

Fliegel To Attend Highway Meeting In Los Angeles

State Rep. Al Fliegel, Roseburg, chairman of the Legislative Interim Highway Committee, will attend the highway meeting Wednesday and Thursday of the Western Regional Conference of the Council of State Governments in Los Angeles.

Fliegel said regulation of billboard advertising along the interstate freeway system will be one of the major discussion points in the conference.

He said he expects to learn the feeling in other states toward participation in the federal government's offer of purchase of advertising rights along freeways.

Fliegel pointed out that the interim committee had no recommendation concerning billboard regulation, but added that legislation is almost certain to be proposed in the Legislature next year.

He will return Friday from the conference.

Violent Accidents Kill 13 Persons In Oregon

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Tangent. The victims were Ricky Gene Blanton, 18 months, Junction City, and Dona Lee Simler, 4, Eugene. The wreck's other victim was Mrs. Rachel Holston, Carnation, Wash.

Police said a car carrying the children and several others, driven by Donald Blanton of Junction City, had just passed a car when it met the pickup, driven by James E. Holston, whose wife was one of the victims.

In another Sunday crash, William Doyle Lee Stewart, 19, of Canyonville was fatally injured near Myrtle Creek. He was a passenger in a car which overturned while it was being chased by police for "playing tag" with another car.

Another passenger, Edward Joel Haney, 16, Myrtle Creek, was hospitalized with face cuts.

A plane crashed into a fog-shrouded hillside near Dexter, carrying Warren Hamilton Stover, 44, a Corvallis business man, to his death. He was an engineering consultant for the Air Force and was flying from Reno, Nev., to his home.

A gun and a hunting trip played a part in two other Sunday accidents.

Carl Hardell Jr., 18, Lebanon, was drowned in the South Santiam River near Lebanon when a boat overturned in swift water as he and two others hunted ducks.

The companions who struggled to shore were Martin Grunget and Tom Davis, both 17 and both of Lebanon.

In the Fall Creek area, 15 miles south of Eugene, Dale Gilbert, 15, was killed when a 22-caliber rifle discharged in a neighbor's home.

Coroner Fred Buell said Gilbert and Darrell Meadows, 14, both had a hand on the rifle as they were removing it from a gun rack when the weapon discharged.

Gilbert was struck in the chest, and was dead when an ambulance arrived.

Little Rock Directed To Effect Integration

tion with any one else, which are capable of serving to impede, thwart, or frustrate the execution of the integration plan mandated against them."

The 23-page decision was handed down 27 days after final arguments were heard on whether Little Rock's four public high schools could be leased for use as private, segregated institutions.

Private school facilities were set up in Little Rock for white pupils only after Gov. Orval E. Faubus closed the public schools.

The decision set out that the school board members have "an obligation under the previous general order against them to move forward within their official powers" with integration on their own initiative.

The court said a private school corporation, now operating in Little Rock, can intervene in the district court within 10 days if it feels it has a legal right to use the public school buildings and equipment.

Three Girls Arrested On Shoplifting Counts

Three Roseburg girls, two aged 15 and another 16, were arrested by Roseburg police Saturday morning after allegedly taking several pieces of costume jewelry from a SE Jackson St. Jewelry store.

The trio, all on probation, were seen shoplifting. A store clerk notified police and the girls were picked up a few minutes later walking along a downtown street. At police station they turned over the stolen articles which included an expansion bracelet, a set of earrings and a gold-colored clock chime.

The girls have been remanded to the custody of their parents waiting a juvenile court hearing.

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Russians Ready To Quit Berlin, Says Khrushchev

MOSCOW (AP)—Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev called today for an end to the four-power division of Berlin. He indicated the Soviets were ready to quit that city.

Radio Moscow quoted Khrushchev as telling a Polish-Soviet friendship meeting in Lenin Stadium: "The time has evidently come for the powers which signed the Potsdam agreement to give up the remnants of the occupation regime in Berlin and thus make it possible to create a normal atmosphere in the capital of the German Democratic Republic (Communist East Germany)."

Khrushchev announced that the Soviet Union, on its part, will hand over to East Germany those functions in Berlin which are still handled by Soviet organs.

The Soviet leader said that the 1945 Potsdam agreement had been violated by the United States, Britain and France on all points except the four-power status of Berlin.

He accused the West of using Berlin to carry on subversive activity against East Germany, against the Soviet Union and other Warsaw Pact countries.

He said the West German government, a member of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization, "is now treading a road dangerous to the cause of peace in Europe and fatal to West Germany itself."

West Germany, he said, "would not last a day in a modern war."

A war, he declared, would be destructive to West Germany and would bring untold sufferings to the peoples of other countries.

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National Grange Head Asks Change In Farm Programs

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich. (AP)—The head of the National Grange called today for changes in federal farm programs that would free taxpayers from government subsidies on agricultural production.

Herschel Newsom, master of the nation's oldest farm organization, said farm income must come from the users of farm products and not from taxpayers.

In an address prepared for the Grange's 92nd annual convention, Newsom added: "We believe that Americans have both a moral and economic obligation to pay an American price for products which they use or consume from American farms. We do not believe that those same Americans, as taxpayers, have an obligation to subsidize total agricultural production and then pay additional subsidy on that portion not consumed through private trade channels to dispose of it in foreign markets or otherwise."

