

Gov. Harriman Handshakes To Last Before Big Election

ALBANY, N.Y. (AP) — Handshaking to the last, Gov. Averell Harriman and Nelson A. Rockefeller—rich men turned politicians—place their hopes in the hands of an expected 5½ million New York voters Tuesday.

Republican Rockefeller, 50, appeared to have the edge over the 68-year-old Democrat in their battle for election as governor. The campaign generally has been a personality contest devoid of solid issues.

The apparent Rockefeller lead found in polls could be upset, however, by voters who withheld a decision until the last. Leaders of both parties have been telling party workers the vote is expected to be close.

A Rockefeller victory—in the face of a predicted nationwide swing to the Democrats—would boost him into serious contention with Vice President Richard M. Nixon for the GOP presidential nomination in 1960. It would ruin Harriman's White House hopes.

Demos Gain Seen
The Democrats appeared likely to gain the U. S. Senate seat being vacated by Republican Irving M. Laves.

A potential outpouring of votes from home town New York City loomed as sufficient to put over Democrat Frank S. Hogan, the popular district attorney from Manhattan. Most political analysts believe only a whopping Rockefeller victory could pull veteran Rep. Kenneth B. Keating of Rochester into the Senate.

Russia Willing To Have Nuclear Control Posts

GENEVA (AP) — The Soviet Union is willing to have international control posts on her territory to police a nuclear test ban, Soviet Delegate Semyon Tsarapkin has told a delegation of British

Plane Takes Off Without Pilot, Climbs, Crashes

HARMONY, Minn. (AP) — "It flew so beautifully," said a student pilot who watched his runaway airplane take off without him and circle gracefully for 45 minutes Sunday.

The adventurous little plane came down rightside-up in a cornfield, flipped once, and then bounced into an upright position again, although heavily damaged.

Planning a short pleasure cruise, Neil Haugerud had faced the 88-horsepower Aerocraft Chief up a slight grade on the John Hammervold farm, where the Fillmore Flying Club maintains a landing strip. The 28-year-old insurance man gave the propeller a tug.

"But instead of idling like it should have," the awed Haugerud explained, "it revved up to full throttle immediately and jumped ahead. I tried to get to the door but the plane went past me, it took off almost immediately."

Haugerud scurried to the Richard Johnson farm to telephone the air tower at Rochester, Minn., asking that the Civil Aeronautics Administration be notified a pilotless plane was aloft. Highway patrolmen were notified.

The plane, meanwhile, was climbing in broad circles. It reached an estimated 5,000-foot altitude. On the ground, Haugerud and the Johnsons stared in amazement.

"Then something must have happened," said Haugerud, "because the flight pattern changed and the plane started spiraling down in the same kind of circles that it made going up."

The descent took 10 to 15 minutes. The two-place ship came down on the Orland Broken farm, more than a half mile from any house.

Haugerud doesn't know what caused the plane to take off by itself.

"Maybe the throttle was pushed forward," he said. "Or maybe something in the carburetor was stuck. I don't know."

Italy's Premier Rejects Protest From Russians

ROME (AP) — Italian Premier Amintore Fanfani today "indignantly rejected" a Soviet protest against construction of U.S.-equipped missile bases in Italy.

"Soviet Russia has no right whatsoever to interfere in Italy's internal affairs, and matters pertaining to national defense are strictly internal affairs," a spokesman for the Premier said.

The Soviet note had been expected since the announcement in September that the United States and Italy had agreed to set up launching bases in Italy for intermediate range ballistic missiles as part of the North Atlantic Alliance's defense chain.

British Freighter Ruled Free Of Contamination

VANCOUVER, B.C. (AP) — A British freighter, which had unloaded a radium capsule here Tuesday, was ruled free of radioactive contamination Thursday by a nuclear expert from Ottawa.

