Thundering Jimmy Brown, Cleveland's running virtuoso, today had picked one of the National Football League's juiciest plums, was near another, and had propelled the Browns closer to a division championship.

The barreling Cleveland fullback set a season rushing record Sunday as the Browns regained undisputed possession of first place in the Eastern Conference with a 20-10 victory at Washington.

Brown gained 152 yards in 27 tries, totally eclipsing the standard of 146 yards set in 12 games by Steve Van Buren of Philadelphia in 1949. The former Syracuse All-American has amassed 1,163 yards in only eight games.

A sophomore in pro ranks, Brown scored twice on short plunges. The Cleveland standout has 17 touchdowns for the season, one short of Van Buren's record.

Browns On Top

Cleveland's triumph, coupled with the 31-10 upset of the New York Giants by Bobby Layne and his Pittsburgh mates, left the Browns on top with a 6-2 record. Runner-up New York is a game back at 5-3.

The race in the Western Conference virtually was broken wide open as Baltimore, second-string quarterback, George Shaw, passed the Colts to a 17-0 triumph over Chicago's Bears. Baltimore, has a 7-1 record for a two-game lead over Chicago and Los Angeles.

The Rams tied for the runner-up spot by knocking off Green Bay 20-7.

In other games, halfback Gene Gedman led the way as Detroit punted San Francisco, 35-21, and Philadelphia easily handled Chicago's Cardinals 49-21.

8 Power Boat Races Slated

Shreveport, La., and Seattle, invited the APBA to hold its 1959 outdoor national championships in those cities late in August.

Drivers will vote by mail and a decision on which invitation to accept will be announced later.

Medford, with eight victories and one tie, was ranked No. 2 in the Associated Press poll.

EUGENE (AP)—Oregon held its point total down to 26 for top honors Saturday in cross-country meet here that drew entrants from throughout the Northwest.

Oregon's Jim Grelle jogged over the 4.1-mile cross-country course in 19:34 minutes, edging Dyrrol Burleson, an Oregon freshman running unattached. Burleson's time was 19:53.

Mark Robbins of Oregon finished in 20:03, followed by two Idaho runners, Frank Wyatt in 20:09 and Ron Adams in 20:13.

Idaho with 50 points was second in team competition followed by Oregon State with 89.

Baker Board Is Opposed To Plan

BAKER (AP)—The Baker school board said it was opposed to the newly formed East-Central Athletic conference, created to replace the Blue Mountain League in the 1959-60 season, because it would mean too much traveling.

"We will be handicapped by expenses, loss of school time and by fatigue of players who will be forced to travel as much as 640 miles in one weekend," Dr. James Evans, school superintendent, said.

The school board voted to notify other members of the new conference of its objections. The other schools are Baker, Pendleton, Hermiston, La Grande, The Dalles, Prineville, Redmond and Bend.

GOP Leader Alcorn Denies Plan To Quit

WASHINGTON (AP)—Meade Alcorn says he plans to remain Republican national chairman despite the party's overwhelming defeat in congressional elections.

Alcorn denied over the weekend published reports he intends to quit.

The Cincinnati Enquirer had quoted unidentified Republican sources as saying Alcorn would resign at a National Committee meeting next month. It said Judson Morhouse, New York state chairman, might replace him.
