

Russians Have Another Plan For Bomb Tests

GENEVA (AP) — The Soviet Union today proposed an international treaty today to prevent planes from carrying nuclear weapons over the territory of other countries and the high seas.

The proposal was submitted by Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Vasily V. Kuznetsov to the 10-nation conference on prevention of surprise attack.

Western officials said the proposal was completely outside the scope of the present talks. Its submission obviously took them by surprise.

The West submitted a new proposal for a plan of work for the conference. This was understood to insist that the talks be confined to technical, nonpolitical matters. In the Western view, the conference has been called only to discuss methods of surprise attack and the procedures required for an international alert system against such attack.

Whole Range Of Questions

The Soviet Union has sought since the opening of the talks on Nov. 10 to bring in a whole range of political and disarmament questions which the Western experts have refused to discuss.

The talks on suspension of nuclear tests were deadlocked, with little hope of agreement. Western sources said if there is to be any change, the Soviets will have to do the bidding.

The U.S. State Department Saturday charged that the Soviet Union was trying to sell Britain and the United States a "pig in a poke"—an agreement to ban nuclear tests for all time before there is any certainty Russia would accept an international control system to police the ban.

West Sticks To Demands

Western sources said the United States and Britain would stick to their demands for effective controls before agreeing to ban tests. U.S. Atomic Energy Commissioner William F. Libby disclosed in a radio-TV interview from Washington last night that the United States is making plans for future nuclear weapons tests in case the Geneva talks break down. He denied a Russian charge that the United States is stalling to gain time to prepare for another series of tests.

The United States and Britain have suspended their tests since Oct. 31, while the talks are on. He urged the Soviet Union to do likewise. But detection apparatus showed the Soviets set off two shots on Nov. 1 and Nov. 3.

Young American Held By East Germany Freed

BONN, Germany (AP)—A young American tourist jailed for a month in East Germany on spy charges said today the Communists apparently decided to free him on realizing they could not win any diplomatic advantage by holding him.

George S. Milroy of Ann Arbor, Mich., was released Saturday after being arrested Oct. 17 on charges of taking a photograph of a Soviet headquarters in East Germany.

Milroy said he was not manhandled by his captors but was put under "terrible psychological pressure" in an unsuccessful attempt to force him to confess.

Milroy told a news conference here that a girl interpreter betrayed the Communist motives when she said: "Through you we will get the United States to recognize the DDR (East Germany)."

Keeps Up Demand

He kept demanding to be put in touch with U.S. consular authorities but was always told "your consul won't speak to us."

Milroy was seized near Neustadt, 70 miles north of Berlin, while driving to West Berlin from Copenhagen.

Milroy, a bachelor salesman who lives with his father in Ann Arbor, said the worst part of his experience was not knowing what would happen to him.

"But," he went on, "they always came up with more questions. I even had to give them a list of all my relatives and name all the 13 grade schools I went to. They know more about me than the FBI."

Man Rescued From Plunge Into River

FLORENCE, Ore. (AP)—A red-haired mill worker, who gave up hope after being trapped in a car nearly covered by a rushing river, was in good condition in a hospital here today.

Western Lane Hospital said Russell Morse Upton, 51, was able to get up and walk around Sunday night after his chill, watery ordeal.

The 6-foot, 165-pound Swiss-home, Ore., man owed his life to a number of things, including a little air pocket and a state policeman who wouldn't believe he was dead.

Upton's car plunged eight feet off the highway into the Siuslaw River near this coastal town in pre-dawn darkness Sunday.

Upton later said that he gave up hope of being rescued when he found that he could open neither the doors nor the windows of the upside down vehicle.

Truck Pulls Out Vehicle

After that, he lost consciousness. For more than two hours he was in the car, before a truck pulled the vehicle from the water.

The car, with only its wheels above water, had been spotted by a train crew.

State policeman Robert Buswell was there when Upton was taken from the car. Buswell said he at first thought Upton was dead.

"I bent over him and he wasn't exactly breathing, just sort of a gurgling sound," Buswell applied artificial respiration, revived Upton and then the man was rushed to the hospital here.

The policeman gave this account after talking to Upton. "He said he was going about 45 miles an hour, and possibly went to sleep. He said he remembered running off the road—and then the cold water."

"He tried to open the doors but they were jammed shut. Then he tried to get a window down but couldn't."

"Upton said that it was about then that he gave up hope—because he knew he was under water. I imagine that he lost consciousness about then."

"I imagine that his head was up beneath the steering column and the instrument board, where there must have been an air pocket."

"He was unconscious when we got him out, but he still had a grip on the brake pedal. We had quite a time prying his hands loose."

