

Sen. Johnson's Appointment To U. S. Delegation At UN Shows Bipartisan Approach

SEATTLE (AP) — The administration's appointment of Senate Majority Leader Lyndon Johnson to the U. S. delegation to the United Nations marks the start today of a new and strongly bipartisan effort to ban military weapons from outer space.

Secretary of State Dulles took time out from the Colombo Plan ministerial conference to announce Johnson's acceptance of the post.

With President Eisenhower's approval, Dulles said he had asked the Texas senator who heads the Senate Space and Aeronautics Committee to make a statement to the U. N. General Assembly together with Henry Cabot Lodge. Debate on the outer space issue begins within a day or two.

Dulles said Johnson was asked to serve in this role "in order to make clear to the world how much all Americans agree on the importance of this subject."

Also Has Resolution

The Soviet Union also has a resolution before the U. N. on outer space but insists that it cannot give up control unless the United States abandons its foreign bases where long range missiles can be used against them.

Authoritative sources pointed out that the Soviet Union also has missile bases which threaten Britain, France and West Germany as well as the United States.

Sources close to Dulles said the secretary feels strongly that now is the time to ban long-range missiles, while they are still in their infancy.

Hussein left Amman Airport Monday in a twin-engine transport plane bound for a European vacation. He later reported that two communist-built MIG jet fighters from Syria set upon him near Damascus, capital of the Syrian Province.

The MIGs tried to force his plane down but did not fire at it, the king said. His pilot dropped down near the ground for a wild hedgehopping flight back over rugged country to Amman.

Hussein, himself a pilot, was riding as co-pilot. His pilot said the two MIGs were trying to get into position to fire at the Jordanian plane all the way back.

Committee Would Consolidate Fish, Game Commissions

SALEM (AP)—Consolidation of the fish and game commissions has been recommended by the Legislative Fish and Wildlife Interim Committee, it was disclosed today.

The committee, however, expressed doubt whether the merger could be accomplished at the coming legislative session. It said a lot of convincing of sports groups has to be done first.

The Fish Commission regulates commercial fishing. The Game Commission handles sports fishing and hunting.

Such a merger, the committee said, would save money, provide better research, permit better coordinated conservation programs, and permit better public education in wildlife matters.

The committee also recommended elimination of laws regulating angling, thus leaving it entirely up to the Game Commission; placing a Game Commission member on the state Sanitary Authority; speeding up of efforts to curb Japanese salmon fishing in eastern Pacific waters; and permitting the governor to extend hunting seasons by the same number of days that he delays their start.

The committee also recommended that efforts be made to obtain laws and regulations that are uniform with those of Washington and California.

It suggested that hunters, in applying for their first licenses, be made to pass safety examinations; and that the Fish and Game Commission be asked whether there should be an offshore salmon season from June 1 to Oct. 1.

It called for more research in salt water fishing.

Pacific Logging Congress Holding Three-Day Meet

PORTLAND (AP)—The Pacific Logging Congress continued a three-day meeting here today with some 1,500 woods operators and equipment dealers on hand.

Nils B. Hull, president, told the opening session Monday that the big problems for logging operators today are sustained yield, allowed cuts, timber appraisals and increasing taxes.

Operators must concern themselves more now, he continued, with "what to log" rather than "how to log."

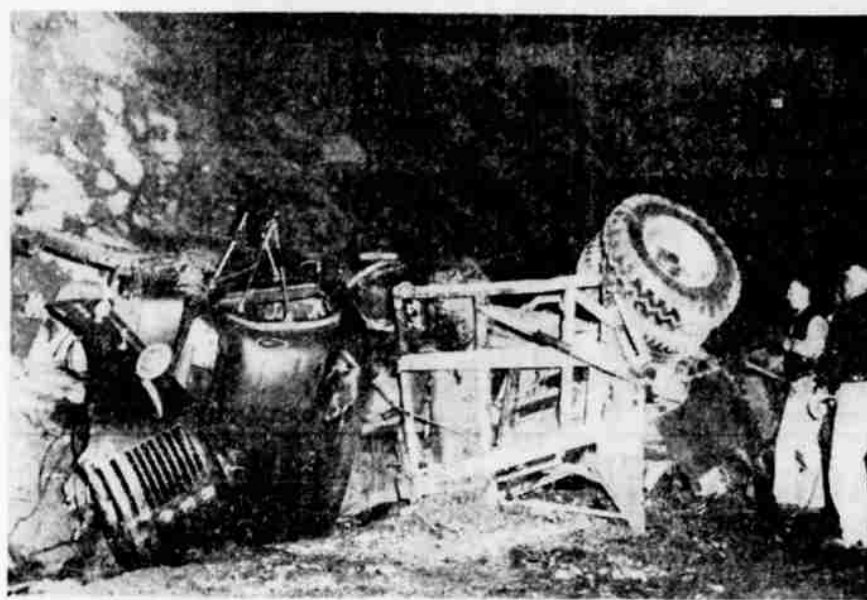
"Increasingly," he added, "forestry school educators realize that the strongest incentive for men to grow and maintain private forests is the return made by developing uses and markets and good woods products."

Gomulka Returns Home; East-West Flareup Seen

MOSCOW (AP)—Polish Communist party chief Wladyslaw Gomulka left for home today, leaving behind a wave of speculation on the possibility of a new East-West flareup in Europe.

