Rex Harrison Gets Private Room; Other Actors Irked

LONDON (AP)—Rex Harrison, who indicated he just wants to be alone, got a private dressing room today and a "Mr." on the door for tonight's royal command variety performance.

Ten other big male stars, including master of ceremonies Max Bygraves and America's singing star Pat Boone, found themselves herded together in dressing room No. 2.

There were plenty of arched eyebrows in private among the scores of artists taking part in tonight's show before Queen Elizabeth, Prince Philip, Princess Margaret and Queen Mother Elizabeth.

But no one ventured a complaint.

Temperamental
One of the producers of the show at the Coliseum Theater explained the situation: "He (Harrison) is generally regarded as being a trifle temperamental — some big stars are, you know. We don't want any last minute hitches, especially over who should share his dressing room."

Faubus Termed Valuable Enemy

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP)—About 1,500 Negroes thundered agreement Sunday when a high official of the National Assn. for the Advancement of Colored People called Gov. Orval E. Faubus a "valuable enemy."

"I trust he stays healthy and active, coming out on the odd-numbered days with new plans to replace those which did not work on the even-numbered days," said Roy Wilkins of New York NAACP executive secretary.

Wilkins addressed his organization's 14th annual state convention.

"Victory is near at hand," he said in a speech launching a statewide NAACP membership drive.

Wilkins urged Little Rock Negroes to stand fast in the fight for integrated schools, and rejected any suggestion that they open private schools of their own.

"I know it is hard to watch some of the white students getting some little education while your own high school students are shut out of school by your governor," said Wilkins.

Wilkins promised new, undisclosed legal moves in the Little Rock dispute. He predicted that soon "other people" would demand that the closed schools be reopened.

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High Dignitaries Will Converge For Ceremony

VATICAN CITY (AP)—The vast basilica of St. Peter's glittered with brilliant light today in preparation for the coronation of Pope John XXIII.

From around the free world, high dignitaries converged on Rome for the spectacular ceremony Tuesday morning—the feast day of St. Charles Borromeo, a favorite saint of the new pontiff.

The ceremony will parade all the medieval pageantry of the Roman Catholic Church.

A procession of representatives of all the ancient orders of the church will escort the new pontiff in majestic splendor to the main doors of the basilica.

Once the pontiff passes through the door, borne on his portable throne by scarlet-clad bearers, the crowd's view of the ceremonies will be cut off.

Walk Up Steps to Throne
The Pope will mount the portable throne by five red-covered steps to a throne.

Foreign dignitaries will watch from a platform 20 feet to the pontiff's right, while the 51 cardinals present for the coronation go through the long rite of doing reverence to their sovereign.

The Pope will mount the portable throne again to be carried into the basilica itself while the foreign guests are escorted to their places of honor.

On the way to the central altar the Pope will stop to pray at the chapel of the Holy Sacrament on the right side of the basilica. He will be carried then to the chapel of St. Gregory, on the left side of the basilica, where he will be clothed in the brilliant vestments of the coronation.

The pontiff then will be carried to the central altar, stopping on the way to be reminded, by the burning of incense, of the passing glory of the world. The Pope himself will begin the solemn high Pontifical Mass with the recitation of the confiteor at the central altar.

After the mass, the Pope will be carried to the central balcony, overlooking the vast square with hundreds of thousands of cheering spectators.

The three-tiered gold, jewel-encrusted tiara will be placed on the Pope's head. The Pope then will pronounce the benediction urbi et orbi—to the city of Rome and the world.

The ceremonies are expected to last from four to five hours.

fied high grass obscured the child. Morse, speaking at Medford Friday, said both the jury, and the Supreme Court on appeal, rejected Hatfield's testimony. He said, "I don't intend to let a man lie to a jury and get away with it."

J. O. Bailey, retired justice who was Oregon chief justice at the time of the appeal, said in a statement Sunday that, "what Sen. Morse is trying to say, in effect, is that every litigant and every witness on the losing side in any court action has lied and should, therefore, be denied full citizenship rights. In every lawsuit there are two sides. No two witnesses see the same situation exactly alike. The fact that testimony differs does not, in itself, indicate that witnesses have been untruthful."

"Non Political Talk"
In reference to the Salem speech cancellation today, Morse said at Pasco Sunday night, "I was scheduled and would have talked on a completely non-partisan issue, namely the constitutional system of checks and balances as the great preserver of our liberties."

