RIVERSIDE, Calif. (AP) — Maybe Hollywood isn't kidding with the weird creatures it's currently starring in horror movies.

Charlie Wetzel saw something the other night that would get top billing in any cast of monsters and he was miles from the nearest movie — and the nearest bar.

In a report to police Sunday Wetzel told of driving on a lonely road near Riverside Saturday night when something jumped in front of his car.

"It had a round, scarecrowish head," said Charlie. "The eyes were all shining like something fluorescent and it had a protuberant mouth. It was covered with scales, or leaves."

"It had a longer arm than anything I'd ever seen. It reached all the way back to the windshield and began clawing at me."

The terrified Wetzel said he stepped on the gas and sped off as the thing fell back with a gurgle.

For a while police thought Wetzel might have startled a vulture eating a dead rabbit in the road, but a check of the scene didn't turn up even a feather.

Police are puzzled as to what to do next. Here's a suggestion: turn the case over to a Hollywood talent scout.

Rain Of Bullets Cuts Down Officer At Boulder, Colo.

BOULDER, Colo. (AP) — A rain of bullets cut down a city patrolman early Sunday at a roadblock where he and another officer had halted a car of suspected robbers.

Officer Raymond McMaster, 30, was struck four times. He died a short time later at Boulder Community Hospital.

Sheriff Arthur T. Everson said Revilo Robert Sides, 22, of Denver, was arrested here Sunday afternoon. He was questioned for more than two hours, then jailed without charge. Everson said officers here and in Denver are seeking Sides' brother.

McMaster and Patrolman Howard Grothjan halted the car north of this university city within an hour of a \$1,500 armed robbery at a roadside cafe at Lyons, 16 miles north of here.

The officers first believed only one man was in the car. The driver emerged and stood mute. McMaster circled the car and was shot down by a gunman who had left the car unseen on the passenger's side.

The patrolman sprawled on the ground while the bandits fired at him. When another police cruiser approached, McMaster's killer jumped in the bandits' car and escaped. The original driver fled on foot across a field.

McMaster and Grothjan fired nine shots.

The getaway car was found abandoned in North Boulder. There were blood stains in the back seat.

Fog Turns Road Into Nightmare 100 Cars Crash

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP) — Fog turned a stretch of Pacific Coast highway into a nightmare alley in which more than 100 cars collided. Two women were killed and 15 persons injured.

Motorists speeding south along the busy highway were taken unaware by the thick fog bank 20 miles north of San Diego. Moving abruptly from clear weather into the fog they piled up with frightening regularity over a six-hour period Sunday.

The two women killed were passengers in two cars involved in a minor rear-end collision. They were standing by the damaged cars when another car plowed into them.

Killed were Mrs. Barbara Tittle, 24, San Francisco and Mrs. Esther Anderson, 38, Los Angeles. Mrs. Tittle's husband, Robert, 30, was seriously injured.

The accidents all took place during the early morning on a 3 1/2 mile stretch of the highway, which skirts the ocean. One series involved 25 cars in a chain reaction of rear-end collisions. Ten cars angled in another pileup. In all 23 cars were so badly damaged they had to be towed away.

Explosion Rains Live Artillery Over Wide Area

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP) — Exploding ammunition cars rained live artillery shells and hand grenades over a wide area at the Southern Railway's Norris yards Sunday and made the area hazardous.

The threat of additional explosions kept railroad officials at a distance.

Witnesses said five cars loaded with 165 millimeter shells and another with hand grenades were involved. Flames threatened two cars loaded with fuel.

Charles Clem, 25, a volunteer fireman, suffered a fractured skull on a flying fragment. He was listed in fair condition at University Hospital.

The explosions began when the string of ammunition cars side-swiped other cars while a train was being assembled. A railroad worker said he heard a small explosion. A roaring series of blasts followed.

Census Bureau Raises Estimate For Year 1975

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Census Bureau has raised by 10 to 15 million persons its estimate of the nation's population in 1975.

New estimates released Sunday put the total for that year at between 215,800,000 and 243,900,000 depending on future trends in births, deaths and immigration. The new figures replaced estimates made only two years ago that the total would range between 206,900,000 and 228,500,000. The present total is about 175 million.

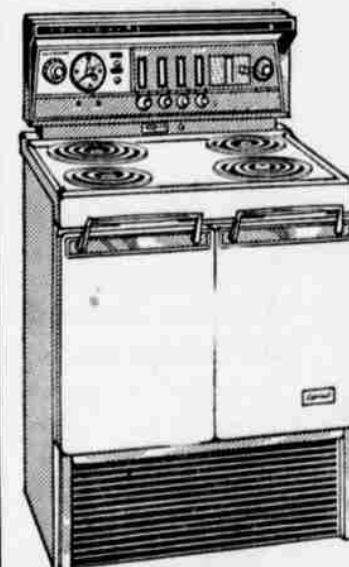