Robert Cr. Water District Operates Without Tax Levy

For the first time in its annals, taxpayers in a county water district will not receive their usual annual tax levies.

Jack Hogan, chairman of the Robert Cr. Water District, said today that the district has absorbed its \$16,190 in outstanding bonds for 1958-59. As a result, taxpayers in the district will be "home free," noted Hogan.

Hogan quoted Douglas County Assessor Morris Bowker as commenting that this is a county "first"—and possibly even the first time the situation has occurred in the state.

Hogan said liquidation of the outstanding bonds was accomplished through an economy drive aimed at cutting down on overhead expenses. And, added Hogan, the feat came about despite the fact that the district lost some \$30,000 in revenue when Wiston-Dillard, formerly served by the Robert Cr. Water District—started operating its own plant.

Assessment since the district was established in 1947, have ranged from 16.4 mills to 4 mills, quoted Hogan. District bonds will run until 1970, he said.

Serving on the district board with Hogan are Graham Fox, treasurer; Charles H. Sullivan, and Gerald Lane, J. H. Sullivan and Jack Holmgren, commissioners.

northern and central plateau and Rockies were from 10 to 20 degrees, with below zero readings in the higher Rockies. One of the low marks was 9 below at Evanston, Wyo.

Snow fell in southern border sections of New Mexico and Arizona, with a four-inch covering at Douglas, Ariz., and three inches at Columbus, N.M.

More than four inches of fresh snow whitened North Dakota areas with amounts ranging to a foot in some sections and four to six inches in other parts of the snow belt.

In the warm air to the east of the stormy weather, temperatures were in the 70s during the night in most of Texas and the lower Mississippi Valley.

Tornadoes and strong winds skipped through sections of southern Illinois and northwestern Missouri Sunday night. Damage was minor and no injuries were reported. The twisters struck near Marysville, Mo., and in the southern Illinois areas of Centralia and Sandoval.

High winds ripped into a residential area in Abilene, Tex., damaging two homes early today. There apparently was no tornado funnel. No injuries were reported.

Roseburg Lions Observe Anniversary

Lionism is a part of citizenship. Edward G. Barry, of Little Rock, Ark., immediate past president of Lions International, told a gathering of some 250 Lions club members and their wives from throughout the state Saturday night at the Umpqua Hotel Gold Room.

The occasion was the 30th anniversary of the Roseburg Lions club, an occasion honoring charter members and the presentation of special awards. The program, with Barry as speaker of the evening, followed a social hour and banquet.

Charter members, now in affiliation with the Roseburg club, include Bruce C. Elliott, D. W. Helliwell and Ford Singleton, who have been active members since that time. A fourth charter member, W. H. Machen, has returned to membership after many years absence.

Specially honored, also, was A. L. "Irzy" Hawn, a charter member and first president of the Roseburg club, who has been affiliated with the Eugene Lions Club for many years. Hawn has held practically every top office in Lions club activities, including that of international director. He is now a candidate for a vice presidency of Lions International.

Life Membership

Introduced by Master of Ceremonies Allen Clute as "Mr. Lion of Oregon," Hawn was further honored with the presentation of a life membership from his own Eugene club. Life memberships are given only to persons having very special qualifications, said Past President Barry in making the presentation.

Elliott, Helliwell and Singleton were presented 30-year charter chevrons. A fourth man, Phil Harth, a member of the club for 10 years, but who came into the organization a few months after the charter was received, was presented a 30-year monarch award. The presentations were made by A. G. McLain, deputy governor of District 36E.

District Governor Eston Humphrey of Medford presented monarch awards to Vondis Miller, 30 years membership; Edell Bryant, 15 years; and Buckley Bell and Allen Clute, ten years.

Among distinguished guests introduced were Mrs. Barry, who accompanied her husband to and from Oregon by plane, and Morene Conwell, of Milwaukee, state president of the Lions auxiliary. She was introduced by Margaret Buchanan, Roseburg auxiliary president.

Many Clubs Represented

Most of the Lions clubs of southern Oregon, and from as far away as Tillamook and Portland, were represented. Several past district governors were in attendance. Among them, Forrest Losee of Roseburg was general chairman of the anniversary celebration.

Entertainment included selections by the Dixieland 4s, Sutherland, by Harold Baxter, member of the local club, and impromptu singing. Barry, noted as a soloist, led the club at the conclusion in a round of songs.

For the serious part of the program, a necrology was conducted by Rev. Dewayne Howell, Roseburg Christian Church pastor. Club members who have passed away include Dr. Lee A. Wells, P. L. Jensen, H. D. Palmer, Dr. L. M. Lehrbach, Orton M. Keel, Dr. W. A. Kasparie, Jalo Stephens, Ray Parslow, Morrell Ritter and James Bewley.

