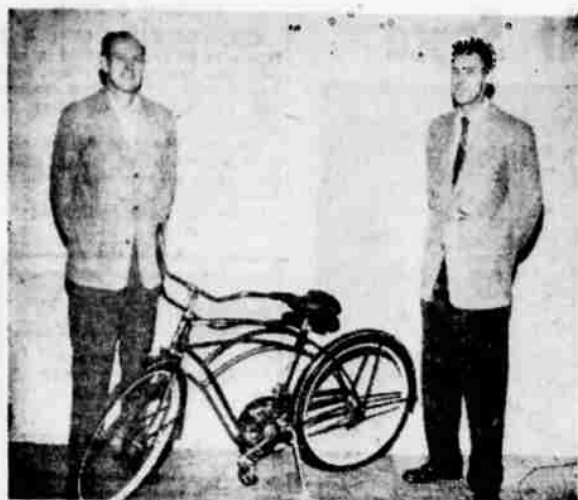

Realignment Of PCL Under Study By League Directors

SPOKANE (AP) — The Pacific Coast Baseball League is prepared to take on two or more cities if the time is ever right, but that time is not here, directors of the league have decided.

They spent more than an hour discussing possible realignment of the league before ending their annual fall meeting.

"Was Denver discussed as a possible PCL city?" a reporter asked Dave Rowe, the league publicity director who acted as spokesman.

"Yes, but no more than any other city," he replied. "Yes, we talked about quite a few but did nothing definite."

Earlier, the directors approved a resolution to expand to 10 or 12 teams "when suitable cities are available," but noted that expansion is not imminent.

The meeting was recessed until Nov. 29 in Washington, D. C., scene of the annual major-league meeting. Clyde Perkins of the Portland Beavers was named to represent the PCL at the minor league realignment meeting in Memphis, Tenn., Nov. 5.

Schedule Approved
A 154-game schedule with provisions to abandon week-long series between the same two teams was approved by the directors during their meeting. They also kept Leslie O'Connor on as their \$20,000-a-year president for 1959 at least.

The directors named Dick Walsh of the Spokane Indians as first vice president; Fred David of the Sacramento Solons as second vice president; and Nick Morgan of the Salt Lake City Bees as third vice president.

They also ruled that PCL teams must pay \$1,000 in compensation to the visiting team when they schedule exhibition games with major league clubs on regularly-scheduled Coast League dates.

Seven — inning doubleheaders to wind up series at the close of the season also were authorized.

Paulson, Schloredt Lauded By Board

Tailback Dainard Paulson of Oregon State and a transplanted Oregonian — quarterback Bob Schloredt of Washington — caught the eye of all-star selectors last week.

"The key to the Beaver win," one member of the Associated Press advisory football board said of Paulson after OSC's 14-12 victory over Washington.

Another member of the Pacific Northwest advisory board also nominated Paulson for consideration for all-coast honors.

The same two members also nominated Schloredt, the Gresham youth who was outstanding despite his team's loss.

"His punting is Washington's best offense," one of them remarked after watching Schloredt boot the ball consistently far downfield. One of the punts sailed 80 yards in the air.

He also scored a touchdown in Washington's narrow loss to OSC.

Still another quarterback won two votes from Pacific Northwest board members — Joe Kapp of California, who played a big part in his team's 23-6 victory over Oregon.

"The most effective split-T quarterback the conference has seen in several years. He's big, cool and smart," one observer said of Kapp.

"The best we've seen this season," said another. Two players who previously won attention got single votes for last weekend's performances. They were tackle Ted Bates of OSC and center Bill Long of Willamette.

Those nominated for the first time: Halfback Charley Tourville of Oregon; quarterback Charley Alvaro of College of Idaho; end Don Thiel of OSC; end Stan Kenyon of Oregon College of Education; tackle Ed Kaehlaun of OSC; tackle Gary Reid, Willamette.

Spokes, PCL Attendance Leaders, Pay Rental

SPOKANE (AP) — The Pacific Coast Baseball League in attendance last season, Wednesday paid \$26,227 for rental of the new city-county baseball park here.

The payment, 61 per cent more than the \$16,000 minimum guarantee, was based on the attendance and also included a share of concession receipts.

"With a better team next year we hope to pay even more," Spencer Harris, Indians' general manager, said.

Spokane led the PCL in attendance with 270,279, which included several sell-outs of the 8,000-seat stadium. There have been proposals from city officials that the seating capacity be expanded to 11,500 or 12,500.

The \$300,000 park was built jointly by the county, which put up three-fifths of the money, and the city, which contributed the remainder of the funds.
