

Nixon Calls On Republicans To Intensify Their Drive Against Demo Opponents

WICHITA, Kan. (AP) — Vice President Richard Nixon implored Republicans Thursday night to intensify their campaign against Democratic candidates "staggering and stumbling toward the finish line."

He told about 10,000 persons at Wichita University's field house that Democrats are beginning to hedge their predictions of a landslide victory in Tuesday's general election.

"They are haunted by the fear that the same thing is happening to them which happened to the Republicans in 1948 when a hard-fighting underdog, a cloistered, overconfident favorite," he said in reference to ex-President Harry Truman's victory over Republican Thomas Dewey.

Goes To Billings

Nixon moved on today to Billings, Mont., and Everett, Wash. in his cross-country campaign to congressional seats and state offices.

MORE RAIN PREDICTED

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Lodge Accuses India Of Giving False Report

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP) — Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge today accused India of giving the U. N. an incorrect report on efforts to find a compromise formula for the suspending of nuclear tests.

The U.S. delegate told the U. N.'s 81-nation political committee that the compromise had been destroyed by the unwillingness of others — the Soviet Union — to agree.

India's Arthur Lall gave a different version. He said both the United States and the Soviet Union had accepted an Indian-Yugoslav resolution. He said further time was needed to work out a declaration to be made by the United States, the Soviet Union and Britain to accompany the resolution.

Seriously Misstated

Lodge declared that Lall had "seriously misstated what we understood to be the situation."

He said Lall should have read out to the committee the Soviet reservation, which in effect amounted to a rejection of the compromise plan.

The U.S. delegate then outlined the Soviet reservation. It was a declaration that the three big powers understood the resolution to mean that they were banning nuclear testing for all time regardless of what happened in the Geneva talks.

Lodge insisted that the U. N. should act now on a Western resolution calling for a suspension of the tests while efforts were being made at Geneva to work out a control system to guard against illegal testing.

Lall called for a recess of the U. N. debate until Monday to permit more private compromise efforts.

fective last midnight. The condition was that the Soviet Union cease firing nuclear explosives too.

"The West will not resume testing unless the Russians do so first," a Western delegate said. "This could lead to the test suspension starting informally, with a whimper instead of a bang."

There was no immediate comment from the Russians, however, as to whether they would join in the suspension.

Heading the delegations are Ambassador James J. Wadsworth of the United States, Seymour K. Tsarapkin of the Soviet Union, Minister of State David Ormsby-Gore of Britain.

New Soviet notes sent to the Western powers Thursday suggested that Secretary of State Dulles, Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko and British Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd sit in later.

This modified the Kremlin's proposal a month ago that the meeting be raised as the start to the foreign ministers' level. The United States and Britain indicated Dulles and Lloyd would take part later if agreement appeared likely.

All Finished Tests

The Russians have been testing this fall at their Arctic proving grounds. U.S. scientists, racing against a diplomatic deadline, wound up an intensive series of shots Thursday at the Nevada test site. Britain has fired five devices in the Pacific since last spring.

The West considers any unlimited commitment to stop tests would seriously threaten the security of the free world unless it was accompanied by a foolproof system for detecting violations. It proposed the Russians join in a one-year suspension while an agreement was negotiated.

The long argument over a time limit led to some fears that negotiation of a control system might bog down from the start.

However, the Soviet notes delivered to London and Washington were worded in a more conciliatory tone than usual.

Western officials said the notes seemed to indicate the Russians would not insist on a British and American commitment to stop tests permanently at the outset of the talks. If the Russians do insist, the talks are not likely to get far.

Other interested powers are to be kept informed of the progress of the conference.

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Era Of Nuclear Weapons Tests Concluded Thursday

ATOMIC TEST SITE, Nev. (AP) — An era of nuclear weapons testing ended at midnight today. And in its wake, renewed furor over the dangers of radioactive fallout.

President Eisenhower's one-year suspension of tests went into effect today. Talks between the United States, Britain and the Soviet Union will determine whether it lasts longer.

The last atomic shot went off in a mountainside tunnel with an earth-jolting shock. It was as big as the atomic bombs which destroyed Japanese cities in World War II. It lofted a 500-foot-wide column of rock and dirt 1,000 feet above the mountain top. Huge boulders crashed down the slopes.

Atomic Energy Commission scientists kept trying to set off another weapon right up until the midnight deadline. A blast was to have gone off under a balloon at 1,500 feet altitude. But high winds balked the effort.

Mayor Alarmed

Alarmed by a spurt in radioactivity over Los Angeles, Mayor Norris Poulson tried to get the AEC to call off the shot that never materialized.

He phoned the AEC in Washington and complained to Commissioner W. F. Libby that wind was blowing fallout from Nevada tests over his city.

Libby said the amount of radioactivity over Los Angeles was not hazardous. Measurements by the Los Angeles City Health Department

showed that the amount of radioactivity in the air was 20 per cent above the level considered safe for human consumption over a period of months.

An immediate flurry of excitement, apprehension and anger followed.

Mayor Poulson said "there will be repercussions" if the AEC fired another shot.

The uproar was subsiding today under a barrage of reassuring statements.

To Dissipate Quickly

An AEC spokesman at the Nevada testing site said radioactivity in the Los Angeles air will dissipate quickly. He said the amount was equal only to the exposure a person would experience under normal circumstances over two months.

