

# Outcomes In Douglas Co. Community Races Reported

Four cities in Douglas County have new mayors-elect today following Tuesday's balloting.

Ira S. Mann in Sutherlin, Felix Latham in Yoncalla, Frank Cumiskey in Riddle and H. E. Place in Glendale all were named by voters to head their respective city governments.

Municipal election results from Myrtle Creek were unavailable because of ballot difficulties. Ballots from all three precincts were locked inside a ballot box before city voters were tabulated, reported Ruth Evans, correspondent.

All candidates in Myrtle Creek were unopposed, however. The lone candidate for mayor was J. D. Groom, the incumbent. Seeking council berths were Robert Gordon and Gerald Warren and incumbents Ron Sims and Russell Steinhauer. All sought four-year terms except Sims, who was up for a two-year stint.

## Drain

Incumbent E. G. Whipple received 135 votes in his unopposed bid to serve another term as Drain's mayor.

Two council vacancies were filled by Glen Woolley, incumbent, and Calvin Peterson. Woolley received 136 votes and Peterson 146. The only other candidate, Lee Darnall, withdrew shortly before the balloting.

Incumbents Thomas Myers (144) and Verne Thomas (159) were unopposed for the offices of treasurer and recorder, respectively.

## Sutherlin

Mann received 491 votes in his race for the mayor's post against Richard D. Bellis, office manager at Nordic Plywood, who received 189 votes. Mann is a logging contractor. The office is for two years.

Winning four-year council berths in Sutherlin were Lyle R. Sechawer, Lloyd Rapp and Leonard Peipert. Sechawer, publisher of a shopping guide and an incumbent, received 359 votes. Rapp, a chiropractic physician, received 280 and Peipert, a petroleum distributor, 265. Opposing the winners were Mabel McCord (236), Henry K. Halvorsen Jr. (181), Gilson R. Mardin (118), Howard Kirkpatrick (199) and Herb W. Hubbell (130).

A two-year council berth went to Billy E. Trozelle, a car salesman who received 327 votes to 257 for his lone opponent, Chester Paynter.

## Canyonville

Ed Oaks, Canyonville mayor who was unopposed on the ballot, received 108 votes to 28 for write-in candidate James Moon to win his fifth one-year term at the head of that city's government.

Recorder-Treasurer Mrs. Ralph Goodell won another one-year term by receiving 137 votes. She was unopposed.

Two-year council terms were won by Bruce Dick (121), R. E. Moore (114) and Mickey A. Moore (110). Helen Altree Colvert (95) was the only other council candidate.

## Winston

Four candidates vied for three council posts in Winston, with A. B. Peterson (377) and Arthur Hill (367) receiving sufficient votes to win four-year posts and Russell M. Turner (344), incumbent, winning a two-year berth. Only other candidate was Norman A. Lee, who received 325 votes.

## Glendale

R. E. Place, theater manager, unseated Fred Lund as mayor at Glendale. Place received 102 votes, Lund, 86.

In the only other contest of office in Glendale, Arlet Smith (146), incumbent, defeated James C. O. (49) for the office of recorder. Mrs. Mattie Heller (189), another incumbent, won another term as treasurer.

Four-year terms as councilmen went to R. A. Harris (48), Martin T. Brooks (62) and Dale Wright (73).

**Hatfield Beats Holmes For Oregon's Governor**

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Grades, polling 60,074 to 48,664 in 628 of 628 precincts.

The other Democratic officeholder up for statewide voting, Labor Commissioner Norman O. Nilsen, had no trouble at all disposing of Republican Lyle E. McCauley. With 2,438 of 2,719 precincts reported, it was 276,334 to 193,623.

The margin of Hatfield's victory was the election's surprise.

A week ago a growing feeling that he had overcome the Democratic voter registration edge strengthened, but few were willing to predict that his victory—if he got it—would be other than close.

As the counting progressed Tuesday night, it became clear that the traditional Democratic late surge could not save Holmes.

And as the night wore on, it developed that not only was there no Democratic surge from what is commonly called the labor vote, but that Hatfield had captured it.

He ran more than 10,000 votes ahead in Multnomah County, where Republicans are outnumbered by 35,000.

Holmes waited vainly for the upturn which brought him up from behind two years ago when he defeated Gov. Elmo Smith. When it failed to come, he said this morning that Hatfield had his congratulations and his pledge of co-operation.

## Oakland

Paul Schulze, recently appointed Oakland mayor, was unopposed in his bid for a two-year elective term and received 172 votes. An employee of Martin Bros. Container and Timber Products Corp., Schulze was appointed to fill the vacancy left by William Brislain.