Observers here wondered if the final speech by Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev during Gomulka's visit meant trouble over Berlin.

Gomulka and Khrushchev Monday night signed a communique to be released simultaneously in Warsaw and Moscow Wednesday. Pravda, the Communist party newspaper, reproduced in detail today Khrushchev's suggestion that the three Western powers get out of West Berlin. He gave no hint how far the Kremlin plans to push its claim that Western violations have eliminated all further use for the Potsdam Pact under which the city is now ruled.

Father-Son Logging Duo Hurt As Truck Wrecked

A father-son logging team landed in a Roseburg hospital Monday when the brakes failed on their log truck and they bailed out on Steamboat Creek Rd.

Both were reported in satisfactory condition this morning at Douglas Community Hospital. Charles William Neal, 45, suffered a fractured leg and head and elbow injuries. His son, Thomas Franklin, 19, received a head laceration.

Young Neal told state police he was driving the truck which was towing a homemade trailer when he missed a gear in shifting and then started losing the air to his brakes. He said he told his father to jump and as soon as he thought the elder Neal was in the clear, turned the truck toward the bank and leaped out himself.

The two men were brought to the hospital by ambulance and the badly wrecked truck was towed to Roseburg.

In another Monday accident investigated by state police, all riders in a three-car accordion-type crash escaped injury. Officers reported the rear end collision occurred on Highway 42 west of Kelley's Korner.

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was politics which "deserves and demands the interest" of business and labor. He said the organized influence groups, however, must be balanced to avert excesses on either side. He insisted that politics must be of a non-partisan nature to benefit the state.

"We must grow up in action and thinking," he said. "The basic test must be: Is it good for Oregon? If it is, it will be good for all the people."

He said unions and business must "think big and act big, with mature judgment."

The former state legislator cited the Associated Oregon Industries as an influence group which can do much good for the state. He was preceded on the program by Earl Mollard, vice president of AOI for this area, who explained the purposes of the group. The association was formed on a state-wide basis in August. He said the organization is designed to (1) protect and advance the interests of Oregon industry and business; (2) represent Oregon industries before governmental bodies; (3) create better understanding between industry and the public; and (4) provide an information clearing-house for Oregon industries.

Mollard said the association is now made up of 500 businesses and industries and was trying to push membership to 1,000.

Also attending the meeting was Ray Martin, a member of the state board of directors, and Charles Ogle, managing director.

Carl O. Fisher, Eugene, OAB president and newly-elected state legislator, said the broadcasters will be host to legislators at a dinner Friday.

Gov. Robert Holmes, past vice president of the association, will speak at the noon luncheon. Gov. elect Mark Hatfield will speak at the dinner over a closed-circuit network.

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Cross Burned In Front Yard Of Negro Woman

HOUSTON (AP) — A cross burned Monday night in the front yard of Mrs. Charles White, who was elected the first Negro member of the Houston School Board last week.

Three of her five children noticed the flaming cross about 3 p. m. Her husband, an optometrist, quickly extinguished the blaze. He said the cross was about five feet tall.

Mrs. White said she did not think the cross burning reflected the general feeling of the Houston public.

"I feel that the persons who did this are ashamed of their act as they did not show themselves," she said.

"I am ashamed that there are persons who would desecrate a cross in such a way."

The Houston School Board received a petition to rehear results of the election earlier Monday evening. Mrs. White polled about 36,000 votes, approximately 8,000 more than her nearest opponent, incumbent John Glen.

The request forced the school board to delay formal approval of the election results. School attorneys said the board had no right to refuse the rehear.

Iraq's Military Court Sentences Jamali To Hang

DAMASCUS (AP)—Radio Baghdad announced today Iraq's supreme military court had sentenced ex-Premier Fadhil Jamali to be hanged.

Sentenced to die with Jamali—former foreign minister and U. N. delegate under King Faisal's regime which was destroyed by a revolution July 14—were two military leaders.

They are Gen. Rafik Aref, former army chief of staff, and his deputy, Maj. Gen. Ghazi Daghistani.

This Aref is not to be confused with Col. Abdel Salam Aref, who helped engineer the revolution, but is now himself awaiting trial after splitting with his chief, Premier Abdel Kerim Kassam.

Jamali and the generals were convicted on charges of: 1. Plotting to invade Syria and force her into federation with Iraq by illegal means in 1956 and 1957.

2. Asking help of the United States, Britain, and the Baghdad Pact to carry out the plot.

3. Endangering Iraq's security, and world peace.

U. S. And Russia Define Views On Surprise Attacks

GENEVA (AP) — The United States and the Soviet Union today defined their views on how the 10-nation conference on surprise attack problems should proceed with its work.

A communique issued at the conclusion of a closed-door meeting said statements were made by the heads of the American and Soviet delegations. The communique gave no indication of a meeting of minds.

The communique defined the conference as one "of experts for the study of possible measures which might be helpful" in preventing surprise attack and for preparation of a report thereon to governments.

That definition corresponds to the Western view of the objectives.

The Western side glumly noted that Soviet Dep. Foreign Minister Vassili Kuznetsov, speaking at a public session, brought in a whole list of cold war issues. The West regards such matters as entirely outside the scope of this conference.

The first big hurdle in meetings of this type is to secure agreement on the order of business.

The whole question of surprise attacks is so complex observers expect several days at least to be consumed in working out an agenda.