In his address of the evening, mostly centered on Lionism, Barry used a humorous approach to hold the attention of his audience as he discussed the work of Lions clubs throughout the world. But he was serious as he told how Lions in India, through their work with CARE, are helping feed some 162,000 persons in that nation. He was serious also in telling how Lions members built 30 houses to replace homes burned out during a fire in New Zealand, while the socialized government of that island nation were going through red tape to determine what to do. And he was serious as he told how Lions were assisting in the rehabilitation of atomic-bombed Hiroshima and Nagasaki in Japan.

World Traveler

A world traveler, mostly in his work with the Lions, he described his visits to some 70 nations, all having Lions clubs who are helping with the work of their communities. He was met by U.S. ambassadors in many of the nations he visited, and he remarked that Douglas MacArthur Jr. is doing a wonderful job in helping to rehabilitate Japan. He mentioned a few of the men he met, including the builder of a tremendous building in Tokyo who took eight days away from his job to show him Japan. He met the vice president of the Lions club in Nagasaki, a skin specialist working with persons injured or maimed by the atomic bomb drop there. He visited Nehru, who appeared a man trying desperately to tell his own story, yet willing to listen to the words of Lionism.

He mentioned the members in attendance to think of Lionism not as the most important thing in life. He placed the church first among a man's considerations. Next came family; third, enterprise, which includes the earning of a livelihood, and fourth citizenship.

Under this latter heading he placed Lionism and its meaning of service to others. In this respect, he said, the two terms are synonymous. In conclusion he quoted an old Indian legend of New Delhi in which a young man set forth seeking his goal in life. He was told by various sages he met that he needed first a dream to guide him; a voice to tell him what he should do; a sword to cut through the fog of his life; and a shield to protect him from the blows of his life.

Posses Seek Five Persons Missing In Arizona Storm

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP)—Posses were out looking for five persons missing in Arizona after one of the most severe early winter storms in years.

Missing were three Boy Scouts from Tucson and two hunters from Phoenix.

Posses headed into the Santa Rita Mountains this morning looking for Mike Early, 17, Michael Lanoue, 15, and David Greenberg, 12, the missing scouts.

A posse headed into the Munds Park area south of Flagstaff looking for Jim R. Rhoden, 28, a Phoenix hunter last seen Saturday morning.

From Prescott, another posse was working in the rugged Camp Verde area seeking Robert Schooler, 34, another Phoenix hunter, reported missing.

The storm dropped 14 inches of snow at Flagstaff in the North, and left two inches at usually warm Tucson and a thin white blanket over other southern desert areas where snow is a rarity.

The Bloodmobile will be at the Drain Methodist Church Wednesday. No quota has been set there, citizens of the town having requested the stop. Blood collected will go to the credit of Donna K. McDonald, who recently underwent extensive skin grafting at Doernbecher Hospital, Portland.

Cargo Plane With Two Crewmen Vanish In Storm

FORT COLLINS, Colo. (AP)—A C-46 cargo plane with two crewmen aboard vanished in a northern Colorado blizzard Sunday morning.

The pilot, F. L. Courtell of Hayward, Calif., radioed that one of the plane's two engines had failed. Courtell said he would turn back to Denver from where the plane had departed for Hill Air Force Base, Utah. It wasn't heard from again.

Steady snowfall and heavy fog hindered searches. Courtell's cockpit was identified as Calvin Clout of Napa, Calif.

Unpaid Fines Land Boy In Roseburg City Jail

An 18-year-old Eugene grocer boy, Richard Michael Free, is sitting out \$60 in fines in city jail for a series of incidents starting back in October.

Saturday Roseburg Municipal Judge Randolph Slocum fined Free \$35 for disorderly conduct and being drunk. Then police served a bench warrant on him charging failure to have his car under control on Oct. 11.

Early Saturday morning police were called to a local hospital where the youth was "giving a doctor and nurses trouble" in the emergency ward. He had been picked up a short time earlier lying in the street near Lane Ave. and SE Fullerton St. Police reported he was under the influence of alcohol.

The driving citation came about following a SE Mill St. accident Oct. 11 when the car Free was driving collided with the rear of a vehicle driven by Edward Henry Brinkmeyer, 42, of 2660 NE Oswego Ave., Roseburg, doing an estimated \$350 in damage. Judge Slocum fined the driver \$25 and costs for this offense.

He entered a plea of guilty to the charge of being drunk and disorderly.

TAIPEI (AP)—The Chinese Communists peppered the Quemoys Islands with light, harassing gunfire today.

