

Sailor Terrorizes Shipmates, Shoots One In Wild Ride

BOSTON, Mass. (AP) — A 22-year-old sailor, awaiting court-martial, terrorized shipmates on the picket ship USS Investigator today, then forced three to accompany him at gunpoint and shot one during a wild auto ride through East Boston and Chelsea.

The sailor, Raymond J. Lizzotte, of Poplar, Mont., who the Navy said is a full-blooded Indian, was captured later in Providence, R.I., after he burst into a lodging house and demanded clothing.

Wounded in the affray in East Boston was Donald Hicks, 19, of Atlanta, Ga. Naval authorities said Lizzotte shot him in the jaw when he failed to follow driving instructions. Hicks was reported in satisfactory condition.

Navy officials said Lizzotte was confined to the ship awaiting a summary court-martial today. They did not specify the charges.

Shoots at Mate

Lizzotte began his terror reign, the Navy said, shortly after 1 a.m. in a washroom aboard the ship when he fired two shots at Howard Holliday, 23, of Pekin, Ill.; Willie Charles Arrington, 24, of Clifton, Ala.; and Sam Payne, 21, of Baltimore, Md.

Lizzotte then ran to an upper deck where he confronted two men on watch—Robert Brown, 32, of St. Joseph, Mo., and Terrence Thompson, 19, of Janesville, Wis. Lizzotte ordered Brown and Thompson to accompany him off the ship and as they were reasoning with him, Hicks and Jackie Ryan, Winchester, Va., returning from liberty, boarded the ship.

Lizzotte forced Hicks, Ryan and Thompson to walk from the ship to Hicks' parked car. Thompson bolted from the group and alerted a civilian guard.

When Lizzotte demanded that Hicks drive down a one-way street, Hicks balked and Lizzotte fired a single shot into his jaw.

Hicks was pushed from the car by Lizzotte and Ryan was commanded to drive.

As Ryan and Lizzotte neared the Chelsea Naval Hospital, Lizzotte told Ryan to stop the car and get out. Lizzotte then sped off.

Trials Docketed For Reedsport 2

Trials have been set in Circuit Court for two Reedsport youths charged in Grand Jury indictments with contributing to the delinquency of a minor.

Thomas Allen Dorsey and Charles Emery Robbins, now 18 years of age, allegedly were involved with a 15-year-old school girl near Reedsport on March 9 of this year. Two other youths were picked up and cited for the same offense.

Dorsey and Robbins entered pleas of innocent to the charges when arraigned last summer.

Judge Charles S. Woodrich set trials for 9:30 a.m. next Monday. Both boys were 17 years of age on March 9. This point was made in a demurr to the allegations and their juvenile status may be a key argument at the coming trials.

Sen. Gore Says Ike Asks Plans On Nuclear Tests

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Albert Gore (D-Tenn.) says President Eisenhower has asked for a detailed memorandum of Gore's proposal for a three-year U.S. moratorium on above-ground nuclear weapons tests.

Gore told newsmen the President made this request during a White House meeting Monday at which the Tennessee senator advanced his idea.

The senator, a member of the Senate House Atomic Energy Committee, has just returned from serving in Geneva as a delegate at the deadlocked East-West talks on test suspension.

Gore said the moratorium he proposes would counter Russian propaganda picturing American tests in the air as being dangerous to world health. He suggested that the question of controlling other kinds of nuclear weapons tests—below ground, under the ocean and in outer space—could be taken up in later negotiation.

The Russians have refused to consider Eisenhower's proposal for a one-year test suspension coupled with steps toward an adequate inspection system. They have called for separate treaties covering a test ban and inspection.

Caril Fugate Tells Of Joint Savings With Starkweather

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — Caril Fugate said today she once had a joint savings account with convicted killer Charles Starkweather.

The 15-year-old girl, who is on trial for first degree murder as Starkweather's alleged accomplice in one of the 11 killings attributed to him, told about the savings account during cross-examination.

She said about three months before the notorious killing tour, Starkweather brought her a signature card which gave her the right to draw money from the account. He explained he had been doing some drag racing and already had been involved in one minor accident. He said he wanted her to get his money if he should be killed, the girl related.

