

Medford Wins 7th Straight; N. Salem Loses To Wash. 11

Oregon Conference leaders took another step toward a state class A-1 high school football playoff berth when they crushed Ashland, 27-0, Friday night.

It was the seventh victory in as many games for Medford, ranked No. 2 in the Associated Press poll.

Jefferson, the No. 1 team, was

idle after having overwhelmed Benson, 54-0, the previous night for its eighth victory of the season.

North Salem, third in the poll, played out of the Valley League district in which it already has clinched a playoff berth and lost to Fort Vancouver, Wash., 19-0.

Astoria, went out in front in the Midwest League race when it drubbed Roseburg, the No. 7 team in the poll, 27-0.

Astoria just about cinched a playoff spot by trimming Central Catholic of Portland, 31-6.

Grants Pass, the No. 6 team, was idle.

Forest Grove surprised tenth-ranked McMinnville, holding it to a 13-13 tie.

West Linn and Oregon City, in a three-way battle with McMinnville for the district 4 title, each won. West Linn trounced Dallas, 29-19. Oregon City defeated Oswego, 20-7.

Frosh Lambast Rooks

PORTLAND (AP)—It looks like a different story this season for the Oregon Frosh.

The Frosh, beaten in all three of their games last season, opened 1958 football play by trouncing the Oregon State Rooks 40-18 here Friday night.

Quarterbacks Jim Suter of Portland and Gary Albright of Milwaukie mostly carried the Frosh to victory as they hurled a total of three touchdown passes.

But it was a running play late in the game that provided the game's most stunning score. Halfback Larry Reed of Lawton, Okla., took a kickoff and ran 99 yards for a Frosh touchdown.

Earlier, Suter had put the Frosh into a quick lead by throwing scoring passes of 7 and 62 yards.

Suter also tossed a pick to Sam Spooner, who then threw 24 yards for another TD.

Albright's scoring pass went 32 yards into the hands of Mike Sparlin, an end from Grants Pass.

Behind 27-0, the Rooks finally accumulated a scoring punch as Dick West of Hood River set up one score with passes and then hurled another aerial 32 yards for a touchdown.

The third touchdown came as tailback Don Kasso plunged over after setting up the score with a 20-yard run.

Among the smaller schools Chadron (Neb.), Kearney (Neb.), Northeastern Oklahoma, Gustavus Adolphus and Northern (SD) State Teachers all retained their unbeaten and untied status.

Richie Pettibone's passing sparked Tulane to a 27-0 triumph over Texas Tech before 20,000 at New Orleans. The Green Wave quarterback threw two touchdown passes in the second quarter to Pete Abadie and Claude Mason, more than enough to defeat the lads from the Southwest Conference. Alighier Pettibone connected on nine of 10 passes for 170 yards. His TD heaves went for 23 and 60 yards.

Vanderbilt came from behind a 7-6 score to score a decisive 28-15 victory over the University of Miami Hurricanes before 25,425 at Miami. Hurryce Smith, 163-pound senior, threw three touchdown passes, including one for 12 yards to Bob Muller in the second quarter that put the Commodores ahead to stay.

The New Mexico Lobos frimmed Denver 21-15 for their fourth Skyline Conference triumph without a loss on Denver's home grounds. Halfback Doc Perkins sparked New Mexico with two touchdowns. Little Lloyd Logan scored both Denver's touchdowns, one on an 80-yard run after intercepting a pass.

Millicoma Gates Opened To Hunters

The Coos Bay branch of Weyerhaeuser Timber Co. announced Thursday that it again will open Millicoma Forest to elk hunters.

Art Smyth, forester for the branch, said the Tye gate, on the company's logging road on the Pheasant Creek, will be open for the first time in several years. The gate can be reached via Tye Road and Bateman Lookout Road, said Smyth.

Another gate which will be open during specified hours will be Matson Creek gate, on the company's paved logging road about 10 miles up Millicoma River from Allegany.

Both gates will be open only between 5 a.m. and 6:30 p.m. on Saturdays and Sundays. The gates will be closed Monday through Friday.

The Vaughn and Callahan areas will be open seven days a week at all hours, noted Smyth.

The firm cautioned hunters planning to use the Tye gate not to attempt to drive the road during wet weather. The company also urged hunters to be equipped with plenty of gasoline, chains and good tires and to drive with extreme care on the tricky roads.

Air Force Blames Civilian Pilots For Near Miss

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Air Force says the cause of a near-miss Monday night between a military tanker and an airliner was failure of the civilian plane's crew to keep proper watch.

The incident took place over Wilmington, N.C., as the Panagra liner with a National Airlines crew of five flew south. Upon landing at Miami, Fla., the copilot and the engineer reported they had taken evasive action to avoid collision with the tanker and two jets.

Secretary of the Air Force James H. Douglas said in a statement Thursday that press reports, based on statements by members of the airliner crew, indicated the captain was in the passenger compartment at the time the copilot was preparing to make notations on his clipboard, and the engineer was dividing attention between his instruments and the air space ahead.

Douglas said the refueling operation was being carried out in completely clear weather, on a flight plan approved by the Civil Aeronautics Administration.

He said the tanker was so brilliantly lit that "the Air Force is at a loss to understand how the airline crew could have failed to observe" it.

Wheat Farmers In For Trouble With Big Surplus

SPOKANE (AP)—The nation's wheat farmers are in for trouble and the real solution to their problem is not yet in sight, the executive secretary of the National Federation of Grain Cooperatives said Friday.

Roy F. Hendrickson of Washington, D.C., said the country will have a record carry-over in wheat of 1.3 billion bushels next July 1.

"This year's yield was terrific, a bumper crop of 1.4 billion bushels, about 502 million more than last year," he told a meeting of the North Pacific Grain Growers Assn.

He said wheat has become the No. 1 farm product of Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Benson and that there are indications a new program for wheat will be presented to the next Congress.

"Benson isn't likely to ask for any further production controls, but may ask for a reduction in the level of support prices," he said. "There is talk of lowering the present 75 per cent of parity to 60 or 65 per cent on the wheat harvested in 1960."

"If that happens, the average market price of wheat is going to drop accordingly and, of course, the incomes of wheat producers are going to suffer."

He said a major reason for the problem is that the domestic demand for wheat as food has remained constant at about 485 million bushels since 1910 despite great population increases.