Los Angeles' city health officer, Dr. George M. Uhl, said: "There is no cause for public alarm at this time."

Taking an opposite view were: Rep. Clair Engle (D-Calif.) — "The safety of our people comes first. No scientific information re-

lates from these tests can justify imperiling the people of this state or nation."

Dr. Paul Saltman, University of Southern California professor of biochemistry — "I'd like to say something to relieve the public mind about the dangers of this high radioactivity level. But I can't say it. Radiation exposure is a cumulative thing. What happens today we always have with us."

As the tests ended, the AEC said this fall's series of 19 shots "advanced the development of small, low-yield nuclear weapons for the defense of the free world."

Testing began on the southern Nevada desert in 1951. In all, 88 atomic shots have been fired.

Moscow Radio Asks Pasternak To Get Out Of Soviet Union

LONDON (AP) — Moscow Radio, in 10 languages, invited novelist Boris Pasternak today to get out of the Soviet Union.

"Let him go where he wishes to," the broadcasts said of the writer, who turned down the 1958 Nobel Prize this week under heavy Soviet pressure. "No Soviet man or woman wants to breathe the air he breathes."

The broadcasts — in English, German, French, Portuguese, Swedish, Norwegian, Danish, Greek, Italian and Serbo-Croat — declared the author of "Doctor Zhivago" has "no place in Soviet society."

They called Pasternak "a man who in spirit has long been a traitor to his country and who has now spat in its face."

A poet of the decadent school, a pretender to aesthetic culture who wrote for a select few and had no contact with the people."

Still Get Royalties

At about the same time, in Stockholm, a Soviet diplomat was issuing assurances that no harm would come to Pasternak and that he would still get royalties from abroad for his novel.

Nicolai Voinov, Soviet charge d'affaires, told the Swedish Writers Assn. that "no reprisals will be taken against Boris Pasternak."

Pasternak rejected the \$41,420 Nobel Prize for Literature Wednesday, six days after it was awarded him. He previously had thanked the Royal Swedish Academy for the prize. He obviously changed his mind because of the storm raised in the Soviet press.

If Voinov's statement is correct, Pasternak still would have an income despite his ouster from the Soviet Writers' Union. While the book never was published in the Soviet Union, it has been a best seller abroad.

There was no way of telling what royalties from "Doctor Zhivago" amount to. Bonniers Co., Swedish publishers of the book, said all royalties up to now have been collected by Gian Giacomo Feltrinelli, the Italian publisher who first printed the book.

In Milan, Feltrinelli declined to comment. But the Milan magazine Epoca said that Feltrinelli has "tens of millions of lire" — tens of thousands of dollars — in royalties in Italy being held in Pasternak's name.

Ex-Convict, Rapist, Killer Tells Of Murdering Three

SANTA ANA, Calif. (AP) — A confessed strangler of three Los Angeles area models today led police officers to the desert graves of two of them.

Calmly, Harvey M. Glatman of Los Angeles led officers to a remote, sandy area near Escondido in San Diego County. He identified the remains found there as the bodies of Mrs. Shirley Ann Loy Bridgeford, 24, a divorcee of Sun Valley, a Los Angeles suburb, and Miss Ruth Rita Mercado, 24, a Los Angeles model.

A body found, also in the desert, near Indio in Riverside County last December is believed to be that of his third victim, Mrs. Judy Ann Dull, 19, of West Hollywood.

Glatman told police he killed her and buried her in that area.

Officers here, who booked the 30-year-old television repairman on suspicion of murder, said a fourth intended victim, Miss Lorraine Vigil, 28, Los Angeles, brought about Glatman's capture.

He made a date with her Monday night for some picture-taking but, instead, took her out on the Santa Ana Freeway, produced a gun and attempted to assault her, police said. However, she succeeded in grabbing the gun and was holding Glatman at bay when officers happened to come along.

Sheriff's officers said the three women killed first were raped. They quoted Glatman:

"I would make them kneel down. With the gun on them, I would tie this five-foot piece of rope around their ankles. Then I would loop it around their neck. Then I would stand there and keep pulling until they quit struggling."

He said he used the same piece of sash cord and the same pistol in all assaults. The weapons were in his car when highway patrolmen found a fourth intended victim holding the gun on him after a desperate struggle in a car Monday night.

Served Prison Terms

The slender, sandy-haired ex-convict, who served prison terms in New York and Colorado for kidnapping and rape, confessed after two days' questioning and a lie-detector test, said chief investigator Joel Hays of the Orange County district attorney's office.

The victims died 15, 8 and 5 months ago in this order, as Hays quoted Glatman's confession:

Mrs. Judy Ann Dull, 19, West Hollywood, was assaulted in her apartment after a date to shoot pin-up pictures of her Aug. 1, 1957. He strangled her on the desert near Indio, about 45 miles east of here, and buried her in a shallow, sandy grave.

Posing as "George Williams," a Pasadena plumber, Glatman dated Mrs. Shirley Ann Loy Bridgeford, 24, a divorcee, of suburban Sun Valley, through a Los Angeles lonely hearts club last March.

With the rope he ended her life south of Escondido after forcing her to disrobe and submit to him in his automobile. He didn't bury her because he walked her "almost a mile into the desert and I didn't think anyone would find her there."

Third Victim

Last July 23 he called on Miss Ruth Rita Mercado, 24, through a modeling advertisement. He spent the night in the apartment,
