Northwestern Back Selected As Tops

Quarterback Dick Thornton, a precocious kid who lied about his age when he reported at Northwestern two years ago so no one would know he was only 17, is the Associated Press back of the week for the second time this season.

A 6-foot, 180-pound sophomore who marked his 19th birthday by whipping a pair of touchdown passes at the Wildcats surprised Ohio State Saturday, 21-0. Thornton repeated as the nation's top backfield star in a close vote by Notre Dame's George Igo and the Air Force Academy's Rich Mayo.

Thornton, who went to Northwestern because he wanted to be a dentist and because the Evansville, Ill., campus is so close to his Chicago home, also was named back of the week when Northwestern shocked Michigan two weeks ago, 35-12.

Igo Started

Igo, the 205-pound, 6-2 Notre Dame junior, was starting quarterback against Navy, and he threw for three TDs in a 40-20 victory.

Mayo, who connected on 28 of 45 passes for 215 yards pitched seven on a 72-yard comeback in the final minute for a 33-29 victory over Oklahoma State that kept the Air Force unbeaten.

Other backs who caught the eyes of the voters were:

Don Allard, Boston College quarterback, completed nine of 17 passes for 158 yards and pulled off a telling interception in a 25-12 victory over College of Pacific.

Dick Bass, COP halfback gained 52 yards in 19 rushes, returned five kicks for 143 yards and scored all 12 points.

Joe Alberty, Arkansas fullback, returned kickoff 77 yards, setting up winning TD in 21-8 upset over Texas A&M.

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IN THE MAGNIFICENT 1959 MERCURY
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New Faces On Football Map Haven't Upset Early Dope

Those new faces on the map of football's 1958 powers have not upset the pre-season dope on the purported balance of power. The names are different, that's all.

The South was picked as having the strongest football teams in the pre-season poll of sports writers and broadcasters by The Associated Press. Six teams were picked to finish among the top 20 at the season's close. The latest tabulations still show six.

But the Midwest, with five teams picked in September, have six now. The Southwest has three, instead of four as originally picked. The East, with three, and the Rocky Mountain-Far West region, with one, are as picked.

Previously Unnoticed

Louisiana State, the nation's top ranked team, was unnoticed in September. So was Florida (No. 19). But Mississippi State and Miami, 15th and 16th originally, are now unranked among Southern teams.

Northwestern (No. 4) and Purdue (No. 8) have done the unexpected, while Michigan State, picked fourth, is out of sight in the Midwest.

Texas and Texas A&M, 11th and 20th by the September swamis, are gone, and Rice (No. 13) popped in surprisingly.

Oklahoma (No. 6) still upholds the Midlands, while 12th ranked Syracuse and 18th rated Rutgers took over for Navy and Pitt, 7th and 19th originally, in the East. Army (No. 3) is the only survivor.

The Air Force Academy, 10th ranked, replaced Oregon State, a No. 12 choice in the Far West, but OSC may have the last laugh as it heads the pack for the host spot in the Rose Bowl.

Auburn (No. 4) is the only team to be where the experts picked it to finish three weeks hence.

Jim Russell Fires Six Under-Par

SEATTLE (AP) — Jim Russell of Walla Walla Tuesday fired a six-under-par 65 to pace the Northwest qualifiers for the Bing Crosby Invitational Golf Tournament.

Russell posted eight birdies and eight pars. His round was four strokes better than that of Bob Duden of Portland, the No. 2 qualifier.

The other three spots on the Northwest team went to Ray Honsberger of Seattle, Harold West of Longview and Bill Eggers of Portland. The five will represent the Pacific Northwest in the Bing Crosby Invitational at Pebble Beach, Calif., later this year.

Honsberger, West and Johnny Hoetner of Seattle tied at 70 and Eggers, who had a 71, was selected when Hoetner declined to make the trip. Eggers had been tied at 71 with Ken Tucker, Everett, and Chuck Congdon, both of whom are invited automatically each year.

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