Caril said she never learned how much money was in the account.

Cross-examination of Caril was in its final stages today and the case is expected to go to the jury by Thursday. The girl's defense during the three-week long trial has been based largely on her own testimony.

Woods Accident Claims Crescent City Man

GOLD BEACH (AP) — A woods accident Monday took the life of Jack Bierward, 48, Crescent City, Calif.

He was working as a rigging slinger for the DeFoe Logging Co. when a log rolled down a hill and pinned him against another log.

The accident happened at Wheeler Creek, 15 miles east of Brookings.

Drain Logger's Check Makes Cavalcade Entry Possible

A Drain logger plunked down a \$1,650 check to assure his hometown of an entry in the covered wagon trek from Independence, Mo., to Oregon. He has relatives living along the Oregon Trail which the modern pioneers will follow as closely as possible.

Robert Roudebaugh contributed the money to the Drain Chamber of Commerce so it can sponsor a wagon in the On-to-Oregon Cavalcade. The check handed to Stacy Johnson, president of the Chamber of Commerce, means Drain will sign on the dotted line of a contract for its entry.

The check is only part of it—Roudebaugh also plans to make the trek from Independence, Mo., to Oregon. He has relatives living along the Oregon Trail which the modern pioneers will follow as closely as possible.

Some \$300 raised in a previous fund campaign is to be used for publicity material to be distributed from Drain's wagon during the trek. It is to be aimed at attracting visitors to north Douglas County.

The wagon train sponsors hope to have about a dozen wagons in the train. Definite commitments for entries have been given by five other Oregon cities and organizations: Independence, La Grande, Lane County Chamber of Commerce, Eugene and Roseburg. In addition to these, Klamath Falls, Redmond and Burns have indicated strong intentions of sponsoring wagons.

Stranded Kentucky Residents Plead Guilty To Vagrancy

Two stranded Kentuckians pleaded guilty before District Judge Warren A. Woodruff Monday and were fined \$20 and costs for vagrancy.

Jessie James St. John, 32, and his 26-year-old wife, Pauline, arrived in Roseburg last weekend with their two small children.

Their 1947 car was nearly out of gasoline when they stopped at a Garden Valley Blvd. residence. The woman of the house turned them over to the Salvation Army which found a place for the family to sleep and provided them with meal tickets.

The next night they appeared at the home of the Roseburg woman they first contacted, said they had no place to go, and "refused to leave," investigating sheriff's deputies reported. Finally, the housewife called authorities who booked the couple at county jail.

Law officers also contacted the county Public Welfare Department which found temporary housing for the children, ages one and four years old.

In court Monday St. John said he and his wife had left Lexington, Ky., "a couple of months ago" and drove to Chehalis, Wash., where they visited with relatives and attended the funeral of an uncle of Mrs. St. John. A few days ago they left Washington and got as far as Roseburg.

When booked at the jail, St. John had 32-cents in his pocket. Sheriff's deputies are continuing to investigate the family. Among other things found in the family car were a number of new garments. One item, a colorful embroidered cowboy shirt, was purchased for \$19 at a Portland sporting goods store late last week. The receipt was in the clothing box.

University Professor Speaks At High School

Dr. Norman H. Oswald, professor in the English Department at the University of Oregon, spoke on ability groupings in English this afternoon at Roseburg High School.

He spoke to 13 English instructors. Dr. Oswald's talk included a discussion on what should be taught the advanced English students. The professor visits the local high school in the capacity of an advisor or consultant. He will probably visit the school once more during the school year, Principal Harry Jacoby said.

Dr. Oswald's visits help the teachers keep up with new ideas and trends in various ability groupings. Jacoby added.

Oregon's Two Top State Officials Suffer Illnesses

SALEM (AP) — Oregon's two top state officials were ill today.

Gov. Robert D. Holmes remained at home with an eye infection. He had to miss today's Board of Control meeting, and cancelled Monday's speaking engagement at the League of Oregon Cities Convention in Eugene.

Secretary of State Mark Hatfield has laryngitis, and his voice appeared to be failing. He was late to the Board of Control meeting because he had an appointment with his doctor.

