

Many Things Accomplished Away From Conference Table At Colombo Meeting

SEATTLE (AP) — A conference ended here Thursday night that would have bored you to tears—unless you were here.

Nearly a month of tedious talks among Colombo Plan nations—on how to raise living standards for Asians before they are toppled into Communism by hunger—naturally concentrated on economics. The conference took no action. It had no power to. It just talked and talked and banded figures about it. Compared to the quiet, it seemed to accomplish little. It wasn't supposed to do anything startling. Just examine what's been done in the past eight years by the 18 nations involved and try to figure out better ways of doing it from now on. But subtle things that can't be measured happened here.

Victims To Ike's Charms
Asians, who are inclined to think Americans do nothing for them unless it does Russia or China in the eye, fell victims to the charms of one Dwight D. Eisenhower. This pink-cheeked President leveled his familiar sincerity and simplicity at them and scored an undeniable bullseye. They ate up his five-point "Program for Progress" and felt America was truly behind them as people, not just as pawns in the cold war. Some said as much publicly. More said it among friends.

And what is it worth that the Pakistani delegate can gripe openly in a conference like this about the way India is managing the flow of rivers that rise in India but also water Pakistan? Can India go on quite the same?

And is it without value that Indonesian Foreign Minister Subandrio is moved to note with some surprise that he, the delegate of a former colony, finds himself talking in precisely the

Picketing Continues At Plant Where Strike Leader Shot

CHESTER, N.Y. (AP)—Pickets marched again today at the Chester Cable Co., whose president was arrested Thursday in the slaying of a onetime bank robber who was leading a wildcat strike.

Thomas Murphy of Port Jervis, N.Y., leader of a group of employees seeking recognition for an independent union, said he and other workers were shocked by the shooting.

But he said they would continue to press for their objective.

The company president, Malcolm White, was in jail at Goshen on a first-degree murder charge, awaiting a hearing Dec. 1.

The victim of the shooting, Alfred P. Dugan, 32-year-old New Jersey labor organizer with a long criminal record, had been engaged several weeks in an effort to switch the firm's 140 employees from an AFL-CIO union to a small independent organization.

Strike Begun Monday
A wildcat strike was begun Monday by some workers, but plant production was continued by others who crossed picket lines.

The 48-year-old White, who has spent some 15 years building up his company, recently took out a gun permit saying he feared violence might occur at his plant. A few days ago he began gathering information about Dugan's criminal record.

Upon reaching the plant Thursday morning, White encountered Dugan. The two exchanged angry words and White shouted that he planned to reveal Dugan's record.

A short time later White drove away from the plant and Dugan followed in his own car. About half a mile away, White said, he noticed Dugan behind him and halted. Dugan also stopped and got out, White said.

White said that as Dugan approached, he thought the union organizer had his hand on a gun in his pocket.

White said he then drew his pistol and began firing at Dugan. Two shots hit the union man, killing him. White returned to his office. He called police who arrived soon afterward.

"I shot him," he told them.

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Governor Spares Two Men's Lives In Murder Case

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — The priest's fingers flew as he delivered his desperately important message in sign language.

A puzzled look passed over the faces of two deaf-mute brothers, Father Bernard J. McClory made the signs again, this time more slowly.

The brothers watched incredulously. Hesitantly, one of them repeated the priest's signals. Father McClory nodded vigorously.

The bewildered looks turned to ones of hysterical happiness.

Joseph Buza, 21, and his 17-year-old brother, Bert, were emerging from the shadow of the electric chair.

The message: Gov. C. William O'Neill had spared their lives only 11 hours before their scheduled electrocutions for murder.

The governor gave no explanation of why he commuted their sentences to life imprisonment.

The brothers were condemned for the stabbing-slashing slaying of Margaret Denham, 26-year-old confectionery store and gasoline operator.

She was slain April 10, 1957, in her place of business at Barton, a village in eastern Ohio's coal-mining region. The slaying climaxed a dispute over \$100 she gave them for a worthless piece of paper they told her was a check.

Attorneys for the deaf-mutes in an earlier clemency hearing told the governor the boys are the victims of their affliction.

Communists Stage Get-Out-The Vote Rally In W. Berlin

BERLIN (AP) — Communists staged a big get-out-the vote rally Thursday night in West Berlin's Sportsplatz, scene of some of Adolf Hitler's greatest rabble rousing efforts.

About 3,000 West Berliners laid siege to the historic building, jeering and shouting "down with Communists." Stones sailed through the air. Several windows were broken.

Only the work of 250 riot police prevented a street battle reminiscent of those fought when Hitler was storming for power.

Anti-Communist anger was roused when the 7,000 Reds began turning the rally into an anti-Western "get out of Berlin" demonstration.

Albert Norden, a member of the Politburo of East Germany stirred up his followers with a passionate speech recalling Soviet Premier Khrushchev's demand that the Western allies clear out of West Berlin and turn it over to the East Germans.

"The Berlin occupation statute and foreign troops must go," Norden declared.

Outside the Sportsplatz, the West Berlin police charged the hooting demonstrators. Since the demonstrators were fellow West Berliners—and anti-Communists—the police had orders not to use their clubs.

West Berlin votes Dec. 7 for a new city parliament. The Communists billed the rally as the kick-off of a drive to get out the vote. But their chances of getting out the vote appeared slim.

More than 80 per cent of Norden's audience went directly to an elevated railway station and boarded trains to Communist East Berlin.

CRISIS EASES

TOKYO (AP) — A Japanese parliamentary crisis eased today amid speculation Prime Minister Kishi would reorganize his Cabinet and trim his demands for power to control leftist demonstrations.

Leaders of Kishi's conservative liberal-democrats and the opposition Socialists are expected to confer soon on ending a Socialist walkout that has paralyzed Parliament for 10 days.

The crisis blew up over a Kishi-sponsored bill to give police greater power.
