Italian Actress Denies Plans To Wed Songwriter

NEW YORK (AP)—Anna Maria Alberghetti, Italian actress and singer, says she is not marrying songwriter Buddy Bregman and that she is not quarreling with her mother about it.
The 22-year-old brown-eyed blonde announced on the West Coast Monday that she was marrying Bregman, 28, divorced from actress Gloria Haley. Miss Alberghetti has never been married.
Her mother Mrs. Vittoria Alberghetti, commenting on the West Coast announcement, had said in Hollywood: "I am not happy. I don't like a divorced man for my daughter."
Here to open a night club act, Miss Alberghetti told newsmen "I never was engaged to Buddy. Yes, I'm very fond of him. Yes, even in love with him."
However, she added: "But I'm not getting married. I took this engagement to be away from Buddy. My mother and I are not quarreling. We are a very close family. We discussed the whole question of religion."
Miss Alberghetti is a Catholic and Bregman a Jew.