Elected to four-year council posts were Eugene Cherry, electrical contractor, and Lyle Stewe, Martin Bros. employee. Both are incumbents. Cherry received 173 votes, Stewe 103 and H. W. (Bud) Schwesinger, their lone opponent, 70.

A two-year council post goes to Willard Lee, Weyerhaeuser Timber Co. employee who received 71 votes to 59 for Homer Truisty and 56 for Martin Hakanson.

## Riddle

Retired Army officer Frank Cumiskey won the office of Riddle mayor by receiving 118 votes to 75 for his lone opponent, Clinton D. Hedberg, realtor.

Three candidates had filed for the same number of berths on the city council. Reswell Weimer received 144 votes, John W. George 181 and Albert Stingley 162.

## Yoncalla

The lone candidate for mayor in Yoncalla was electric cooperative employee Felix Latham, who received 170 votes.

Robert Hoagland and Virgil Arnold were selected by voters from a field of four to serve four-year council terms. Hoagland received 177 votes, Arnold 107. Noble Snider received 104 votes and Rodney Putnam 55.

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chances for the Democratic nomination.

In California, too, the epochal mid-year elections were fraught with possible portents for 1960. Sen. William F. Knowland, considered a potential contender for the GOP, went into sudden eclipse. He lost a contest for governor to Edmund G. (Pat) Brown. Brown, an emphatic Democrat, was sure to get him talked about for the big Democratic prize two years hence.

The election gave President Eisenhower a record he was far from desiring. He's the first president in history to be confronted by three Congresses controlled by the opposite party.

Counting of the tide of votes—perhaps reaching to 48 million or more—was still continuing this morning. A few races were still inconclusive.

But the indicated division in the new Congress, based on returns as of 8 a. m., shaped up in this fashion:

Senate: Democrats 61 or 62; Republicans 35 or 34. The undecided Senate race was a battle in Wyoming where Republican Sen. Frank Barrett was opposed by Democrat Gale W. McGee. The figures leave out of account the two senators Alaska will elect Nov. 25.

House: Democrats 284; Republicans 131. One additional House member will be named by Alaska.

**Most Predominant**

The indicated Senate lineup is the most predominantly Democratic since the party elected 65 senators in 1940. That was the year Franklin D. Roosevelt won his third term.

The Democrats have not had so many House members since 1936 when they elected 333.

In the present Congress, which will give way in January to the newly elected one, the party division is — Senate: Democrats 49, Republicans 47; House: Democrats 255, Republicans 209.

In Ohio and California voters balloted "no" on referenda on the question of enacting state right-to-work laws. Unions were fighting these proposals which would bar any requirement for union membership in order to hold a job.

Such a proposition also was voted down in Washington, Colorado and Idaho but was approved in Kansas.

Over-all, the election outcome seems to augur a bigger voice for union leaders in Democratic affairs and more powerful influence in the selection of the party's 1960 presidential candidates.

In 23 Oregon contests, Democrats swept up 22 and were leading in 3 others. Republicans won seven and led in one. Ten statehouses changed hands, with the Democrats winning the keys to six and the Republicans four.

**Reizenstein Reported In Good Condition**

Louis F. Reizenstein, long-time newsman with The News-Review and prior Roseburg newspapers, was reported as in good condition today at Douglas Community Hospital following his collapse at his residence Tuesday.

Hospital physicians said Reizenstein probably would be released from the hospital today, cause of his collapse was undetermined, said the hospital.

## Hails Ideals Of Pius

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## Governor Posts Fall To Demos In 31 States

WASHINGTON (AP) — Democrats, displaying amazing strength in traditional Republican strongholds, ousted 6 GOP governors today as they captured definite control of 31 of the nation's 48 statehouses.

But in scattered reversals of their massive nationwide tide, the Democrats lost the big one—New York—and surrendered their grip on three other governorships.

Democrats, however, took the other stellar prize, California—to register a tentative net gain of 2 over their pre-election total of 29 governors, counting holdovers. For the Republicans it was a net loss of 2 from their previous total of 19. With four races still incomplete, Democrats led in three and Republicans in one.

In New York's dramatic "battle of the millionaires," Republican Nelson A. Rockefeller displayed spectacular voter appeal in his first bid for public office by decisively defeating Democratic Gov. Averell Harriman's bid for a second term.

Beyond Fondlest GOP Dreams

Rockefeller's victory, larger than even the fondlest GOP speculation catapulted the oil heir into a governor's seat that has been a proven stepping stone to the White House.