Police Station Becomes Shamble During Gunfire

HOMESTEAD, Fla. (AP) — Minutes after a prisoner was let out of his cell, the local police station became a shambles of blood, debris and gunfire in a siege nearly two hours long.

When the battle ended at 5:30 p.m. Tuesday, Robert Shaffer, 26, the rangy Negro prisoner, lay dead of shotgun blasts. Desk officer Ted Beam, 28, shot and held hostage by Shaffer, was hospitalized in critical condition from a bullet wound in the back. Two other officers were treated for minor hurts. Two women station-house clerks were treated for shock.

Shaffer, who was being held on a disorderly conduct charge, jumped Beam after complaining of illness and being brought to the station office.

He yanked Beam's gun out of its holster, shot and clubbed Beam, fought off other officers and fired at them as they fled outside.

Police fired into the building when they failed to induce Shaffer to surrender, but ceased fire when Beam called out that "he says he's going to kill me if you shoot any more."

Then officers saw Shaffer beating the helpless Beam about the head. They fired tear gas into the station and charged in, shooting.

"Kill that dirty —" Beam moaned as the gun squad blasted Shaffer with sawed-off shotguns.

Young Man Admits Stabbing Mother; Acted Strangely

NEWARK, N. J. (AP) — "I stabbed mother."

Robert Egbert said it simply Monday night. He was facing his brother Steven in the living room. Behind him was a sofa and under it, the nude body of his mother, Marie Egbert, 46.

Mrs. Egbert had been stabbed and strangled. Police charged 26-year-old Robert with homicide.

Steven, 24, told police he returned to their apartment about 7 p.m., and found Robert walking dazedly about. He could see his mother's bare legs protruding from under the sofa.

"What have you done?" Steven demanded of his brother.

"I stabbed mother," was Robert's reply, Steven said.

Monday morning Robert and his mother reported to a probation officer. He had been charged with impairing the morals of a minor.

Last Friday, Robert was arrested on a disorderly conduct charge for allegedly creating a disturbance at the Biscoff Tool Co. job there.

Steven told police his brother had been acting strangely since his layoff at the plant.

"He wouldn't eat the food mother cooked. He even bought his own bar of soap and kept in the bathroom away from the soap we used," Steven said.

Police said that after Robert and his mother left the probation office, they went to a market, purchased some meat—then left it on the counter and walked from the store. Robert took a walk during the afternoon.

An insurance agent called at the apartment about an hour before Steven came home. Robert paid him, then ushered him past the living room where his mother's body was later found.

Police said that Robert strangled his mother while she was ironing and then stabbed her with a pair of scissors because he thought she might still be alive.

Russ Film Personalities Arrive In United States

NEW YORK (AP) — Eighteen Soviet film personalities, including actresses, producers, writers and directors, arrived today to look at the United States, including the movie business.

"We just came over to look, not discover," said Sergei Mikhalkov, writer. "The United States was discovered by Christopher Columbus."

The group will remain here until Sunday, then fly to Chicago for three days. The party expects to arrive in Los Angeles Nov. 26.

Three Oystermen Tossed Into Sound, Presumed Drowned

TACOMA (AP) — Three oystermen, wearing hip boots and heavy rain clothing, were tossed into Puget Sound and presumed drowned before dawn Tuesday when their small boat overturned in choppy waves.

A fourth workman managed to swim to shore, where he collapsed on the beach near exhaustion.

Missing were Masao Yamashita, 30, part owner of the Western Oyster Co., Purdy, and two brothers, Tom Anderson, 22, and Dave Anderson, 17, both of Gig Harbor.

Richard Morgan, 22, of Wauna, reached safety and later aided in the search for the three others.

The 14-foot, scow-type boat capsized near Purdy, at the head of Henderson's Bay about 15 miles northwest of here.

Morgan told sheriff's officers the four set out at 3:30 a.m. for oyster beds in the bay. Yamashita was in the stern, operating the 15-horsepower outboard motor and the Anderson brothers were in the bow. The boat was about 75 yards from shore when it nosed into a wave and went under.