Of the reason given by Gregg for the cancellation, "I was particularly amused... I pointed out to Mr. Gregg he ought to give the true reason for the cancellation of my speech, that obviously the chamber does not want to support that American institution of American freedom, namely freedom of speech."

Snow, Rain, Wind Dampen And Chill Northwest Areas

A surprise snowstorm coated a section of the Northeast to depths up to five inches today.

The wintry onslaught in western New England and upstate New York stalled morning rush-hour traffic in some spots and closed highways temporarily. At Litchfield, Conn., schools were closed because of traffic hazards created by an undercoating of sleet.

The snow was part of a chilly, rainy pattern in the nation's north-east quarter.

Heavy snow accumulated mainly in the Berkshire Mountains area of western Massachusetts, but spread into eastern New York state, Vermont and northern Connecticut.

There were snow patches also in northeastern Pennsylvania's hills.

Rainfall in most of the Eastern states was light except for a few spots in eastern Pennsylvania. More than 2 inches of rain doused Harrisburg in 24 hours. Moderate to heavy snow fell from the Altoona, Pa., area northward into the Elmira-Binghamton, N. Y., region.

It also was a little cooler in the northern Plains, the central Rockies and western Washington but a warming trend was reported in most other sections of the country.

Light rains persisted along the Pacific Coast as far south as extreme northern California and in the interior from central Idaho into extreme southwest Montana.

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job to do every day in addition to covering the entire state."

Said Hatfield: "We've been campaigning in every section of the state—shaking hands a la Estes Kefauver."

Holmes said that in his campaign he found "deep resentment toward the policies of the Eisenhower Administration. People in the Eugene and Roseburg areas and all through the timber belt feel that the tight money and high interest policies have caused the recession."

Found People Warm
Hatfield said he has been elated because "People in every part of the state were very warm and very responsive. The attitude of the people has been very encouraging. Many registered Democrats have come to say they are going to cross party lines and vote for me."

Both Holmes and Hatfield said they were certain that there would be a huge turnout of voters Tuesday.

"The percentage of turnout, though, won't matter because our support has crossed party lines so extensively," said Hatfield.

Holmes said: "The larger the vote, the better chance the Democrats will have for more of our margin of 3,000 registered voters will be turning out."

Of his party's chances, Holmes said: "I honestly feel that with respect to Democrats running for Congress and the Legislature, there will be a substantial margin of victory."

"I don't think I as a candidate should speculate about myself. I'm optimistic, but a candidate must rest his case and say that only the voters can decide."

Of Republican chances, Hatfield said: "I'm very hopeful of winning, but I'm not making any predictions. We have reason to be encouraged. And generally, whenever the head of a ticket is elected, that brings others of his party into office. There is a percentage of carry — through that brings others in."

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Faubus Predicts 'Drastic Ruling' In School Case

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP)—Gov. Orval E. Faubus said today he had "pretty reliable" information that the 8th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals at St. Louis has prepared a "drastic ruling" in the Little Rock school integration case.

The governor said he had heard the court planned to "attempt to force reopening of the public schools on an integrated basis."

A three-judge appellate court at St. Louis presently has under advisement a request for a permanent injunction against leasing public school facilities here to a private educational corporation.

The rather alarming information may not be accurate but it conforms with recent victories forecast by the NAACP (National Assn. for the Advancement of Colored People). Faubus said, adding: "The NAACP always has known in advance what was going on in these cases."

Asked if he felt it would be possible for the appellate court to force reopening of the schools, Faubus said: "They could declare unconstitutional the act under which I closed the schools and then direct the Little Rock School Board to reopen them."

Legality of the school closing law, recently passed in a special session of the Arkansas Legislature and invoked by Faubus Sept. 12 to close the city's four high schools, was upheld by a state court. It has not been challenged in federal court.

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Dissension in the New York Democratic organization further hindered Harriman, though Democrat Frank S. Hogan — whose nomination Harriman opposed — seemed to be leading Rep. Kenneth B. Keating in the state's Senate.

In California it was the Republicans who were hurt by dissension. Sen. William F. Knowland and Gov. Goodwin J. Result: Knowland was expected to lose to Democrat Edmund (Pat) Brown and Knight was less than an even choice against Rep. Clair Engle.

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
