

Motion To Postpone Beck's Trial Denied By District Judge

TACOMA, Wash. (AP)—A motion for postponement of Dave Beck's income tax evasion trial was denied Tuesday by U. S. District Judge George H. Bland, who took the occasion to rebuke the American Civil Liberties Union. Beck's attorney, Charles S. Burdell, filed the motion shortly before the scheduled trial. Beck's trial opened Monday. Six lawyers of the Civil Liberties Union also submitted a brief as "friends of the court" supporting the action. Both Burdell and the ACLU contended that public prejudice against Beck and the Teamsters Union he formerly headed would make it impossible for him to receive a fair trial. Judge Bland, saying he felt obliged "to make a statement for the record," minimized the bias issue and said he was convinced the jury would reach a fair and impartial verdict. He said none of the six ACLU attorneys lived in this part of the country and could have no way of knowing the attitudes of residents of the area or of the jurors selected to try the case. Unfolds of evidence by stipulation today as the trial entered its second day. They included Beck's liabilities for the years 1949-53, among which were \$12,000 owed to the Seattle-First National Bank and \$170,423 to the Occidental Life Insurance Co. of Los Angeles in 1953, and \$247,688 owed Occidental in 1951. Beck's defense will be that he took non-taxable union funds "in a rather peculiar way" and became rich.

Details Given On Nixon's Visit To Great Britain

WASHINGTON (AP)—The White House announced today some details of the Nov. 25-29 visit by the Vice President and Mrs. Nixon to Great Britain. Nixon is making the trip primarily to represent President Eisenhower at the dedication of the American chapel in St. Paul's Cathedral Nov. 26. He and Mrs. Nixon will be guests of Queen Elizabeth II at a Buckingham Palace luncheon, and attend a dinner given by the English Speaking Union. Nixon will be honored at a Regency luncheon Nov. 25, given by the Pilgrims of Great Britain. The White House said he also will be entertained by Prime Minister Macmillan and Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd. Queen Elizabeth will be the guest of the Nixons at dinner in the home of U. S. Ambassador John Hay Whitney, Nov. 27. The chapel commemorates the sacrifices of the British and American peoples in World War II, particularly the sacrifices of the 26,000 members of the U. S. armed forces who lost their lives when based in Britain, or who were buried in the British Isles.

NEW PRESIDENT

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Mothers, Children Spend Veterans Day Widening Road

SCAPPOOSE (AP)—A group of mothers and their children spent Veterans Day—a school holiday—widening a narrow county road near here with shovels. The women fear that one of three school buses which travels the road every day, may plunge off into a 50-foot-deep ravine at one of four blind curves. They said that a logging truck and a furniture van slipped off the road into the canyon last summer. "We think God it was not a bad idea," one mother said. "We had to get out of the road before the logging truck came. The mothers said in a petition to the Columbia County Court. Mrs. Edward J. Jont, whose three grandsons ride the bus, said the mothers had received only three letters after three years of pleading to the court. So they decided to take matters into their own hands. "Oregon can spend a lot of money for a centennial. They should put out some to protect our kids," Mrs. Jones said.

Judge Healy, 77, Plans To Retire, He Tells President

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Judge William Healy, 77, of the U. S. court of appeals said Wednesday he has told President Eisenhower he would retire Dec. 31. Judge Healy was an Idaho attorney when President Roosevelt appointed him to the 8th Circuit Court of Appeals in 1937. The court has jurisdiction in eight western states, including Alaska, and the territories of Hawaii and Guam. "I have reached the age when I want to take a little easier," Judge Healy told newsmen. "But I expect to continue to do court work enough to keep busy." His retirement will leave eight active judges on the court's bench. He will join four other judges who are retired but still serve the court part time. Born at Wintham, Iowa, Judge Healy got his law degree at Iowa Law School in 1908 and moved to Silver City, Idaho. He was a member of the Iowa bar and served as deputy attorney general of that state. He was also a member of the U. S. Supreme Court. Judge Healy and his wife, Mary, whom he married in 1914, moved to Boise that year. He was general counsel of the Farns Credit Administration at Spokane from 1924 until appointed judge.

U. S. Library, Sacked By Mob, Again Flourishes

ALGIERES (AP)—The U. S. library in Algiers, sacked by an angry mob last May, has reopened its doors. Business is good. Howard White, public affairs officer at the U. S. consulate, said some 120 persons have been visiting the library daily. "The atmosphere is very good," said White. "The interest in the United States is terrific and we are here to help all those who want to find out about America." The library, in the heart of the city on Rue Michel, was attacked by a mob which was on its way to storm the Government Building during the May demonstrations against the 4th French Republic. Windows were broken, books and magazines were strewn on the street. Europeans in Algiers—the most influential element in this city of some 600,000—had been bitterly anti-American, contending the United States favored Algerian independence. This feeling has changed considerably in recent months, largely due to the generally favorable attitude of the U. S. press toward Premier Charles de Gaulle and his program to stabilize France.

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