Across the continent, California voters abandoned their traditional GOP voting habits in unprecedented numbers to elect Atty. Gen. Edmund G. Brown as the Golden State's second Democratic governor of the 20th century.

Brown raced ahead from the outset to trounce U.S. Senate Republican Leader William F. Knowland with indications his final victory margin would exceed a million votes. Democrats staged some of their more spectacular upsets elsewhere.

They smashed through to victory in the once mighty Republican strongholds of Wisconsin and South Dakota, recaptured governorships in Maryland and Nevada and ousted a GOP incumbent in Ohio.

For their part, Republicans rammed through mild upsets in Oregon and Arizona and coasted to an expected victory in Rhode Island where the GOP challenger, Christopher Del Sesto, whipped his old foe of two years ago, Democratic Gov. Dennis J. Roberts.

Del Sesto was the apparent victor in 1956 but lost out in a bitter court contest over disputed ballot.

**Match Of Old Foes**

The Ohio race also was a rematch of two old foes. But this time Democrat Michael V. DiSalle, former mayor of Toledo and Korean War federal price stabilizer, easily outdistanced GOP incumbent C. William O'Neill.

In Michigan, Democrat G. Mennen Williams won handily over Republican Paul D. Bagwell for an unprecedented sixth term as governor.

Other Democratic incumbents encountered little or no difficulty in reelection. Colorado, Connecticut, Massachusetts, Minnesota and Texas. Democrats also threatened in Idaho, New Hampshire and Vermont but were defeated.

Kansas Gov. George Docking spoiled GOP comeback hopes by becoming the first Democrat in that state's history to win a second term.

In Iowa, another former Republican stronghold, Democratic Gov. Herschel C. Loveless easily won reelection.

**GOP Candidate Swamped**

In Maryland, where a Democratic victory had been widely forecast, Democratic State Controller J. Millard Tawes swamped GOP Rep. James P. S. Devereux.

World War II Marine hero of Wake Island, for the governorship.

In Pennsylvania, Pittsburgh Mayor David L. Lawrence beat Republican Arthur T. McGonigle to become his state's first Roman Catholic governor.

The stars of the most surprising Democratic upsets were Wisconsin's Gaylord A. Nelson and South Dakota's Ralph Hereth. Given little or no chance by pollsters and veteran political observers, Nelson came from behind to defeat GOP incumbent Vernon W. Thomson. Similarly, Hereth defeated Republican Phil Saunders to become South Dakota's first Democratic governor in 22 years.

In another mild upset, Democrat Grant Sawyer unseated Nevada's Republican Gov. Charles H. Russell.

In Oregon, Republicans triumphed with 36-year-old Mark Hatfield, who wrecked the second term bid of Democratic Gov. Robert D. Holmes.

In Arizona, an unexpectedly strong Republican showing returned the GOP to the statehouse as Paul Fannin easily outdistanced Democrat Robert Morrison.

**Thanks Voters**

Successful winner in the race for district attorney, incumbent Democrat Avery W. Thompson, stated he wished to thank the voters of the county "for their confidence in the work of his office, and for the many persons who worked hard to achieve the victory."

Thompson, in a see-saw battle throughout the night, emerged victor by 205 votes after ballots were unofficially tabulated. His opponent was Roseburg attorney, Donald S. Kelley.

Republican Arthur Selby of Glendale: "When the people have spoken at the polls, no candidate for office can have any alibi." He trailed in the four-man race for two state representative posts.

James E. Sifers, who lost by more than 2,000 votes to incumbent assessor Morris C. Bowker, Republican, said "it was a very good campaign. I enjoyed it even though I was not the choice for the assessor's office. The voters have chosen a good man. My thanks to all the voters of Douglas County regardless of the way they voted."

Bowker, who was attending a funeral this morning, was not available for comment.

Frank Ashby, who lost to Republican opponent, former County Commissioner Elmer R. Metzger, by 1,223 votes, said he had no comment to make on the election outcome.

**Howard F. Wertz Passes At Drain**

Howard Francis Wertz, 73, died at his home in Drain Sunday. He had been a resident of that community for 21 years.

Wertz was born Dec. 12, 1884, at San Jose, Calif. He worked as a sawmill laborer.

Shasta, Calif., Sam of Santa Rosa, Calif.; two sisters, Rita Engstrom of Tangent, Goldie Fisher of San Francisco, Calif.; five grandchildren, several nephews and nieces.

Services will be held at 1:30 p.m. Thursday at Mills Funeral Chapel in Drain. The Rev. Delbert White will officiate and interment will follow in the Comstock Cemetery at Comstock.
