

Most State Playoffs Berths To Be Decided By Saturday

By late evening today most of the berths in Oregon high school football playoffs will be determined.

Fifteen in the A-1, A-2 and B divisions are at stake, with a few of them to be decided in Saturday games.

No game holds more interest than the Medford-Grants Pass contest at Grants Pass tonight. The teams share 3-0 records in District 6 play although Medford, No. 2 in the Associated Press poll, has a 7-0 season mark to one of 4-1-2 for Grants Pass, which is sixth in the poll.

In District 1, Roosevelt of Portland—already in the playoffs—is after an undefeated season as it meets Cleveland. The last time a Portland team was undefeated in city league play was eight years ago. Grant did it then, and went on to the state title. The game pits the high-scoring Renfro brothers of Jeff — Mel and Raye — against Cleveland's Norm Patera. The Renfro brothers have scored 205 points between them; Patera has scored 124. Jefferson is the No. 1 team in the AP poll, and defending state champion.

This is the way the other district games shape up in the A-1 division:

District 2: Wy'east can win the title if it beats Malalla and it is lightly favored to do so. If it loses, Parkrose and Troutdale have a chance.

District 3: Astoria, the No. 4 team in the poll, is undefeated in six district games. Its opponent this weekend is Gresham which has won five out of six. A gresham win would put it in a tie with Astoria.

District 4: West Linn has only to beat Tillamook to take the title. But if West Linn loses, McMinnville's game against winless Newberg and Oregon City's against Dallas could be deciding.

District 5: Marshfield, No. 3 in the poll, meets its traditional rival North Bend. Roseburg with a 3-1 district record against Marshfield's 3-0, plays a non-district game with Cottage Grove.

District 7: Pendleton, No. 9 in the poll, has already clinched a berth.

District 8: North Salem, the poll's No. 5 team, is in the playoffs. It finishes off at Primeville.

In A-2 play this is the situation:

District 1: Seaside is in the playoffs; District 2: Willamina is in but meets Sheridan this weekend; District 3: Reedsport, Florence and Newport are tied. The first two are paired this week while Newport meets Toledo; District 4: Bandon will have a title berth if it beats Pacific; District 5: Oakridge needs a win over Elmira; District 6: Eagle Point and Sutherlin play for the district title; District 7: Lakeview and Vale play for the title; District 8: Serrano Catholic needs a win over Aurora.

Baylor Heads List For NBA Rookie Honor

The National Basketball Association season is less than two weeks old. But already Elgin Baylor, the former college All-American from Seattle, has grabbed a headlock hold on Rookie-of-the-Year honors.

Baylor scored 26 points Thursday night to lead the Minneapolis Lakers to a 103-101 victory over the Philadelphia Warriors. The triumph gave last season's tail-enders sole possession of first place in the Western Division with a 4-2 record.

Baylor collected 13 of his points in the fourth quarter as the Lakers fought off a closing rush by Philadelphia. The Warriors dropped into the Eastern Division cellar with a 2-3 mark. Dick Garmaker, also helped the Lakers with 24 points while Tom Gola had 22 and Joe Graboski and Jack George 20 each for Philadelphia.

Baylor has scored 126 points in six games for a 21.0 average. He is fourth in the individual scoring race, trailing only George Yardley of Detroit 170 points, Bob Pettit of St. Louis 146 and Jack Twyman of Cincinnati 129.

New York is at Detroit in tonight's only game.

Willamette Heavy NW Loop Favorite

The Willamette Bearcats, the No. 2 small college team in the nation, are heavy favorites to win the Northwest Conference football title Saturday.

The Bearcats, ranked No. 2 nationally by the NAIA, will play their last conference game of the season Saturday against Lewis and Clark in Portland.

Lewis and Clark has a fine passer in young Royce McDaniel, a sophomore from Sweet Home. But Willamette has a big, fast line and a superb backfield topped by Stan Solomon, ranked by many as the equal of any Pacific Coast Conference performer.

The only other conference team with even a chance to tie the Willamette is defending champion Linfield, which Saturday will play winless Pacific at McMinnville.

The other conference game will match College of Idaho and Whitman at Walla Walla.

Giant Helicopters Lift Troops Behind Theoretical Enemy

ABOARD CARRIER THETIS BAY (AP)—Giant army helicopters lifted 500 troops from this ship Wednesday and landed them behind theoretical enemy lines along the San Simeon, Calif., coast.

The copter-borne troops landed 10 miles back in the hills and moved inland toward objectives in the Central Valley, via King City, Camp Roberts, Paso Robles and

San Luis Obispo.

The attack was part of Operation Rocky Shells, a large-scale war games exercise against a mock enemy army. The enemy is supposed to have invaded from Mexico and pushed north to the Columbia River.

Col. Curtis L. Hankins, 6th Army aviation officer, predicted that the new invasion technique—employing mass helicopter as-

so-called taking of base specially-adapted carriers at sea—would go far beyond sealing off a beach-head.

"The helicopter is going to change the entire pattern of warfare. It possibly could end all beachhead landings as they were known in World War II."

By dusk, the San Simeon beaches bordering the Hearst ranch had become a beachhead 20 miles long and several miles deep. The aim of the exercise is to sever the enemy's communication lines.

The attack started after two simulated atomic blasts and intense naval gunfire from 40 vessels against enemy positions.

Some 10,000 troops, composing two army combat groups, poured ashore in one of the smoothest amphibious assaults ever staged. Not one casualty was reported.

The deck of the Thetis Bay was hardly large enough to accommodate the steady stream of whirling troop carriers. The little carrier is considered the forerunner of a new class which may include converted Essex-class supercarriers.
