

COPE Office Will Close, Find New Education Approach

PORTLAND (AP)—The AFL-CIO Committee on Political Education (COPE) is going to close its local office until after the first of the year, then try to find a new approach.

"We don't seem to be getting across and we don't know why," Sylvia McGarrity of the women's activities department told the Multnomah County Central Labor Council here this week in discussing labor's impact on last week's elections.

Eugene Watson of the Streetcar-men's Union offered one reason: "Our top union leaders are so en-

grossed in politics they don't take time to learn what the people think about us."

Scientist Says U. S. Must Achieve New Strength

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower's chief scientific adviser said today the nation must make a greater effort to achieve the scientific strength it needs for survival.

"Already some of the spirit that followed Sputnik has lost its force," Dr. James R. Killian Jr. said in a speech prepared for the American Assn. of Land Grant Colleges and State Universities.

He said there is need for improving government policy making and for giving more and better training in the universities to future scientists and engineers.