The farm leader told Grange delegates present programs have not given farmers a fair income in relation to their contributions to the public welfare.

The convention, which will close Nov. 18, is the first of a major farm group to be held since the Republicans suffered heavy losses in farming as well as other parts of the country at the recent congressional elections.

Newsom said the nation should continue to encourage abundant farm production so as to assure ample reserves. But the extra supplies, he said, should not be permitted to drag down farm prices as, he said, is now the case.

Newsom called also for government withdrawal from buying and selling of farm products.

Elizabeth Taylor To Marry Eddie

NEW YORK (AP)—Actress Elizabeth Taylor plans to marry singer Eddie Fisher within a month, the New York Post said today in a dispatch from Hollywood.

"That comes from the best of sources," said the story by Sidney Skolsky.

"Ever since Eddie's September breakup with Debbie Reynolds, he and Liz have been practically inseparable," Skolsky wrote. "He's always over at her house, and the crowd that travels with him is often there, too."

He added that Fisher may seek a quick divorce in Mexico.

"Lawyers for both are working to effect a settlement, and Debbie is not playing hard to get along with," Skolsky said. "In fact, it looks as if Debbie has some plans of her own and is as anxious as Eddie to get the divorce."

Complaint Charges U. S. Plywood With Unfair Practices

PORTLAND (AP)—A complaint charging unfair labor practices has been signed against the U. S. Plywood Corp. at Roseburg by Patrick Walker, a regional director of the National Labor Relations Board.

The complaint said that A.L. Crowell was fired from the firm's Roseburg plant because of his union activities with the International Woodworkers of America.

Marshall Leeper of Eugene, the firm's regional manager, promptly said Crowell's discharge had nothing to do with union activities.

In Roseburg today, William Borchert, U. S. Plywood personnel manager, said Crowell had worked only some 29 days after he was hired when the plant opened last spring. Crowell worked patching panels, Borchert said, and was discharged "because of sloppy work and personal habits."

Borchert also noted that after being fired, Crowell was hired by the International Woodworkers of America as an organizer during the period when workers were deciding which union would represent them.

Charles Lynch, business agent for the local union, said Crowell had been hired by an international organizer because he had worked at the plant and knew many of the employees. Crowell worked for the union until Sept. 13, Lynch said.

The NLRB said a trial examiner will hold a hearing in Roseburg Dec. 16. This will start at 10 a.m. and be conducted in the Post Office Building.

Kasper Convicted For Third Time

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP)—John Kasper, professional segregationist from New Jersey, gave no indication of changing his ways after his third conviction on charges stemming from his part in school integration disturbances.

A jury of 12 white men convicted him Saturday of inciting to riot on the opening day of school here last year, and set his punishment at six months in the workhouse and a \$500 fine — just half the maximum.

As he waited for the verdict, Kasper said he intended to go to Memphis to test the threat police have made to arrest him if he tries to speak there.

After the verdict was announced Kasper's followers crowded around him. But he soothed them, saying: "It's all right, folks. I appreciate what you've done. We're going to win the next one."

He is free in \$2,500 bond pending hearing on a new trial motion Dec. 5.

Showdown Fight Seen To Curb Rules Committee Powers

WASHINGTON (AP)—A showdown fight to curb the powers of the conservative-dominated House Rules Committee may develop when Congress convenes Jan. 7.

It's a fight congressional leaders wish to avert, but fear they cannot.

Centers on demands of Democrats from Northern and Western areas for restoration of the 21-day rule, which was in effect in 1949-1950.

Under that provision the Rules Committee could not bottle up for more than 21 days any bill approved by a standing committee of the House. After that the bill could be called up for floor action without Rules Committee approval.

The Rules Committee serves as a steering committee or traffic cop, determining which legislation goes to the floor for a vote and under what limitations governing debate and amendments.

That committee has been dominated for years by a coalition of Republicans and Southern Democrats. With Congress under Democratic control, it is composed of 8 Democrats and 4 Republicans.

Two of the Democrats are Chairman Howard W. Smith of Virginia and Rep. William E. Colmer of Mississippi.

Smith and Colmer, along with the four Republicans, have effectively bottled up in committee many bills they opposed.

Legislation not cleared by a majority of the Rules Committee has difficulty reaching the House floor for a vote.

The 21-day rule was adopted in the 81st Congress, when Democrats had a 263-171 margin in the House. The new House is divided 281-153 Democratic, with one race in Illinois still undecided and one member still to be elected from Alaska.

The boys admitted damaging the property when questioned by police who picked them up after a neighbor of the Mountains identified them. Police turned them over to their parents pending a juvenile hearing.

Plane Crashes

NEW YORK (AP)—A Seaboard and Western Airlines Super-Constellation crashed and burned while taking off on a training flight from Idlewild Airport today. An airline official said all five crewmen escaped unhurt.

The plane carved 300 yards off the runway and smashed into a standing Trans-Canada Viscount. The two craft came to rest against one of the terminal's passenger depots and burst into flames, which enveloped both planes and part of the building.