The Red guns, silent throughout Sunday, fired 236 shells at Quemoys, Little Quemoys and the Tan Islands between midnight and 11 a.m.

Vice Adm. Herbert H. Hopwood, commander of the U.S. Pacific Fleet, left Taipei for his headquarters at Pearl Harbor and told newsmen the crisis in the Far East obviously had abated.

Auto And Truck Collision Kills 10

SAN AUGUSTINE, Tex. (AP)—A head-on collision of an auto and a pickup truck just north of here killed 10 persons and injured two more early today.

Percy Garner, funeral home operator here, said four of the dead were children and seven were members of the same family.

State Highway Patrolman R. H. Vinyard of Center, Tex., said the family was from Tenaha, Tex., in Shelby County.

Sheriff E. C. Nichols said Maurice McClellan and Charles McClellan, cousins from Center, were in the pickup truck. Vinyard said Charles was driving. Charles was killed and Maurice was taken to a Shreveport, La., hospital in critical condition.

Vinyard said the auto, containing 10 persons, was driven by Ralph Reed of Tenaha.

Nichols said all involved were Negroes.

"The pickup truck was about six feet over the center line. It had just topped a little hill on a straight stretch of road. The car applied its brakes for about 45 feet. The pickup didn't apply its brakes at all," the sheriff said.

Vinyard estimated the speed of each vehicle at about 70 miles an hour.

SEOUL (AP)—Seven U.S. Air Force men today were reported missing after the crash of a B-66C reconnaissance bomber on the west coast of South Korea.

An Air Force spokesman said the plane, crashed Saturday night about 120 miles south of Seoul with six officers and one enlisted man aboard.

Nine Persons Die In Washington And B. C. Blazes

Nine persons lost their lives over the weekend in a series of home and apartment fires in Washington and British Columbia.

Two children died in Kelso early Monday when flames swept through their two-story, frame home. They were Delbert Lentz, 7, and David, 11 months, sons of Mr. and Mrs. Solomon Lentz.

The father was burned severely in a vain attempt to rescue the two boys. Another son, Danny, 11, who jumped with his father from a second-floor window, suffered minor burns. Both were hospitalized. Mrs. Lentz and a daughter, Diana, 3, were singed as they escaped.

Fire Chief Don Bashor said the blaze apparently broke out in the living room.

The other young victims included two small daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Donovan E. Kreune, whose little frame home was destroyed Saturday night near Yelm.

With Baby Sitter

The Kreunes had left their children, Verda Jean, 3, and Wanda Mae, 1, with a teen-age baby sitter while they went to Yelm for the evening. The house was a mass of flames before the sitter could run to a neighbor's where there was a telephone and summon the Yelm fire department. The cause was not known.

A Tacoma infant, 16-month-old Jean McLaughlin, died Saturday when an electric heater set fire to her crib in a second-floor apartment.

In Longview, Mrs. Dorothy Moses, 42, was asphyxiated early Sunday when an electric heater set fire to a davenport in the living room of her home. She was asleep in a rear bedroom.

Mrs. Helen Carlin, 81, died in Seattle early Sunday, the second victim of a rest home fire two days earlier.

Separate fires in Vancouver, B.C., took the lives of two men Saturday. One was George Smith, 54, and the other was not identified.

Johnson Assures Americans Rack Space Program

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP)—Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson assured the U.N. today the American people are solidly behind the Eisenhower administration's proposal for international cooperation in outer space.

The Senate Democratic leader told the General Assembly's 81-nation political committee:

"On the goal of dedicating outer space to peaceful purposes for the benefit of all mankind, there are no differences within the government, between our parties, or among our people."

Johnson joined in the U.N. outer space debate in an effort to dispel any doubts as to whether the government still commands the full support of the country on this issue since the Democratic victory in the Nov. 4 Congressional elections.

He specifically endorsed a resolution submitted to the committee last week by the United States and 19 other countries proposing a special U.N. body to lay the groundwork for an international space agency.

Before his speech, Johnson was introduced to the regular delegates in the committee by U.S. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge. Lodge also yielded his front-row committee seat to Johnson during the meeting so the Senate majority leader could make his speech. Then he explained the U.N.'s multiple-translation system so Johnson could listen to other speakers.

Must Remain Free

The Democratic leader asserted that today outer space is free and it must remain this way.

"We of the United States," he said, "do not acknowledge that there are landlords of outer space who can presume to bargain with the nations of the earth on the price of access to this new domain."

Johnson said both houses of Congress were in full support of the view that the U.N. "should assume the responsibility of leadership in promoting international cooperation in the exploration of outer space."
