billion. The Treasury plans to borrow another three billions next month.

'Self-Styled' Farm Experts Handed Rap

RIVER FALLS, Wis. (AP) — Secretary of Agriculture Benson struck anew today at "self-styled farm experts who demagogue on farm issues."

Here to address professional agricultural workers at Wisconsin State College, Benson made no reference to the political campaigns being waged in the mid-west farm belt.

In his speech here Benson took of again on "self-styled farm experts," saying:

"Sometimes they seem almost intentionally to misrepresent the facts. This is one of our most serious problems in working for a prosperous and sound agriculture."

Benson cited figures which he said showed that the small family farmer is not being eliminated, that both farm income and cash receipts are higher this year than last, and that the standard of farm living is the highest in history.

Officer Clings To Side Of Car With Arm Caught

SEATTLE (AP) — For 13 terrifying blocks, a young Seattle policeman clung Tuesday to the outside of a speeding, red-light running car whose woman driver had slammed her window shut on his right arm.

Patrolman Harold Countryman said later from his hospital bed the car hit speeds as high as 70 miles an hour and weaved from side to side as it raced through a series of traffic lights.

The motorist, Mrs. Gracie Shippey, 48, was jailed on charges of drunken and reckless driving.

Countryman, who escaped serious injury, said he tried three times to shoot a hole in the left front tire of the car and then decided to "ride it out."

During the weird, erratic chase Countryman hung on the side of the car with his elbow hooked over the raised window and his feet lifted off the ground. Mrs. Shippey was finally stopped when Countryman's patrol car partner overtook them and forced the speeding automobile to the curb.

Countryman had stopped the woman at 1:45 a.m. to tell her the headlights of her car were out. He said he asked for her driver's license and when she did not seem to be able to find it he reached his right arm through the window to point to it in the bottom of her purse.

The traffic officer said Mrs. Shippey rolled up the electrically operated window as he pointed, trapping his arm, and then drove off.

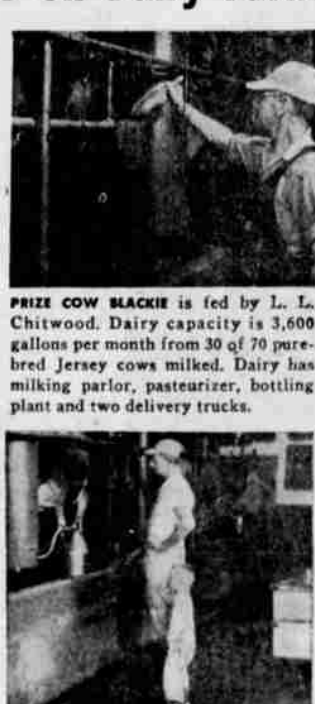

Thornton To Appeal Free Play Games Decision

SALEM (AP) — Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton will appeal to the state Supreme Court over the question of whether free play pinball games are legal, he said here.

Circuit Judge Arlie G. Walker of Polk County ruled Monday that they are legal. This upset Thornton's earlier ruling that they are illegal.

The Supreme Court never has ruled on the question of these machines, which reward the winning players with free games.

Thornton said that supreme courts in 14 states have ruled the free play machines illegal, while seven have held them legal.