The Royal Mail Line's Loch Avon had loaded the capsule aboard in Cuba and stored it in its No. 2 hold for shipment to the Atomic Energy of Canada, Ltd., in Ontario.

Wednesday longshoremen were removed from the area of the hold giving rise to reports of possible radioactive contamination. The hold was then sealed.

The expert, C. H. Plunkett, entered the hold Thursday and checked it. He said there was no evidence of radioactivity.

Need To Bolster New Governments Stressed At Meet

SEATTLE (AP) — Progress is being made in South and Southeast Asia but more needs to be done quickly to help bolster newly independent governments faced with staggering economic and political problems.

This was the consensus of Colombo Plan economic experts today as they began the third week of a month long, closed door inquiry into the economic ills of 650 million Asians.

The report of these experts will be turned over next week to a full-dress ministerial meeting of the Colombo Plan Consultative Committee. President Eisenhower is scheduled to address the group a week from today.

In the opinion of key delegation leaders and observers from such organizations as the World Bank, the Colombo Plan area will continue to need assistance for another three decades even though progress towards industrial development has been made during the past five years.

These sources said, "More needs to be done quickly. The past year was a bad one."

The U. S. recession is being blamed for some of the economic headaches. The recession caused a tumble in the price of rubber and tin which sorely hit such countries as Malaya and Indonesia.

Bad weather conditions during the monsoon season also hit the area, particularly in India, Pakistan, Indonesia and the Philippines. It caused a rice crop that was far below normal.

Vatican Tells Outline For Coronation Rites

VATICAN CITY (AP) — The Vatican announced today a general outline for the coronation rites of Pope John XXIII Tuesday.

The rites, established by tradition, differ little from past coronations in the modern era. The ceremony will begin at 8:30 a.m. (2:30 a.m. EST) and last four to five hours.

A highlight will be an elaborate and colorful procession into the world's largest church, the Basilica of St. Peter.

There, with about 50,000 watching, the new pontiff will officiate at a Pontifical Mass.

The act of coronation will be seen by throngs in St. Peter's Square. It will be performed on a central balcony.

WORKER SENTENCED

HATFIELD, England (AP) — A 23-year-old worker in the De Havilland aircraft plant here was sentenced today to three months in prison for damaging three Comet jet planes.

The worker, Alan Humphrey, pleaded guilty and said he caused the damage because "the job just got me down."

Porter Claims Dominican Man Put Out Of Office

EUGENE (AP) — Rep. Charles Porter (D-Ore) says a Dominican Republic official who urged his defeat at the polls has been ousted from office.

Porter said that Arturo Despradel was removed as the island republic's Secretary of State for Industry and Commerce.

It was Despradel who earlier wrote Gov. Robert Holmes that the Dominican Republic might snipe trade ties with Oregon if Porter were re-elected.

Porter and Holmes both protested Despradel's action to the State Department.

Porter Saturday said the department recently told him that it "was concerned over the implications of this practice and discussed the matter with appropriate Dominican Republic officials."

Porter, seeking re-election Tuesday, has been a constant critic of the Dominican Republic.

Porter has said Rafael Trujillo, the Dominican strongman, is a dictator, and was responsible for the death of Gerald Murphy, a Eugene flier.

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — The thief dealt Edward Haynes an enormous blow.

Eddie is 20, a compositor's helper, just starting his career. His wife Jeanette, only 19, has leukemia.

The medical bills for her treatment average \$25 a week. Eddie met them. He bought a truck, on credit, and started a dry cleaning delivery service.

He denied himself, worked hard and soon he was earning \$30 a week from his sideline.

Two months ago Jeanette gave birth to a daughter. The hospital bill for the delivery came last week. It was \$347. Still Eddie had made plans to meet it.

Then over the weekend he left

his truck parked on the street. It was loaded with orders he was to deliver today — dresses, suits, blankets. The estimated value was \$1,000.

The thief broke into the truck and cleaned it out. There was no insurance. Eddie must make up the loss.

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
