Galla soon saw a three-foot opening and heard his dog whining. He borrowed a 66-foot cable from a nearby ranch. It was far too short.

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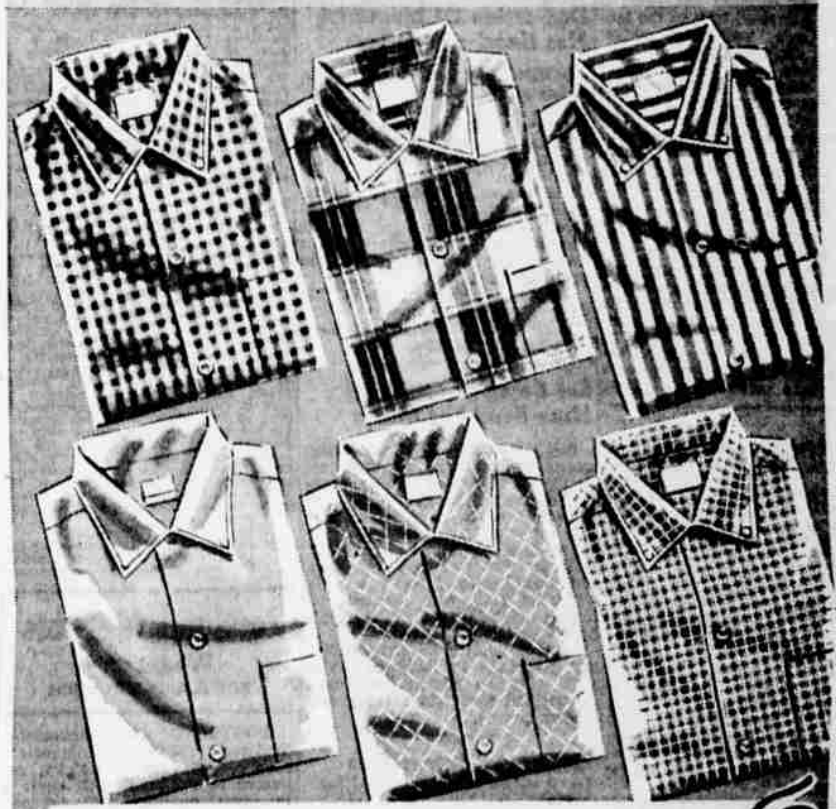