Morgan said he heard one of the men cry, "Help me, I can't swim." Then there was only silence in the darkness.

Searchers found the boat and motor near where they sank in 10-12 feet of water.

Rain and gusty winds, which swept the region through the night and morning, added to difficulties of the search. The Coast Guard sent out two boats, a helicopter and seaplane and the State Fisheries Department dispatched one of its boats to aid Pierce and Kitsap county sheriff's officers in looking for the missing men.

Only Yamashita was married. Morgan and the Anderson brothers worked for him as oyster pickers.

Bendix Aviation Workers Strike

DETROIT (AP) — The United Auto Workers today struck Bendix Aviation Corp. in a contract dispute. At least seven plants with about 12,500 production workers were shut down by the strike.

Negotiations continued past the midnight start of the strike, then recessed at 7 a.m. after a marathon session of 21 hours of almost continuous bargaining.

The negotiators planned to resume talks.

E. M. Sconyers, federal mediator, said the negotiators had narrowed the dispute to "a few major issues, but they are highly technical and of major importance to both parties."

The 13,500 UAW members on the Bendix payroll have been working under an extension of the old contract which expired last July. Bendix makes computers, missile, aircraft and auto parts.

The walkouts were in plants at South Bend, Ind.; Detroit, St. Joseph, Mich.; Madison Heights, Mich.; Teterboro, N.J.; North Hollywood, Calif., and Los Angeles.

At a plant at Elmira, N.Y., the 1,000 UAW workers stayed on the job. Union spokesmen said they had not received strike notification from the UAW.

One obstacle to a settlement reportedly was a company request for a reduction in the money it plays for employee hospitalization insurance. The union is seeking improvements in pensions, supplemental unemployment benefits and insurance.

Gen. Abboud Takes Over As Sudan Premier

CAIRO (AP) — Gen. Ibrahim Abboud took over today as Premier and defense minister of Sudan.

The Sudanese Radio announced the formation of a new cabinet headed by the 33-year-old army commander who led the coup that deposed pro-Western Premier Abdullah Khalil Monday.

Abboud's deputy, Gen. Ahmed Abdel Wahab, became minister of the interior and local government of the million-square-mile African nation that sprawls between the Red Sea and the Sahara. In the cabinet are seven army officers and five civilians.

Abboud issued a decree giving himself "full legislative, executive and judicial powers."

Abboud seized power in Khartoum. Charging corruption and political instability, he ousted Khalil, dissolved Parliament and abolished political parties.

The general also named 12 officers, with himself as chairman, to a military council that becomes the armed forces' high command.

This looks similar to the old Revolution command council that governed Egypt in the days after the overthrow of King Farouk in 1952 and led, about two years later, to the emergence of Lt. Col. Gamal Abdel Nasser as Egypt's leader.

Release of all politicians detained in the coup was announced in Khartoum, the Sudanese capital.

Without specifically mentioning Khalil, the army indicated he was at liberty.

The army command said all is quiet throughout the nation.

The Cairo press, controlled by President Nasser of the United Arab Republic, said the coup would not affect relations between Sudan and the U.A.R.

The newspaper Al Ahram quoted American news agency reports from London that British experts thought the coup was to forestall any Sudanese concessions to Nasser.

Air Force Silent On Rocket's Fate

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — A mighty Atlas intercontinental ballistic missile thundered into space Monday night but the Air Force was silent today on the fate of the giant war rocket.

If the 100-ton missile hit its target, the United States took another great step forward in its campaign to develop a carrier that can drop a nuclear warhead on any target on earth.

There was official silence, however, after the Atlas blasted off at 11 p.m.

The three engines of the Atlas built up more than 350,000 pounds of thrust before the missile was released. The brilliance of its exhaust flames almost blinded newsmen watching from a platform three miles from the launching pad.

The thunder of the rocket's engines shook this area as the Atlas climbed straight upward for about a minute, then curved gracefully away to the southeast.

Four minutes later, it resembled a great star hanging in the sky. Thirty seconds later it vanished from view as its fuel burned out.

Reportedly, this Atlas was aimed for a target 3,000 miles down the Atlantic Ocean tracking range.
