

Casanova Credits QB Grosz With Key Role In 12-0 Win

EUGENE (AP)—There were a lot of factors in Oregon's 12-0 football victory over Stanford, coach Len Casanova said Sunday night, but mostly it was quarterback Dave Grosz.

"It was his best game of the year by far," said Casanova. "It was a very good job."

Grosz, a 6-1, 193-pound sophomore from Kent, Wash., directed Oregon to two touchdown drives that brought the Ducks back from a three-game losing streak.

Oregon had been able to score only six points in its three previous games, but early in the third period Saturday Grosz triggered the initial score against Stanford.

Four straight times Grosz picked up 21 yards to the Stanford 11. Then he swung out running and flipped a pass to Willie West, who was downed on the three.

Willamette Wins 8th Straight To Clinch NW Conference Title

Willamette added an eighth straight victory to its unbeaten string Saturday night and the Bearcats thus were assured of the Northwest Conference football title.

The Bearcats, featuring a split attack engineered by quarterback Keith Driver, thumped Lewis and Clark 27-0.

Driver plunged one yard for one touchdown, then pitched out to Ray Sarver, who sprinted 32 yards for another. Fullback Larry Miller lunged across twice from one yard out after the Bearcats drove more than 70 yards.

The unbeaten record of the Bearcats, who ranked No. 3 among the nation's small colleges last week, includes five conference games.

Elsewhere in the conference Saturday night Pacific tied Linfield 7-7 and Whitman defeated College of Idaho 26-7.

Pacific, an underdog with only one triumph in six starts this season, nearly defeated Linfield, now 6-1.

Pacific's Jack McConnell intercepted a Linfield pass and raced 21 yards to score. Bob Dixon kicked the extra point.

Then Linfield fullback Sel Spray capped a 75-yard scoring drive when he plunged across from one yard out. Gene Manley booted the tying conversion.

At another point, Jack Hehring of the Pacific Badgers broke loose for 66 yards. He finally was halted on the Linfield 12. The threat evaporated four plays later when Linfield knocked down a Pacific pass in the end zone.

Whitman marched steadily past College of Idaho, although Charley Alvano connected on 19 of 33 passes. It was Whitman's first victory over College of Idaho since 1942.

The game with Lewis and Clark was Willamette's final conference game of the season. Next Saturday the Bearcats go to Yuma for a game with Arizona State of Flagstaff—also ranked high by the NAIA.

Conference games Saturday will put Lewis and Clark at Pacific and College of Idaho at Linfield.

Southern Oregon scored again as Del Brood plunged over from the one, but Eastern tied it on John Hook's 36-yard pass to Ray Alvieri.

OCE Drop Tolls

Both Oregon College of Education and Portland State stepped outside the conference and got beat. OCE was trampled 47-26 by the University of British Columbia and Portland State was belted 26-6 by Whitworth College.

UBC's first halfback, Don Vassos, scored three touchdowns. He sprinted 35 yards around end for the first, caught a 41-yard pass for the second and streaked seven yards for the third.

Portland State jumped into an early lead against Whitworth as Bob Turner plunged four yards off tackle. But Whitworth regained the lead on a 72-yard pass and run play. From then on it was Whitworth's game.

Though league play is finished, the conference's five teams all will play non-counting games next Saturday.

The schedule: Westminster at Portland State, Southern Oregon at Eastern Washington, Oregon Tech at Whittier, Grays Harbor at Eastern Oregon, Oregon College of Education at Lower Columbia.
